Pleasant Hill Community Pow wow

The Pleasant Hill Community Association's Goal is to provide an opportunity for all residents in Pleasant Hill and the City Saskatoon and surrounding area to come together and celebrate a Traditional Cultural Pow-wow in the Pleasant Hill Community.

The planning of the Pow wow begins 6 months prior to the date and the committee members are all volunteers and they put in many long hours planning and implementing this event. St Mary's Wellness and Education Centre, Pleasant Hill Community School, St Maria Goretti Community School, the City of Saskatoon Parks Dept. Saskatoon Correctional Urban Camp, Saskatoon Health Region, Saskatoon Fire Department and the Pleasant Hill Community Association are all partners in this well attended event. The Pleasant Hill Community Pow wow has an estimated attendance of 2000 people each year. It gives the Aboriginal people a chance to be proud of their culture and to share the teachings of the Aboriginal Culture to non-Aboriginal people. This annual Pow Wow provides an opportunity for residents of Pleasant Hill, as well as, many Saskatoon and rural residents to come together to learn and enjoy a celebration of First Nations cultures and traditions. The Pow Wow offers a day full of dancing, drumming, and cultural events with explanations and teachings of the dancing and traditions. The event also takes time to recognize the services of the veterans who served our country and the Elders who provide leadership and spiritual support in the community. It also provides an opportunity for various organizations and businesses to participate in the community event. This event is open to all residents of Saskatoon and rural area either on a drop in basis or they can stay throughout the day event. The only restrictions are people cannot participate if they are intoxicated this is a drug and alcohol free celebration.

Overall everyone benefits and it is an excellent event for all.



What opportunities are there for a Cultural Diversity and Race Relations Committee Member(s) to be on the organizing committee (if you have one) for the event and what other participation opportunities are there for the Committee?

The Pleasant Hill Pow wow Committee consists of 4 Elders, 3 Community School Principals, 3 Community School Coordinators, 4 Cultural Advisors, 4 Executive PH Community Association members, and many volunteers from the community and schools make up the Pow wow committee. The Committee follows directions from the Elders and the Cultural advisors as they take leadership roles in this community event. 12 community members will be hired as Security during the Pow wow, this is important as these people will have knowledge and respect to the people of their community. The Cultural Diversity and Race Relations Committee members are welcome to join the Pow wow committee. There are many different jobs they can do before, during and after the Pow wow. What community impact are you hoping to achieve through this event?

- 1) To promote First Nations and Aboriginal Culture in Saskatoon in the Pleasant Hill Community by hosting an Annual Traditional Pow-wow. This will greatly compliment all the work the City of Saskatoon and the Pleasant Hill Community Association has done in supporting the teachings of Aboriginal Culture.
- 2) To celebrate "community" and "differences" in the community so that we can all live together in peace and harmony and to provide the youth with role models within their community so that they may pursue a productive, wholesome life by following the Aboriginal traditions and values..
- 3) To partner with our neighbouring community schools and additional community partners to promote, celebrate and learn from our First Nations' culture and families.
- 4) To host an event culturally relevant to the community and residents who live here with no barriers or cost to participate.
- 5) The Elders and Cultural advisors will give the direction and knowledge of First Nations' Culture which will be passed on through this event and it will give the Aboriginal people of Pleasant Hill Community and Saskatoon area to carry on their traditions.
- 6) To recognize the support from the City of Saskatoon in the Pleasant Hill Community

Every year we focus on teaching our youth how to follow the Aboriginal culture and traditions, by living a drug and alcohol free lifestyle.



What are the themes and focuses for the event?

Honoring First Nations Lifeways

How many people do you anticipate will participate in your event?

This is our 12th annual Pow wow and each year the attendance at the Pow wow grows. Attendance expected this year is an estimated 2000 people.

There will be posters in and around the community and surrounding areas. We will advertise in the PHCA newsletter and both school newsletters. We will make sure everyone is well informed of the Pow wow.

