E1) Capital Projects 0836 – Arterial Road Preservation and Capital Project 2249 – Arterial Roadway Reconstruction Award of Tender –Resurfacing - Circle Drive and Millar Avenue (Files: CK. 6315-1 and IS. 6000-04-04)

RECOMMENDATION:

- 1) that the tender submitted by ASL Paving Ltd. (Option 1) for the resurfacing of Circle Drive and Millar Avenue, at an total estimated cost of \$2,313,603.65 (including P.S.T. and G.S.T.) be accepted; and
- 2) that His Worship the Mayor and the City Clerk be authorized to execute the contract documents, as prepared by the City Solicitor, under the corporate seal.

REPORT

Capital Projects 0836 – Arterial Road Preservation and 2249 – Arterial Roadway Reconstruction include approved funding for the resurfacing of Circle Drive and Millar Avenue in the amount of \$1,775,000 These capital projects are also funding other resurfacing and reconstruction projects throughout the City. In addition, \$575,000 is available from the Province through the Urban Highway Connector Program for the work on Circle Drive.

Tenders for ultra thin overlay and resurfacing of Circle Drive and Millar Avenue were received and opened publicly on May 4, 2011.

The Request for Tenders included four segments of work as follows:

- Segment 1: Overlaying the existing roadway between Faithful Avenue and Millar Avenue, in both directions, with a relatively thin layer of Type 9 hot mix asphalt. This work is expected to take approximately eight working days to complete, and will be permitted during normal construction shifts (9:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.). Some work may be completed between 6:30 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. to facilitate construction phasing and reduce the impact on the local businesses.
- Segment 2: Conversion of the westbound curb lane of Circle Drive between Faithful Avenue and Idylwyld Drive to a concrete roadway. Concrete has been chosen for this section due to the high volume of truck traffic. While the initial capital cost for the

concrete is approximately double that of standard asphalt, it is projected to have a lower life cycle cost due to the heavy traffic loading. The concrete work is expected to take between five to eight days to complete, and will require two lanes to be closed while the work is being done, and one lane to be closed for an additional seven days while the concrete cures. Construction on this segment will be permitted during normal daytime construction shifts (9:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.).

- Segment 3: Resurfacing of Circle Drive between Avenue C and Faithful Avenue, which will take approximately eight working days or nights to complete. It included two options.
 - Option 1: Work to be done during normal daytime construction shifts (9:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.), with no closures occurring between 6:30 a.m. and 9:00 a.m.
 - Option 2: Work on Circle Drive to be done at night, between 6:30 p.m. and 6:30 a.m.
- Segment 4: Resurfacing of Millar Avenue between Molaro Drive and 60th Street. The resurfacing is expected to take 12 to 16 working days to complete and will be permitted during normal daytime construction shifts (9:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.). Some work may be completed between 6:30 a.m. and 9:00 a.m. to facilitate construction phasing and reduce the impact on the local businesses.

Two tenders were received from the following firms:

- ASL Paving Ltd., Saskatoon, SK; and
- Central Asphalt and Paving Inc., Saskatoon SK.

The Administration is recommending that the low bid from ASL Paving Ltd. be approved.

The quote from ASL Paving for the two options (work during the daytime and work during the night) is as follows:

<u>OPTION 1 (Daytime)</u> <u>OPTION 2 (Night)</u> \$2,313,603.65 \$2,451,637.35

Approved funding for this project, including funding allocated from the Urban Highway Connector Program, is \$2,350,000. Postponing some of the other resurfacing projects scheduled for 2011 will provide adequate funding to complete the work as outlined in Option 1. These projects include:

- Reducing the resurfacing of Preston Avenue between Taylor Street and Armistice Bay by 140 linear meters;
- Reducing the resurfacing of Cumberland Avenue between 8th Street and 12th Street by 160 linear meters; and

• Postponing the overlay on Taylor Street between Arlington Avenue and Acadia Drive to 2012.

If Option 2 is approved (doing the work on Circle Drive at night), another resurfacing project will need to be postponed and rescheduled in the future. Currently, the lowest priority location is Cumberland Avenue, from 12^{th} Street to 8^{th} Street.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The net cost to the City for the low bid submitted by ASL Paving Ltd., for both options, is as follows:

Reducing and rescheduling some of the other resurfacing projects, as outlined above, will provide adequate funding for Option 1.

If Option 2 is approved, resurfacing of Cumberland Avenue from 12th Street to 8th Street will also need to be postponed and rescheduled in the future.

As part of the Public Works Branch snow removal operation, a large wheel loader is rented each year. Over the 2010/2011 season, a 2010 Caterpillar 980H Wheel Loader was rented from Kramer Ltd., for a rental fee of \$120,000 over a four-month period. In an effort to recover the investment made towards this unit, and recognizing that this is an annual operational need, Vehicle and Equipment Services requested that Kramer Ltd. submit a proposed sale agreement, with the provision of a trade-in of the City's older wheel loader which was identified for replacement in the 2010 Capital Budget.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The net cost to the City, as quoted by Kramer Ltd., for the purchase of the previously rented wheel loader, with a provision of a trade-in unit is as follows:

BACKGROUND

The Assistance to Community Groups – Cash Grants program has an annual budget of \$5,000 for environmental initiatives. A competition for these funds is conducted each year, and

recommendations for amounts to be awarded are made to the Administration and Finance Committee, for referral to City Council for approval.

