



Community Association Awareness

In 2021, the City's Neighbourhood Services and Marketing departments began work on a plan to introduce Saskatoon's Community Associations. In addition to highlighting Community Associations' accomplishments, this plan also aimed to help recruit volunteers and increase participation in Community Association programming.

Since 2021, different initiatives have been undertaken to accomplish these goals. Past initiatives include radio ads, billboards, published articles and increased presence at special events around the City, such as the White Buffalo Youth Lodge's Backpack Giveaway & Carnival and the Nutrien Fireworks Festival. This summer, community consultants and volunteers also visited summer play programs, handing out bubbles to the kids and talking to community members about the fantastic work being done by volunteers in their neighbourhood.

In late 2022, the City of Saskatoon initiated a grant program for Community Associations to purchase branded promotional items with their logo – like a tablecloth or banner – to use at events and programs. In total, 31 out of 47 Associations took advantage of this program and purchased items.

Together, these initiatives will let the residents of Saskatoon and each individual community know about the hard work Community Association volunteers put in each month to bring neighbours together and strengthen their communities.

The RedBall Project

The RedBall Project bounced into Saskatoon as part of the City's Placemaker Program last spring, attracting crowds, social media influencers and sparking conversations about the value of public art.

Thanks to collaboration of the Downtown, Riversdale and Broadway business improvement districts (BIDs) and the work of more than 20 volunteers, the one-of-a-kind inflatable mobile sculpture was installed at a new site each day within the BID's zones

SaskJazz Shuttle Receives Saskatchewan Lotteries Community Grant

The SaskTel Saskatchewan Jazz Festival's brand-new shuttle service was a terrific success and has instantly become a must have for festival patrons. Thanks to a \$6,000 Saskatchewan Lotteries Community Grant, support from SGI and funding from the Saskatchewan Lotteries Trust Fund and the City of Saskatoon, the shuttle service ran for all 10 days of the 2023 festival.

Festival goers could catch a ride, free of charge, to the festival site in Victoria Park from stops at the Broadway Theatre, The James Hotel, Persephone Theatre and the corner of Avenue D and 20th Street West. Two school buses drove the route continuously until the festival closed at 11 p.m. each evening. The shuttle system relieved traffic and parking congestion around the festival site, while also lessening some of the festival's environmental impact.

The new Accessibility Volunteer Team offered rides to patrons with mobility concerns from the festival gates to their seats. The new fleet of golf carts was an excellent addition to the shuttle project, allowing all patrons to easily access the park despite a steep incline at the north gate and the long distance between the south gate and the parking lot.

Police Chief Troy Cooper brought greetings from the Saskatoon Police Service and David Arnot spoke on behalf of the Saskatchewan Human Rights Commission. The City of Saskatoon supported the event with funding through the Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Advisory Committee's cosponsorship fund.

World Refugee Day 2023

June 20 is World Refugee Day, an international day designated by the United Nations to honour refugees and to celebrate the strength and courage of people who have been forced to flee their home country to escape conflict or persecution.

The Saskatoon Refugee Coalition organizes an annual World Refugee Day event for the community of Saskatoon. This year, Métis Senator and Elder Nora Cummings opened the event with a prayer before His Worship Charlie Clark, Mayor of Saskatoon, offered greetings on behalf of the City. Speakers this year included a woman who fled South Sudan many years ago, as well as a young man who came from Syria with his family. Both shared their powerful stories of escape and what the day means to them.

Performers for the event were also those with lived refugee experience. The Karen Community presented a beautiful traditional dance and a small group of young women sang as the Voices of Afghanistan.

The Insurance 101 workshop was facilitated by insurance brokers who offered advice on the best questions to ask when choosing an insurance policy and how to ensure the policy will suit the Community Association's needs. The Treasurer's Workshop guided treasurers through the budgeting process and accounting basics, skills that would help any volunteer both new and experienced.

At the President's Workshop, a panel of volunteers with between three and 20 years of experience answered presidents' questions and offered advice from their experience.