Pow wow Dancers and Pow wow singers will also evaluate the program by attending annually, they will be asked if there needs to be a change or what we could do differently next year. It will be a Community Partnership. Therefore everyone will be involved in the planning, promoting, evaluating and delivering of the project. The community will work as a whole.

Because the event consists of a majority of Aboriginal people we will be able to evaluate them during the Pow wow and after the Pow wow.

In conjunction with the **Contact Conference** (<u>www.contactcorference.ca</u>) the conference committee headed up by the **Saskatoon Industry Education Council** will be working with **A Group of High School's Aboriginal students** to have one of the keynote speakers, **Gabrielle Scrimshaw**, work with young people in the Saskatoon community to discuss relevant and key issues facing young Aboriginal people today. The youth of the schools will provide leadership on the content for this event. This event will take place on Tuesday, April 8th, at Bedford Road Colligate.

Gabrielle Scrimshaw is a young professional with a passion to create social impact. Born and raised in Saskatchewan, Gabrielle is a member of the Hatchet Lake First Nation. She has studied international business and policy in Australasia, Asia, the Americas and Europe. She co-founded a national not-for-profit for Aboriginal Professionals and was named the 2013 First Nations Youth Achiever by Indspire, considered the highest honour the Indigenous community bestows upon their own achievers.

Gabrielle is passionate about diversity, leadership and innovation. As the first in her family to pursue post-secondary education and travel the globe, she is a believer in what hard work and a positive attitude can accomplish. Gabrielle talks about some of the issues that Aboriginal people face everyday: stereotypes and racism. He also brings a message of hope and change. Wab speaks in a positive way, promoting the benefits of connectivity between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal members of society. With the collaboration with the Unified Minds Program, the format in which this is presented would be determined and facilitated by the youth. Scrimshaw is to present at the Contact Conference as a keynote in the afternoon of April 9th, 2014 and a program will be built around his time at the Conference.

What opportunities are there for a Cultural Diversity and Race Relations Committee Member(s) to be on the organizing committee (if you have one) for the event and what other participation opportunities are there for the Committee?

Because this event will be held in April, 2014, there is great opportunities for the Cultural Diversity and Race Relations Committee members to become actively involved in the planning and organizing committee if desired. We want to have the group of young people_____

provide their leadership in conjunction with this event.

What community impact are you hoping to achieve through this event?

The opportunity for young people in our community, either Aboriginal or Non-Aboriginal to have discussions around youth issues in our community. Also to discuss the importance of Aboriginal leadership and perseverance.

Who is your target audience?

Youth in selected high schools, STC and SIIT; primarily Aboriginal youth.

What are the themes and focuses for the event? Culture, Diversity and Racism.

Themes include: issues that Aboriginal people are faced with including stereotypes and racism and benefits of connectivity between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal communities. Because of our growing immigrant population, there may be an opportunity to engage both communities to dispel stereotypes of a number of populations.

How many people do you anticipate will participate in your event?

400 young people. Because of the connection that the SIEC has to three school divisions and the Saskatoon Tribal Council, there is opportunity for connections to a large number of youth in our communities.



How are you promoting the event to the broader community? 

April 2014 updates

The opening ceremonies of Race Relations Month on March 3, as well as the Living In Harmony Awards on March 21st, are now complete. Thank you to the committee for your support and participation in this successful event. A huge kudos also to Centennial Collegiate for a fantastic job and being an amazing host in 2014.

MLA for Saskatoon Centre, David Forbes⁷ was able to attend the Living In Harmony Awards and inquired into the names of the winning selections. He is hoping to make a member's statement about it in the Legislature.

The 7th Annual Youth Leadership Summit planned by Unified Minds in partnership with the Open Door Society took place on the 11th of March. The event received very positive feedback from both youth and the partners. The Summit took place March 11, 2014 and was attended by 75 youth and approximately 30 adult allies. The goal of the youth summit is to promote leadership but also to develop opportunities to build relationships between Aboriginal and newcomer youth. Recommendations for next year are to increase the Aboriginal representation via specific and targeted invitations.

