Whenever you see a bright red STARS helicopter overhead or even land in your community, take comfort in knowing a team of highly trained critical care experts are giving hope to someone in their greatest time of need.

The Shock Trauma Air Rescue Society (STARS), is a non-profit helicopter air ambulance organization. We provide rapid and specialized emergency medical care and transportation for critically ill and injured patients; established over 28 years ago in Alberta, STARS expanded to Saskatchewan in 2012, opening bases in Regina and Saskatoon.

In 2013, STARS in Saskatchewan completed 821 missions to over 240 different communities across the province. Perhaps one is your community.

STARS operates within a community-partnered model that consists of government, corporate, and support from communities and individual donors. All funds raised in Saskatchewan go directly to supporting the operation of our two bases. This financial support is essential to keep STARS in the sky.

As a non-profit charitable organization, the success of STARS depends on the people across this great province of Saskatchewan.

The Saskatchewan Association of Rural Municipalities (SARM) has passed a resolution encouraging all rural municipalities to **voluntarily** contribute \$2.00 per capita to the STARS program. We have flown to your communities, we have carried your people, and we need your support. 
