The Adult Services Licensing Bylaw, 2012 – Implications of Criminal Code Amendments

Recommendation

That this Report be received as information and forwarded to City Council for information.

Topic and Purpose

The purpose of this Report is to advise Executive Committee of recent amendments to the *Criminal Code* which may have implications for the licensing of adult services as required by *The Adult Services Licensing Bylaw, 2012* (the "Bylaw").

Report Highlights

1. Identify the primary recent amendments to the Criminal Code.

2. Identify the potential implications of the Criminal Code amendments to the Bylaw.

Strategic Goal

This Report is brought under the Strategic Goal of Quality of Life.

Background

The Bylaw was passed March 12, 2012 and came into force July 1, 2012. The Bylaw requires that persons engaged in the business of supplying adult services in the City of Saskatoon be licensed. Adult services is defined in the Bylaw as "any service of an adult nature appealing to or designed to appeal to erotic or sexual appetites or inclinations" and includes acting as an escort, companion, guide or date; modelling lingerie; performing a striptease or similar dance; and performing a body rub.

Bill C-36, which amends provisions of the *Criminal Code* related to prostitution, came into force on December 6, 2014. The amendments and potential implications for the licensing requirements under the Bylaw are discussed below.

Report

Primary Recent Amendments to the Criminal Code

The primary changes to the *Criminal Code* provisions respecting prostitution as contained in Bill C-36 are as follows:

- 1. The term "prostitution" no longer appears in the *Criminal Code*. Offences now relate to "offering, providing or obtaining sexual services for consideration".
- 2. It is now an offence to communicate for the purpose of offering or providing sexual services for consideration in a public place or any place open to public view that is next to a school ground, playground or daycare centre.
- 3. It is now an offence, in any place, to obtain sexual services for consideration or to communicate for the purpose of obtaining sexual services for consideration (purchasing or attempting to purchase sexual services is now illegal).
- 4. Anyone who receives a financial or other material benefit, knowing that it is obtained or derived directly or indirectly from the sale of sexual services, is guilty of an offence. There is an exception for persons in a "legitimate living arrangement" with the person providing the sexual services.
- 5. Anyone who procures or recruits a person to offer or provide sexual services for consideration is guilty of an offence.
- 6. Anyone who knowingly advertises an offer to provide sexual services for consideration is guilty of an offence.
- 7. Notwithstanding the above noted amendments, no person shall be prosecuted for benefiting from or advertising their own sexual services.

In summary, the amendments to the *Criminal Code* contained in Bill C-36 do not prohibit individuals from the sale of their own sexual services or from advertising their own sexual services. However, it is now an offence for others to advertise sexual services or, except in the case of those with a "legitimate living arrangement" with a person providing sexual services, to receive a financial or other material benefit from the sale of sexual services.

Potential Implications of the Criminal Code Amendments to the Bylaw

In its current form, the Bylaw requires persons to obtain licenses prior to engaging in the operation of an adult service agency; an independent adult service agency; or carrying on business as an adult service performer, transient adult service performer or adult service worker. The definition of adult services under the Bylaw is broadly defined and therefore may include more than what would be included under the term "sexual services" that now appears in the *Criminal Code*. The term "sexual services" as used in the *Criminal Code* is not defined. As it stands, the Bylaw provides for the licensure of persons to participate in activities that could potentially be contrary to the *Criminal Code*. The recent amendments to the *Criminal Code* will therefore have implications with respect to the Bylaw.

Our Office will undertake a more thorough review of the Bylaw to determine the extent of any required amendments. Our Office will consult with the Planning and Development Division and the Saskatoon Police Service respecting this matter. In the meantime, no new licenses under the Bylaw will be issued.

Due Date for Follow-up and/or Project Completion

Our Office will report back to Executive Committee on this matter as the review continues.

I would like to take this opportunity to congratulate you and the Saskatoon Action Accord on the latest success of the expansion of the Lighthouse facilities and services.

Based on the statistics provided in your media release, dated December 30, 2014, the expansion of the Lighthouse facilities and services has resulted in a 30% reduction in the number of individuals being placed into police custody as a result of intoxication. Not only does this help to relieve often strained police resources, it enhances the care and assessment processes for those who struggle with addictions.

As you are aware, providing people with direct access to services is a challenging endeavor and is one we are working to improve in Saskatchewan. Examples of success, such as the Primary Care Paramedics, Lighthouse Mobile Outreach and their partnerships with the Brief Detoxification Unit and Lighthouse Stabilization Shelter provide us with good examples of success as we move forward to improve access to services.

