## **INDUCTION CEREMONIES FOR MAYOR AND COUNCILLORS**

After salutations were extended, the Councillors took their seats and His Worship the Mayor took his seat on the dais. His Worship the Mayor invited the members of the Administration, City Manager Richards, City Solicitor Dust, General Manager Corporate Services Veltkamp, General Manager Community Services Gauthier, General Manager Fire and Protective Services Hewitt, General Manager Infrastructure Services Uzelman and General Manager Utility Services Munch, to take their seats within the Bar.

I want to extend a warm welcome to the new City Council. We have a very interesting blend of rookies and veterans, and I am excited to be a part of this Council. We are well positioned, I believe, to do great work on behalf of Saskatoon.

In addition, I want to thank the previous Council for an interesting and eventful term. I particularly thank former Mayor Henry Dayday for his unfaltering commitment to Saskatoon. He served 12 years as Mayor and 12 years as Alderman prior to that. Henry, on behalf of the citizens of Saskatoon, I thank you. We trust we have your continued support in the future.

My remarks would not be complete without an affirmation of support for City Manager Phil Richards and Senior Administration. Politicians may indeed wield power and control with respect to decision-making, but I cannot think of a single politician who knows how to run this city. We trust in you and your staff and we rely on our civic employees to get the job done.

Ladies and Gentlemen, I have just taken an oath before you that sets out the duties of the Chief Executive Officer of the City. I suggest that oath is not only mine, but ours, together. Join me in a pledge to ensure adequate housing and job opportunities, elements that secure a sense of ownership and pride, and join me in a pledge to see that our ever-increasing elderly population may live in comfort, dignity and safety . These are not lofty objectives, largely out of reach. They are basic. To me, they are fundamental objectives that should be common to all.

In this City, in this time, no child need be hungry, no child need be uneducated, no child need be unsheltered, no child need work on our streets in the most horrific of trades, and not a single person need live in fear. Yet, with all we have today, these things are permitted to occur. We, who answered the call for change, must be that change.

As part of a plan to engineer meaningful change, I shall be acting in the future:

- to establish a stronger co-operative relationship with the Province of Saskatchewan;
- to earn the respect, trust and honour of aboriginal people and work honestly with aboriginal governments;

- to continue improvements in civic labour relations;
- to immediately address crime and security concerns in our westside downtown inner city;
- to achieve employment equity targets;
- to restore confidence in the Saskatoon Police Service and to build consensus for a communitybased policing model;
- to work closely with business leaders and community stakeholders to identify economic development opportunities, attract investment, and market our city to the world;
- to encourage review of the property tax structure; and
- to strengthen existing partnerships and pursue new ones.

My motivation is simple. We act today for future benefit.

And, if I ever become tired, impatient, or disillusioned, I need only to glance at a photograph of my children and their children. I am reminded instantly why I choose to do this.

So, onward with change. It is the will of the people.

In closing, I wish to acknowledge the presence this evening of my closest supporters:

- my son Kelly;
- my own ray of sunshine, Roberta, and her sons Jason and Joshua; and, as well,
- governmental and community leaders who grace this gathering with their presence; and
- most importantly, I acknowledge the presence of ordinary citizens of Saskatoon. It is you who we represent."