REPORT

Eight grant applications were received this year, with the total amount requested being \$23,900. Submissions were evaluated using the established criteria outlined in the grant applications and contained in the City of Saskatoon Policy C03-018, which states that:

Priority will be given to:

- a) Projects rather than operational funding;
- b) Partnership projects that involve more than one group;
- c) Projects that have a broad (e.g. city-wide) impact rather than a limited (e.g. neighbourhood) impact; and
- d) Projects that are completed in the year the funding is awarded.

The following is a summary of the grant applications, requested funding, and Administration's recommended allocation. An evaluation committee considered the relative merit of each submission against the evaluation criteria and the available funds (\$5,000).

- 1. Saskatoon Zoo Society Inc. Operational funding. Request: \$2500. Recommendation: \$0.
- 2. Living Sky Wildlife Rehabilitation Inc. Operational funding. Request: \$2,000. Recommendation: \$0.
- 3. Saskatchewan Environmental Society Operational funding. Request: \$1,000. Recommendation: \$1,000.
- 4. Saskatoon Nature Society Operational funding. Request: \$5,000. Recommendation: \$0.
- 5. Road Map Saskatoon Project funding for bike valet services for community events. Request: \$2,000. Recommendation: \$2,000.
- 6. Varsity View Community Association Project funding for community garden. Request: \$3,500. Recommendation: \$500.
- 7. Holliston Community Association Project funding for Schools Planting a Legacy in Trees. Request: \$900. Recommendation: \$0.
- 8. Agriculture in the Classroom (Sask) Inc. Project funding for summer garden program. Request: \$7,000. Recommendation: \$1,500.

OPTIONS

Council may allocate the \$5000 in an alternative manner among the applicants.

The proposed allocation will utilize the budgeted funds for 2011.

The projects recommended for allocation of the cash grant are associated with initiatives that address specific environmental needs – source water protection, reduction of greenhouse gas emissions and local food production. The projects also have strong educational and public awareness components, promoting environmental sustainability within the community. The overall impact on greenhouse gas emissions resulting from these projects is unknown; however, it can be assumed that the facilitation of sustainable transportation and the development of local garden and green space initiatives will result in greenhouse gas emission reductions.

Mr. Peter Gerrard, Executive Director, Cosmopolitan Industries Inc., provided a brief history on Cosmo's activities and outlined the contractual obligations with the City. He noted that there are safety concerns with employees regarding glass contamination in the paper.

Mr. James Gillis spoke on behalf of Family and Friends of Cosmo and Elmwood Inc. He addressed the no-harm policy to Cosmo and expressed concerns with a co-mingled system and job security of employees.

Mr. Michael Stensrud indicated that he is not satisfied with the City's no-harm policy and suggested the City focus on recycling services that are best for the environment. He referenced a magazine article entitled "Newsprint on the Orient Express". He also noted that Cosmo is a paper processor not a paper collector.

Mr. Jim McClements, parent of a child with disabilities, spoke regarding the quality of community and the impact that some of the decisions may have on the employees of Cosmo noting that other communities aspire to provide a similar program to Cosmo.

Mr. Howard Stensrud provided a brief history regarding recycling in the city and dispelled some of the myths surrounding Cosmo Industries.

Mr. Ken Gryschuk, Cosmopolitan Industries, indicated that Cosmo Industries is a paper processor and expressed concerns with a single-stream collection system. He asked that Council consider Cosmo employees when making its decisions.

Mr. Jerome Nicol, Executive Director, Community Living Association Saskatoon, expressed support for Cosmo Industries and the programs it offers for the community and recycling.

Ms. Shelley Bartram, Executive Director, Elmwood Residences, indicated that she does not support a single-stream recycling program and expressed support for the program that Cosmo Industries provides to the community.

Mr. Alan Hunter expressed concern with a co-mingled system indicating that it would have a negative impact to Cosmo Industries. He encouraged a dual-stream system.

Mr. Ernest Boyko, Executive Director, Cheshire Homes, expressed health and safety concerns of a co-mingled collection system with glass contamination.

Ms. Gillian Smith spoke regarding the programs that Cosmo Industries offers for people with disabilities and asked that Council remember the 40 years of community service Cosmo provided.

Mr. Aaron Loraas, Loraas Disposal, indicated that Loraas has approximately 4,000 subscribers for its blue bin service and the rate is increasing. He raised three key points: the principle of issuing a fair and reasonable Request For Proposal, agreement with the provision to support Cosmo as a non-profit organization as long as Cosmo does not become a competitor, and concern regarding the performance outcomes and whether they can be achieved with four different companies providing the same services.

Mr. Dwight Grayston, Curbside Recycling, expressed a need for the City to move forward with a curbside recycling program. He indicated that Curbside currently works with Cosmo, providing them with the fibre product.

Mr. Alexandre Akoulov expressed support for a mandatory recycling program in Saskatoon.

Mr. Maxim Gertler-Jaffe expressed support for a mandatory recycling program in Saskatoon. He provided a DVD presentation of a music video he produced with a classmate in high school entitled "Love to Love You Landfills".

Ms. Sheri Praski spoke regarding the cost of garbage and encouraged the City to move forward with a Request For Proposal for a curbside recycling program.

Ms. Karen Rooney and Ms. Taylor Yee expressed support for a curbside recycling program in the city.