RE: SASKATOON POLICE SERVICE'S DETENTION PROCEDURES

Canadian Federation of University Women (CFUW) Saskatoon is writing to request that the Saskatoon Police Board review and make needed changes to your detention center policies and procedures. CFUW - Saskatoon, established in 1918, is a member of nonpartisan national and international organizations that advance the human rights of women and girls. In addition to supporting educational opportunities for women, CFUW advocates for social and justice issues. Our international organization is one of a few women's organizations given consultative status by the United Nations.

In Canada, people are presumed innocent until proven guilty and have a right to be treated with respect and dignity even after arrest. It is not acceptable to be punishing innocent people by locking them in cells for three days because a provincial court judge is not available to grant release in a timely manner.

The Saskatoon Police Service (SPS) has a responsibility to ensure that detainees under their care are not subjected to physical or psychological harm. Women, in particular, can be humiliated or traumatized by confinement and invasion of their privacy. Women detainees should not be subjected to constant observation by men and being videoed when they are using the toilet. With the increasing number of females employed by the SPS, consideration should be given to scheduling female officers to reduce the psychological degradation that has been experienced by female detainees.

Saskatoon's new detention facility should be incorporating best practices to ensure that detainees' basic human needs are being met. Blankets can provide traumatized women with added comfort and some privacy while they are resting and should be available upon request.

The Saskatoon Police Service has made significant improvements over the last few years in treating citizens under their care with more respect and in ensuring their physical safety. Leadership is now needed to implement policies and procedures to protect the mental and emotional well-being of innocent citizens in the detention center.

We can do better. We trust that you will take these recommendations under consideration and that changes will be made in the near future.

Consider a resolution for 2015 CAPG AGM: Charter Rights should not depend on the day of the week

During the Jan 14/15 Saskatoon Board of Police Commissioners (SBPC) meeting it was mentioned that the upcoming February meeting was the time to begin considering resolutions for the August 2015 Canadian Association of Police Governance (CAPG) AGM in York. I believe the resolution deadline is in April.

Some of the past CAPG resolutions that have done the most good are ones that influence the practices of other organizations that impact on policing. I am remembering the emergency resolution from a couple of years ago that helped push, along with help from the CACP and others, for a law forcing all telecommunication companies to finally share data on the smart phones stolen from their customers, for deactivation. That prevented a phone stolen from the Bell system to be re-registered on Rogers, etc. And thereby directly and rapidly prevented thousands of violent robberies per year of teenager's phones.

A CAPG resolution to consider for 2015 would be follow the theme that Charter rights should not depend on the day of the week that someone is arrested or in contact with officers. An accused has the right to a timely show cause hearing and nobody, especially police, gains by having people locked up unnecessarily.

Already many steps have been successfully taken to help remove the weekend as a particularly wrong time to be detained. In many locations there are duty counsel and justices-of-the-peace on weekend or even evening standby. However, there seems to be some types of judge issued warrants that can only then be dealt with by the type of judges that work what used to be called 'bankers hours'. In the interests of fairness it would seem if judges issue such warrants they collectively must also provide the equivalent level of judges available every day of the week, or permissions to others to conclude the warrant.

Police are required to operate 24/7, as are hospitals, detox, ambulances, shelters, and so on. Yet higher level judges and other members of the Crown who have control over people's liberties do not. Although I stand to be corrected, I think police can get various warrants from the judiciary 24/7 over-the-wire, so maybe a similar system could be developed for video connections to a higher level judge in each province?

Chief Weighill would have much more useful information than most on the feasibility, usefulness, and chance for building enough consensus to pass such a resolution. This would seem to be an issue that police, police boards, and civil libertarians would all like to see further progress made on in the interests of both citizens and of organizations (except maybe the judiciary). It would therefore seem appropriate to place some pressure on Federal and Provincial Departments of Justice to have judges either made more available, in person or through technology, or more restrictions on the type of warrants being issued.

I could also see the CAPG lobbying for better 24/7 facilities for mental health assessments.

Thank you for the Board's consideration of this preliminary suggestion for a CAPG resolution, whether for 2015, or with more refinement and lobbying to prepare for 2016.

Police Board needed visibility or transparency regarding Residential Speed Management Program

The Saskatoon Police Service (SPS) is presently carrying out a long term wide ranging Residential Speed Management Program, as described on the Saskatoon City website Jan 29/15, or as a Neighbourhood Speeding Blitz noted in the Star Phoenix Feb 1/15.

My residential neighbourhood seems typical, the majority of drivers travel at reasonable speeds well under 50km/hr, while there is a small number of locals who consistently drive much too fast for the safety of pedestrians and children playing. A few weeks ago before daylight Sask Power had crews responding quickly to a power outage a few houses down my street. They had vehicles parked on both sides of the street, lights flashing and workers about. Yet still that same small number of locals drove through them at their usual unsafe speed. The residential speed management program (RSMP) is good policing policy, especially since it is well-publicized.