In follow up to adult and youth focus groups discussions on the topic of race relations a series of Conversation Circles were conducted to gather recommendations on how the City of Saskatoon and other community partners could address race relations, racism and guide future activities of the CDRR office and committee. It was initially reported that the Reporting to the Planning and Operations Committee would occur as a separate report in December but has now been rescheduled to April 29, 2014. It was decided that the content of this report would serve as the CDRR Office Annual Report. Highlights of the report include a shift in the main focus of the office from celebrating multicultural diversity to incorporating anti-racism education and awareness initiatives both internally to City of Saskatoon staff as well as to organizations in the community.

Planning for the 25th Anniversary of the CD&RR committee continues and regular updates to follow as planning progresses.

A first issue of the DiverseCity Newsletter from the CD&RR office including insight, information, and updates on initiatives and programs from the Diversity and Inclusion Team is complete and has been distributed to civic facilities and the electronic list serve.

Immigration, Diversity and Inclusion Consultant April 10, 2014

Immigration Overview:

The City of Saskatoon's Community Development Branch has been working in the area of immigration and integration for approximately 6 years. Most of this work has been done under the Saskatoon Immigration Project (SIP) thanks to the generous support of both the Federal (CIC) and Provincial (Economy) governments.

Reports related to major initiatives can be found on the City of Saskatoon website: <u>www.saskatoon.ca/go/immigration</u>, look under 'Resources'.

Updates for end of Jan, Feb-March, 2014

Employment and Economic Development:

1) As part of the organizing committee for "Contact" the 10th annual career development conference (April 8 and 9 ,2014) have been working on the Program committee confirming keynotes and breakouts for the conference as well as helping with the format of the agenda and registration coordination.

Settlement/Integration:

1) Attending Coordinating Committee meetings for the **Prairie Prism** Event 2014. This is an event that first took place many years ago and was revived in 2012 to be part of Culture Days celebrations. There are already 8-10 organizations committed to being on the planning and coordinating committee. The plan so far is to follow the model of the 2012 event with ethno-cultural performances, artisan tables and workshops, community information tables, storytelling and sharing of food.

The committee has been working on establishing funding through grants as well as private sponsorships, promotions and programming. Took part on the selection committee to hire a project coordinator for the event. Prairie Prism 2014 will take place on the afternoon of Sept 28, 2014.

2) Plain Language

Coordinated a pilot Plain Language workshop on February 10, 2014 for City employees in Communications, Marketing and Customer Service. Feedback was very positive with 17 people taking part. The facilitator was Karen Farmer, Community Consultant with the City of Saskatoon.

Following this workshop a meeting took place with the Organization and Training Development Supervisor for the City who attended the workshop. The objective of the meeting was to identify some next steps with regards to developing a Plain Language strategy for the City of Saskatoon.



3) Coordinated the March Newcomer Bus Tour with the ceremony at City Hall for Race Relations Month on March 3. This was the first time we took the bus tour on a weekday as opposed to a weekend and the turnout was just as good with 34 attending (and this on a Monday morning with temperatures around -30!). We visited the Mendel Art Gallery, the Forestry Farm and Zoo, Lakewood Civic Centre and the Cliff Wright Library. From there we headed back downtown to Council Chambers to join in the Race Relations Ceremony. After the formal ceremony was over, His Worship, the Mayor, joined the group in Council Chamber for a private, informal 'chat'. The guests were given the opportunity to ask questions as well as share information about themselves with the Mayor.

