

## About FLYING DUST FIRST NATION

Flying Dust First Nation (FDFN) is located on the northeast side of the City of Meadow Lake, Saskatchewan. The area is home to some of the most fertile farmland in northern Saskatchewan. Flying Dust First Nation is one of nine First Nations that comprise the Meadow Lake Tribal Council (MLTC). Flying Dust First Nation people are descendants of the Algonquian linguistic group with Cree as their native language. Being located close to Meadow Lake provides a number of employment opportunities for members and also provides opportunities for economic investment ([www.flyingdust.net](http://www.flyingdust.net)).

### HIGHLIGHTS AND OPPORTUNITIES

- Flying Dust First Nation (*Kopahawakenum*) is a member of Treaty 6 and became a signatory on August 26, 1876.
- Flying Dust First Nation is located approximately 300km northwest of Saskatoon. It is accessible via Highway 55, a vital access route for northern Saskatchewan communities.
- In June 2013, citizens overwhelmingly supported a deal that would see the Nation establish its own law-making powers over its reserve lands, resources, and the environment through the First Nation Land Management Act (FNLMA).
- FDFN's home reserve is comprised of seven land parcels that cover more than 20 thousand acres in the heart of some of the most fertile prairie farmland.
- Under the Treaty Land Entitlement (TLE) structure, the band is entitled to purchase an additional 18,441.56 acres of land (as of 2020).
- FDFN purchased 100 acres of land south of Saskatoon near Highway #11, which was designated as a reserve in 2024.
- Flying Dust partnered with Meadow Lake Tribal Council and miEnergy in 2022 to prioritize renewable energy.



## HOME RESERVE INFORMATION

### Location

The home reserve is located adjacent to Meadow Lake, approximately 300km north of Saskatoon.

### Services

Facilities on-reserve include the Kopahawakenum School (PreK-8), health clinic, Elders building, administration building, bank, community hall, community church, health office, a youth centre, youth employment and skills program, market garden, infrastructure and maintenance compound, daycare, hockey arena, gas station and convenience store. Many other services are located in the adjacent city of Meadow Lake.

### Education

Kopahawakenum Elementary School was officially opened on November 25, 2005. Currently the school has pre-Kindergarten to Grade 4 classes but will be expanding soon to host students up to Grade 9.

Kopahawakenum has a strong emphasis in developing language arts skills through enriching programs that take students out of the classroom, providing meaningful experiences.

Kopahawakenum Elementary School is in a partnership with Meadow Lake Tribal Council that is strengthening student understanding of Land, Language, Relationship and Culture.