The RSMP is promoted as a partnership between the City of Saskatoon and the SPS responding to widespread public safety concerns. There is no mentioned involvement of the Saskatoon Board of Police Commissioners (SBPC). The new City website for the SBPC has the meeting minutes from Dec 18/14, nothing yet from the Jan 14/15 meeting, and possibly due to switchover complications for the new website, none of the older SBPC meeting minutes. I have previously read those older minutes, and attended the Jan 14/15 public meeting, and although my memory is never perfect there does not seem to be any record of a recent SBPC public discussion on the RSMP. While the RSMP definitely meets a safety need, there is always the balancing with available resources and other needs, impact on the citizenship, and expected effectiveness that would have needed consideration.

So it presently appears that either the SBPC was not involved in the creation and implementation of the RSMP, or the related considerations were done by the SBPC, but in-camera. Either case may indicate a need for improvement in governance procedures.

The SBPC is a creation of Saskatchewan's Police Act 1990. On page 24 of that Act is: 31(1)...the board is responsible: ...(b) for: (i) providing general direction, policy and priorities; and (ii) developing long-term plans; for the police service. The Police Act also requires open public meeting, page 23: (14) Subject to subsection (15), the board shall hold its meetings open to the public. (15) The board may conduct meetings in private that relate to contract negotiations, personnel, security or any other matter where, in the board's opinion, there are privacy issues that require the matter to be dealt with in private. The consideration and enactment of the RSMP is a policy/priority issue, not a privacy one.

The SBPC governance policy (2009), complying with Provincial legislation, has similar wording as above. However, the requirement to go in-camera (when not dealing with a specific set of listed exceptions like personnel issues) is tighter. For reasons of good civic governance, the SBPC must first pass a resolution that the issue be considered in private session.

The SPS, like all Canadian police agencies, has to follow an extensive and growing set of complicated rules and procedures that are sometimes overly costly for the apparent social benefit provided, and are functionally inconvenient in the short term. It is appropriate for their police boards to lead by example in rigorously following both legislated requirements and modern governance practices.

Canadian police boards are specialized agencies due to the need to both facilitate and constrain the also special powers held by police. Police boards are meant to represent the overall social order interests of

the public while also respecting individual rights. It is not the City, nor the police service, nor a discussion between those organizations that in of itself should determine policing priorities. Although wide communication and understanding is required, it is the police board that determines police priorities. The present evolution of police board governance is towards more transparency and greater involvement in police practices, as evidenced by the Morden Report.

Police boards are therefore increasingly required to be knowledgeable about policing matters, to the point that the SBPC governance policy page12 states: *The Board will ensure that it has sufficient expertise to carry out its duties and bring a balanced judgment to the assessment of ... the merit of Service proposals.*

An upcoming example of a likely need for that expertise in determining policies and priorities is once again in regards to residential traffic speeds. In Canada there is now significant municipal debate, particularly in Ontario, on the pro/cons/feasibility of reducing the speed limit on residential roads from 50km/hr to 40km/hr. That could make sense if that restriction does not also then shift to nearby arterial roads which should be operated to original higher design speeds, as moving traffic along quickly reduces congestion and meets other social needs. The SBPC could consider beginning to gather information from the SPS, City bureaucracy, scientific studies, and other municipalities and countries, in order to have the expertise needed for a balanced future discussion and decision.

In summary, the SBPC should become both more visible and more transparent when determining new or changed SPS policing programs or priorities.

Proposed Anti-Terrorism Legislation

On Friday, January 30, Prime Minister Harper announced that the Government has introduced legislation that aims to protect Canadians from the evolving threat of terrorism.

The legislation seeks to ensure law enforcement and national security agencies can: counter those who advocate terrorism; prevent terrorist travel and the efforts of those who seek to use Canada as a recruiting ground; and disrupt planned attacks on Canadian soil.

Quick Facts

The proposed legislation includes measures that seek to:

- criminalize the advocacy or promotion of terrorism offences in general;
- counter terrorist recruitment by giving our courts the authority to order the removal of terrorist propaganda online;
- enhance the Canadian Security Intelligence Service (CSIS)'s powers to address threats to the security of Canada while ensuring that courts maintain oversight;
- provide law enforcement agencies with enhanced ability to disrupt terrorism offences and terrorist activity;
- enhance the Passenger Protect Program by further mitigating threats to transportation security and preventing travel by air for the purpose of engaging in terrorism;

- make it easier for law enforcement agencies to detain suspected terrorists before they can harm Canadians and to toughen penalties for violating court ordered conditions on terrorist suspects;
- enable the effective and responsible sharing of relevant national security information across federal departments and agencies to better identify and address threats;
- Although not part of this proposed legislation, we are also working with communities to prevent radicalization and intervene when individuals show signs of becoming radicalized.
- ensure that national security agencies are better able to protect and use classified information when denying entry and status to non-citizens who pose a threat to Canada; and,
- provide witnesses and other participants in national security proceedings and prosecutions with additional protection.