4) Saskatoon Symphony Orchestra (SSO)

The SSO via SaskEnergy, donated 25 family passes to their "Toy Story" event on March 22 which was part of their family series. Each pass, worth up to \$72, allowed 2 adults and 2 children to take part in the event. With only 5 days to get the tickets out the City worked with the four settlement agencies, The Saskatoon Open Door, Saskatchewan Intercultural Association, International Women of Saskatoon and the Global Gathering Place to promote and distribute the tickets. The City was also on site to greet families as they arrived. Over 100 newcomer adults and children came out and took part in the instrument-making workshop, the instrument 'petting zoo' (children can get up close to the musicians and try the different instruments) and the symphony show, the Toy Story.

5) Working on the coordinating committee of the **Saskatchewan** Intercultural Association's National Multiculturalism Day event. Secured Sasktel to videotape the event to be the subject of a Local On-Demand show. Also have secured the Mendal Art Caravan to be on-site of the event to do crafts with children for the afternoon.

Education:

 By invitation from the Newcomer Student Centre attended the "Festival of Education Gala" in celebration of Education Week on Feb. 20. The evening included the following presentations:

2) Background to Settlement Support Workers in Schools (SSWIS:

Settlement Support Workers in Schools (SSWIS) is a partnership that includes Saskatoon Open Door Society, the Boards of Education and Citizenship and Immigration Canada. It is a school based outreach program to help newcomer students and their families settle into their school and community.

The SSWIS program focuses on newcomer families who have been in Canada a short time and on newcomers that have unresolved "first year settlement needs. Families with long term settlement issues or who need intensive support are referred to settlement counsellors and other community services. SSWIS provide services to all categories of newcomers such as Government Sponsored Refugees (priority), Independent Sponsored, Private Sponsored, Employment Related Immigrants, International Students, Secondary Immigrants, and Canadian Citizens who are the children of immigrants. Meetings are quarterly. The last meeting was on March 18, 2014.

Housing:

1) In partnership with the Neighbourhood Planning staff facilitated an ESL friendly workshop on January 28 on the two publications, the Housing Handbook and Safe at Home. The workshop took place at the Global Gathering Place as part of their Housing workshop series. Approximately 20 participants attended. The objective of the workshop : To ensure City of Saskatoon materials are accessible to all.

Objective of Immigration, Diversity and Inclusion Consultant, associated with this Safe at Home workshop: to develop the workshop and materials and if necessary, to co-facilitate with the Neighbourhood Planning Consultant until he/she feels comfortable presenting on their own. Due to the nature of the position in Planning there may be ongoing need to 'train the trainer' when there is a rotation of positions and a new person is asked to do it.

Aboriginal/Newcomer Relations

1) The City, via the Immigration Consultant has been asked to participate and coordinate a workshop/panel for The Community-University Institute for Social Research (CUISR) two-day conference on quality of life with a special focus on indigenous people's quality of life. There is a confluence of three projects—Saskatoon Quality of Life studies, 2013 edition, Urban Aboriginal Knowledge Network's QOL study, and the Metropolis funded three-city study of immigrants' QOL—on which they have built this symposium. The conference will take place on May 15-16, 2014.



2) Consulting with the Office of the Treaty Commissioner to possibly revive the train the trainer Treaty Awareness program for Settlement Workers. The intent of this program is to give settlement workers the tools to be able to share information about First Nations history with newcomers as early as possible when they arrive. Awareness would then come from a reliable source rather than word of mouth.

Federal/Provincial/Municipal Partnership

"Capacity for Newcomer Settlement and Integration in Saskatoon: Taking Stock for Taking Action". The report was presented to the Planning and Operations Committee on October 1 and to City Council on Monday October 6

The community event, to formally share this report back with the community and begin discussions on the "taking action" and moving forward took place on February 27, 2014. His Worship the Mayor brought greetings from the City. Just under 100 people attended. Next steps will be to bring the community back together again to roll up our sleeves and strategize on how we are going to work together as we move forward.

Closing Remarks:

This has been an incredibly busy and exciting few months. Important priority initiatives such as the work with the Office of the Treaty Commissioner as well as the Plain Language workshop have now gotten underway. I look forward to continuing with these and other necessary activities over the next month.