2015 Saskatoon Police Service Capital Investments include six projects totaling \$1.76 million of which \$1.68 million is targeted for a number of asset replacement projects including \$1.06 million for computer replacements such as computer network storage and the payroll system, \$511,000 related to radio and communication recording system replacements and \$63,000 for operational equipment for the Traffic Section and Forensic Identification. Facility replacement projects include \$50,000 for general furniture replacement. Planned capital expansion projects for 2015 total \$75,000 required for year two funding to implement an electronic ticketing system in Traffic and Patrol vehicles.

The most prominent trend for future capital spending relates to asset replacement. Radio, equipment and technology replacement over the five year planning period of 2015 to 2019 is projected to cost \$5.9 million.

Future capital expansion projects total \$2.7 million including Equipment (\$1,770,000) and Technology (\$960,000). Proposed key projects include the \$1,139,000 in additional vehicles, \$500,000 for the expansion of computer network storage and \$300,000 for air support technology.

2. Capital Funding

All projects in the five year capital plan are proposed to be funded from existing Police capital reserves.



3. Sufficiency of Reserves

Overview

The ability to adequately fund Police capital reserves is for the most part a function of comprehensive planning that forecasts future needs and the ability to match these needs with a corresponding appropriate annual provision from the Operating Budget. Over the years the Police Service with the support of the Board and City Council has taken a number of steps to improve both the planning efforts and reserve funding levels highlighted within the comments that follow.

Reserve Status

In 2015 the total annual provision to the Police Equipment & Technology Capital Reserves will increase by \$57,400 through a reallocation of existing approved equipment expenditure funding. This reallocation addresses Board approved policy that calls for the annual provision to capital reserves to be equal to the ten year average project cash flow requirement.

Total Transfer to Reserves

Based upon proposed changes, budgeted transfers to reserves in 2015 will total \$1,837,200.

The status of each reserve is summarized below. A table forecasting the sufficiency of reserves is provided later in this report on Page 8.

Equipment & Technology Reserve

The Equipment & Technology Reserve annual Operating Budget provision in 2015 is proposed to be \$1,147,900. Projects requiring funding from this reserve have increased significantly over the past number of budget cycles largely due to improved efforts to identify asset replacement needs and the desire to take advantage of new technology. A number of steps have been taken in the recent past to ensure that this is properly funded.

- In 2009 the Board's five year phase-in plan to improve reserve funding levels was completed. In total the annual provision grew by \$500,000 phased in with increments of \$100,000 per year over the five year period from 2005 to 2009.
- In 2012 a \$25,000 budget reallocation of existing budget dollars further increased annual reserve funding.



- The 2013 budget included another budget reallocation moving \$75,000 from annual Radio Reserve funding to the Equipment & Technology Reserve .This initiative was to help address rising capital asset replacement demands in a reserve that was forecasted to be in or near a deficit position for the next three years.
- The 2015 budget continues to address funding demands from this reserve by proposing a \$57,400 annual provision increase through a reallocation of existing approved equipment expenditure funding.

The balance in the reserve at the end of 2015 is projected to be \$170,628. Deficits are projected for 2016/17/18 however commitment to future projects is still under review.

Radio Reserve

The Radio Reserve, which is used to finance projects related portable and in-car radios and equipment, is currently funded by an annual Operating Budget provision of \$273,100. In 2008 reserve provisions were increased by \$176,000 with the reallocation of funds previously used for capital debt payments related to a radio upgrade project. The 2013 budget reduced annual provisions to this reserve by \$75,000 to \$273,100 to more closely match to project funding demands. Based on the reduced annual provision the balance in the reserve at the end of 2015 is projected to be \$541,579. Future short and long term projects are adequately funded based on current project estimates.

General Capital Reserve

In 2010 Council approved City Administration's proposal for the establishment of new Corporate-wide departmental capital reserves. This new initiative included a partial transfer of funds from the Reserve for Capital Project (RCE) to City departments. The purpose of the new reserve was to provide annual funding to departments for projects that would typically end up on a long list of discretionary RCE projects. The Police Service allocation was set at \$100,000 and has been used to be fund vehicle fleet additions. The 2014 operating budget improved funding into this reserve by including a \$158,200 increase to the annual provision. \$150,000 of this was a reallocation of existing operating budget funding while \$8,200 was linked to the budget growth package

The balance in the Police General Capital Reserve at the end of 2015 is projected to be a \$299,714. Based upon the new annual provision of \$258,200 this reserve is anticipated to adequately fund ongoing fleet addition demands.

Facilities Renovations

The Facilities Renovations Reserve is a source of funding primarily for renovations to existing facilities. Current annual funding is set at \$100,000 for renovations and \$50,000 for furniture replacement.



Renovation Provision

In 2008 this annual provision was decreased by \$150,000 as part of approved plans to build a new police headquarters building which in turn has lessened the demand for renovations to current facilities. The \$150,000 of reduced reserve funding was reallocated to offset the cost of newly acquired leased space. The balance in this portion of the reserve at the end of 2015 is projected to be \$530,091. Future short and long term projects are adequately funded based on current plans.

Furniture Replacement Provision

In 2009 funding into the Renovations Reserve was increased by \$30,000 reflective of a plan to reallocate into reserve a portion of the current annual operating budget base used for normal furniture replacement. Since 2009, \$30,000 has been placed in a capital reserve to replace existing furniture due for replacement based on industry standards for life expectancy of existing furniture items. In 2014 the annual provision to the furniture replacement component of the Facilities Renovations Reserve was increased by \$20,000 to \$50,000 through a reallocation of existing budget funding allowing for improved management of purchases currently split between operating and capital budgets.

Future plans are for annual replacement projects of \$50,000. The balance in this portion of the facilities reserve at the end of 2015 is projected to be depleted with expenditures matching annual contributions into the reserve. In the future it is anticipated that this reserve will also stay balanced at net zero with expenditures matching annual contributions

4. Capital Loans

The Police Service does not have any outstanding capital loans. Borrowing for the new headquarters building is dealt with as a Corporate loan.

Project Description

This project provides for the replacement and/or addition of police radio equipment.

General Comments

Radio communication is critical to police operations. The current fleet of police portable and in-car mobile radios has an anticipated useful life of approximately 9 years. This project addresses the eventual replacement of these essential communication assets. The 2015 capital budget calls for the replacement of 40 portable radios at an estimated cost of \$325,000.

In addition this project provides for the purchase of a recording Hub Server at a cost of \$186,000. Currently the SPS has separate data recorders for the police radios, 9-1-1 calls, video and GPS resulting in inefficient extraction of information for investigation and court purposes. The Hub Server would be able to store all data in a central location reducing the workload and errors associated with managing multiple locations. This technology also allows for increased ability to respond to the ever increasing demands for disclosure and accountability.

Operating Impact

2015 annual software license costs anticipated to increase by \$34,000.

Project Description

This project provides for the replacement of the Police payroli/timekeeping system.

General Comments

The Saskatoon Police Service payroll/timekeeping system was purchased 15 years ago and unfortunately has proven to be inadequate in terms of ongoing performance and function to meet user demands. The sub-standard performance has been experienced in a number of aspects including general design, report generation and vendor support.

The current payroll/timekeeping system, although usable, is not the software solution that was expected to assist in modernizing and improving the efficiency of Police Payroll. Many manual processes are required to provide the input and reporting of payroll information. In addition, integration with the Corporate Payroll/Human Resources and Budget systems would enhance position control and reduce other manual process and data entry duplication. A new system that provides improved payroll information capture and integration with other in-house and Corporate systems would greatly enhance payroll administration, control, reporting and analysis. As well it is anticipated that a new system would also improve and automate police operations in regards to personnel resource planning, scheduling and time management.

Prior Budget Approval:

The 2012 Capital Budget included the approval of \$50,000 to fund research of a software solution. Recent developments have led to plans to reduce software research costs by not hiring a consultant. In addition to our own independent research the SPS is in a unique position to gain product selection knowledge from other police agencies. Three western Canadian police agencies have recently purchased new payroll/timekeeping/scheduling systems and therefore it is anticipated that the SPS can gain significant product selection knowledge through these partner agencies.

2015 Budget Request: Additional software research is required to provide firm project cost estimates however based on research done to date it is anticipated that total project funding of \$290,000 (\$50,000 approved in 2012 plus \$240,000 requested for 2015) would cover the cost of software and allow for proper support for project implementation.

Operating Impact

2016 annual vendor software support costs are anticipated to be 15% of the initial software cost or in the range of \$15,000 to \$20,000.

The Saskatoon Police Service approved net operating budget for 2015 is \$80,066,200. This includes \$89,589,900 in gross expenditures and \$9,523,700 in anticipated revenues. Total net increases over 2014 amount to \$4,057,600 (5.34%) and have been broadly categorized into three major pressure point areas Base, Growth and Service Level Changes.

Base \$3,880,200 (5.10%)

Base increases are related to additional funding requirements to maintain existing service levels and deal with the impact of rising staff compensation costs, inflation and changing program needs. Also contained in this category is the operating impact for the second year occupancy of the New Police Headquarters Facility which is estimated to be \$1.2 million including Corporate Asset Management cross charges for maintenance, utilities, custodian costs and reserve contributions.

Growth \$309,400 (.41%)

Growth increases include is a position growth package totaling \$309,400 to fund 4 additional Constables to help address staffing demands in Patrol.

Service Level Changes \$ -132,000 (-.174%)

2015 Service Level Changes include the increase of 5 Provincial funded positions related to the new Integrated Traffic Unit. This will increase staff compensation and operating costs by \$672,000 which is offset by a corresponding increase in revenues. As well, a reduction of 2 Federal Government funded secondment positions will decrease expenditures by \$243,300 offset by a corresponding decrease in revenues.

REVENUE SUMMARY

Total revenues are budgeted to increase \$803,300 (9.2%) compared to 2014.

General Revenue sources are anticipated to increase \$133,600 (11%). The most significant changes include an \$82,800 increase in the volume of Criminal Record Revenue and a \$49,100 increase in revenue related to billing back the Regina Police Service (RPS) for Internet Child Exploitation (ICE) Unit expenses. The RPS manages Provincial wide operating funds for ICE Units.

Provincial Government revenue will increase \$954,000 (15%). The largest change is related to funding for the new Integrated Traffic Unit amounting to \$879,600. As well, the Province will provide improved funding of \$210,000 for existing Provincial positions. The other notable change is a \$145,800 decrease in the funding formula for the Sask911 Program.

Federal Government revenue will decrease \$284,300 (25.3%) largely related to the completion of two secondments one for International Peacekeeping and the other for the Department of National Defense.

EXPENDITURE SUMMARY

Staff Compensation

Staff Compensation is budgeted to increase \$2,811,300 (4.04%) over 2014.

Contractual salary and payroll costs are budgeted to increases \$2,371,000 including all negotiated settlements, a 2013/14/15 salary contingency for police personnel and the impact of a large number of less experienced staff moving up through negotiated pay levels.

Staffing changes include an increase of 5 Provincial positions adding \$474,000 in staff compensation costs while a decrease of 2 Federal Government secondment positions will reduce these expenditures by \$243,300. The addition of 4 new City funded positions in 2015 will increase staff compensation costs by \$288,000.

2015 Staff Complement

A net total of 6.5 new police positions are incorporated in the budget including 4 new City funded Patrol Constables, 5 positions for the new Provincial Integrated Traffic Unit, a decrease of 2 Federal Government secondments and the removal of .5 of a position related to a secondment to the new headquarters capital project. The total staff complement for 2015 is 640.1 positions.

2015 Approved Operating Budget – Summary

Operating Costs

Operating costs are budgeted to increase \$1,927,300 (14.2%) over 2014. Major pressure points impacting 2015 operating costs include the following:

- The new Police Headquarters Facility will have an operating impact estimated to be \$1,201,100 during the second full year of operation.
- Inflation will increase operating costs by an estimated \$179,300 including \$74,400 required to continue to phase in a different model patrol car as the production of the previous long time standard for the SPS has been discontinued. Other inflation impacts include rate increases of \$36,000 for insurance, \$22,300 for Commissionaire services and \$20,000 for prisoner meals.
- The new Provincial funded Integrated Traffic Unit will add \$198,000 to operating costs largely related to vehicles and equipment.
- Proposed staff increases of 4 new City funded Patrol Constables will result in a \$21,400 increase in operating costs mostly related to equipment and training needs.
- Other program operating cost increases amounting to \$334,700 are reflective of a number of rising operational demands most notably in technology & equipment. Include in this are Provincial mandated technology upgrades to the Sask911 system of \$157,800.

Debt Charges

The Service will not be carrying any debt charges in the 2015 Operating Budget.

Cost Recovery

Cost recovery is estimated to decrease by \$64,900 (25.1%) related to reducing the recovery of costs related to the position seconded to the new HQ project which ends part way through 2014.

Transfers to Reserves

Total transfers to reserves, capital and other, will increase \$57,400 (3.2%)

<u>Transfers to Capital Reserves – Capital Contributions</u>

The total annual provision to the Police Equipment & Technology Capital Reserves will increase by \$57,400 through a reallocation of existing approved equipment expenditure funding. This reallocation addresses Board approved policy that calls for the annual provision to capital reserves to be equal to the ten year average project cash flow requirement.

Total Transfer to Reserves

Budgeted transfers to reserves in 2015 will total \$1,837,200.

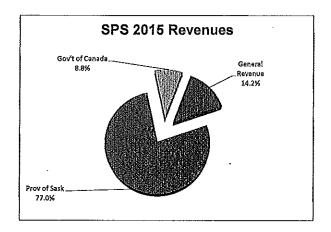
1. Budget Components

Revenue Sources

The Saskatoon Police Service 2015 operating budget includes \$9,523,700 in anticipated revenues. Province of Saskatchewan funding grants are the major source of this revenue accounting for \$7,332,700, 77% of total revenues. These grants fund programs such as the Provincial Enhanced Community Policing Program, the 911 emergency telephone answering program, the Child Center/Victim Services Program, the Internet Child Exploitation Unit (ICE) and the new Integrated Traffic Unit to name a few.

General Revenue sources account for \$1,349,700, 14.2 % of total revenues. Revenues in this category are generated from providing services such as managing false alarms, providing criminal record checks and disposing of lost and found items.

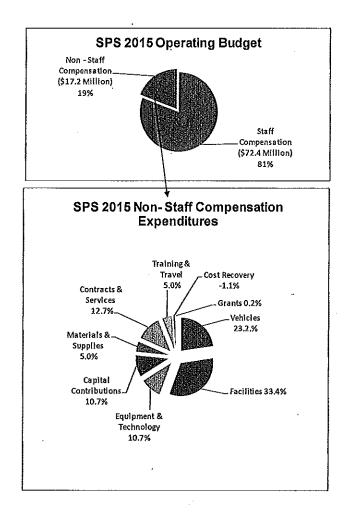
The final revenue source comes from the Federal Government accounting for \$841,300 8.8% of total revenues. This funding covers one position devoted to the national firearm enforcement program (NWEST), one position related to the RCMP's Canadian Center for Missing and Exploited Children and position secondments to the Combined Forces Special Enforcement Unit (CFSEU) and Integrated Proceeds of Crime.



Expenditure Categories

The Saskatoon Police Service 2015 operating budget includes \$89.6 million in gross expenditures. Staff compensation, which covers the cost of 640 positions, is the largest expenditure category accounting for 81% (\$72.4 million) of total expenditures. The remaining 19% (\$17.2 million) covers essential non-staff compensation expenditures such as vehicles, equipment, training, technology and facility operations.

As shown in the following graph, a significant proportion, 56.6% of non-staff compensation expenditures, are used to cover vehicles and facility related costs. The operating budget is also a source of funding for capital projects. In 2015, 10.7% of non-staff compensation expenditures are set aside to fund capital projects related to technology & equipment, police radios and vehicles as well as facility furnishings and renovations.

Revenues

Provincial Government revenue will increase \$954,000 (15%). The largest change is related to funding for the new Integrated Traffic Unit amounting to \$879,600. As well, the Province will provide improved funding of \$210,000 for existing Provincial positions. The other notable change is a \$145,800 decrease in the funding formula for the Sask911 Program.

Federal Government revenue will decrease \$284,300 (25.3%) largely related to the completion of two secondments one for International Peacekeeping and the other for the Department of National Defense.

Staff Compensation & Staffing

The 2015 budget includes \$72,422,700 in staff compensation expenditures, an increase of \$2,811,300 (4.04%) over 2014. This increase supports all negotiated salary and payroll cost increases as well as an increase of 6.5 positions.

The budgeted total staff complement for 2015 is 640.1 positions.

Staff Compensation Changes:

Contractual salary increases are budgeted at \$2,039,900 including all negotiated settlements, a 2013/14/15 salary contingency for police personnel and the impact of a large number of less experienced staff moving up through negotiated pay levels. In addition other related salary costs for, overtime, acting pay and vacation payouts will also increase reflective of negotiated increases and historical actual expenditures. Payroll costs related to existing staff will increase \$289,000 the net result of the impact of increased salary costs. Uniform related expenditures have been reclassified as staff compensation as directed by City Hall Finance. Expenditures for patrol member uniforms, officer safety equipment, and specialty uniforms for units such as Bicycle Patrol, K-9 and Traffic, are budgeted to decrease \$48,000 reflective of an overall reduction in needs which are cyclical.

An increase of 5 Provincial positions will add \$474,000 in staff compensation costs while a decrease of 2 Federal Government secondment positions will reduce these expenditures by \$243,300. The addition of 4 new City funded positions in 2015 will increase staff compensation costs by \$288,000. And finally, the secondment to the new HQ project ends part way through 2014 resulting in a \$65,200 reduction in staff compensation.

Non-Staff Compensation Expenditures

Total non-staff compensation expenditures are budgeted to total \$17,167,200 an increase of \$2,049,600 (13.56%) compared to 2014.

Major changes are as follows:

Vehicle - Operating & Maintenance

Vehicle related costs are budgeted to total \$3,988,600 an increase of \$267,000 (7.2%) compared to 2014. This funding supports capital replacement and operating costs for vehicles leased from the City's Vehicle & Equipment Branch, the cost of a small number of externally leased units as well as Air Support flight time. The most significant budget impact for 2015 is a \$177,600 increase in fleet costs related the new Provincial Integrated Traffic Unit. As well \$74,400 is required to continue to phase in a different model patrol car as the production of the previous long time standard for the SPS has been discontinued.

Facilities - Operating & Maintenance

Expenditures for facility operations, maintenance and telephones are budgeted to total \$5,776,200 an increase of \$1,349,500 (30.5%). This expenditure category includes all facility repairs, maintenance, utilities, telephones, custodian services and offsite leasing costs. The operating impact for the second year occupancy of the New Police Headquarters Facility is the largest factor impacting this category with total incremental costs estimated to be \$1,201,100.

Contracts & Services

Contracts and Services are budgeted at \$2,184,600 in 2015, an increase of \$141,500 (6.9%) compared to 2014. The most notable change is an \$84,200 increase in Commissionaire costs related contract rate increases and additional staffing needs for the new HQ. Other changes include general insurance rate increases of \$36,000.

Technology & Equipment

Technology and equipment related expenditures are budgeted to total \$1,838,900 an increase of \$370,600 (25.2%). The largest change is a \$144,000 expenditure increase related to workstation lease costs which are part of Provincial mandated technology upgrades to the Sask911. Also included in this expenditure category is the \$120,000 cost for a new initiative related to a printer services contract. This contract will result in a net savings of \$38,300 in office supply and photocopying costs. Other increases in this category are varied and include \$86,500 related to additional computer license & support contracts.

Training & Travel

Training and travel expenditures are budgeted at \$843,000 in 2015, a \$700 (.1%) decrease compared to 2014. Service wide training funds are budgeted at \$743,600 covering a variety of needs such as funds to support the need to train officers filling attrition vacancies in specialized positions, as well as to address the demands for up to date, ongoing training in areas such as management best practices, investigative techniques, major case management, crime prevention and emergency preparedness. Travel expenditures are budgeted to increase \$10,000 related to the new Provincial Integrated Traffic Unit.

Materials & Supplies

\$866,600 has been budgeted for expenditures on materials and supplies, a decrease of \$214,600 (19.8%) compared to 2014. Notable changes include is a \$158,300 reduction in office supply and photocopying costs as a result of moving to a printer services contract and a \$65,100 reduction in on-time costs to stock up the new HQ.

Transfers to Reserves

Total transfers to reserves, capital and other, will increase \$57,400 (3.2%)

<u>Transfers to Capital Reserves – Capital Contributions</u>

The total annual provision to the Police Equipment & Technology Capital Reserves will increase by \$57,400 through a reallocation of existing approved equipment expenditure funding. This reallocation addresses Board approved policy that calls for the annual provision to capital reserves to be equal to the ten year average project cash flow requirement.

Total Transfer to Reserves

Budgeted transfers to reserves in 2015 will total \$1,837,200.

Grants/Subsidies

Grants/Subsidies are budgeted to total \$26,000 in 2015 an amount set aside to support the Police Pipes and Drums Band. This budget item has been increased by \$14,000 to address uniform and equipment replacement needs.

Debt Charges

The Service will not be carrying any debt charges in the 2015 Operating Budget.

Cost Recovery

This budget category reflects a number of cost recovery situations including, staff parking fees, recovery of travel costs related to Saskatchewan Police College and Canadian Police College courses. Cost recovery is estimated to decrease by \$64,900 (25.1%) related to reducing the recovery of costs related to the position seconded to the new HQ capital project which ends part way through 2014.

2015 Operating Budget - Position Justifications

Patrol Division - Constables (4)

Justification

Eight new Constable positions are required to deal with the rapid growth in Saskatoon and surrounding area. Final City Council approval has provided funding for four of the eight proposed positions.

Based on the City of Saskatoon reported estimated population our current police to population ratio is 179 officers per 100,000 population. The addition of 8 officers will bring that ratio up to 182 officers per 100,000 population. The 10 year average police to population ratio for Saskatoon has been 184 officers per 100,000 population.

StatsCan reported the Canadian average police to population ration in 2011 was 201 officers per 100,000 population. Saskatoon's ratio was 188 officers per 100,000 population in 2011.

Measurable /Expected Results

Maintain adequate response times and a visible police presence in our growing city and to allow for incremental growth of the Police Service. These additional officers will help keep our police to population ratio from falling to a level that the Saskatoon Police Service Administration feels is not adequate for policing Saskatoon.

Consequences/Risks/Impacts

Remaining at our current staffing level while the population of Saskatoon is growing will cause a continued decrease in our police to population ratio which has historically related to an increase in the reported crime rate. This may also result in the need to hire a large number of officers at some point in the future which may create challenges in terms of initial training at the Saskatchewan Police College and our field training program.

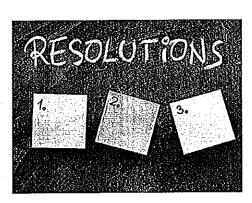
