STEPHEN BULAT – Stage Manager, Technical Director/Lighting Designer

Stephen has worked as a producer, composer, sound/lighting designer, musical director and musician for 25 years. Companies include Arts Club, Bard On The Beach, Pacific Theatre, and the shameless hussy productions. He is also very active performing and booking musicians for private events.

Lana has worked creating, designing and coordinating costumes for the past 30+ years. Starting out as the head of wardrobe for the Arts Club Theatre, Lana then moved into film. She is most known for Star Trek Beyond (2016), Deadpool 2 (2018) and The A-Team (2010). Lana is a founding member of shameless hussy productions.

About Shameless Hussy Productions

Established in 1995, shameless hussy productions is a company of rebellious, self-producing, theatre artists co-founded by ensemble members Renée Iaci, Deb Pickman and costume designer Lana Krause along with creative associates Ion Brand Design and Shift Consulting. The company was later joined by photography firm Pink Monkey Studios, musician Stephen Bulat and ensemble member Daune Campbell. Current Managing Producer Renée Iaci also performs double duty as Director and Tour Coordinator.

Since 1995 the company has had more than 1,000 performances and developed and produced 8 original plays. The majority of productions have premiered in Vancouver and then gone on to tour Canada and the Pacific Northwest. The company has performed in six Canadian provinces and four American states.

The shameless hussy mission is:

"telling provocative stories about women, to inspire the hand that rocks the cradle to rock the world."

All of shameless hussy's plays have been produced on the unceded Indigenous territory of Musqueam, Squamish, Tsleil-Waututh and Kwikwetlem Nations. Since they tour across Canada and into the US, they have performed on many other traditional Indigenous territories.

About Love Bomb



Love Bomb is a play with music produced by Vancouverbased shameless hussy productions. The production has won numerous awards across Western Canada – this is the first time the play has come to Saskatoon.

The topics covered in Love Bomb include:

Human trafficking - the recruitment, transportation, transfer, harbouring, or receipt of people through force, fraud, or deception with the aim of exploiting them for profit. Men, women, and children of all ages and from all backgrounds can become victims of this crime, which occurs in every region of the world. People without support systems - such as those fleeing unstable homes, abuse, or other trauma - are often targeted.

Sexual exploitation - refers to any person profiting (financially or otherwise) from the sexual use of another person's body. Perpetrators of sexual exploitation take advantage of their victims' vulnerable or dependent state, including addictions to drugs or alcohol.

"Love bombing" - the ways in which traffickers initially shower their victims with affection, creating an illusion of love. Eventually the traffickers demand that their victims demonstrate their gratitude and repay this "love" by doing what the trafficker asks.

Love Bomb is based on real life criminal cases although the characters are fictional. The suggested audience is 14+. A Study Guide is available at **saskatoon.ca/LoveBomb**.



STEVE CHARLES – Composer/Musical Director

Steve Charles is a musician, performer, composer and musical director from Vancouver. Highlights of the past few years include: Galala; national francophone TV show, Urinetown at the Firehall, Avenue Q at the Arts Club, Brief Encounter at the Playhouse/MTC, International tours of Dance Marathon at Bluemouth Inc., Pacifique en Chanson, Chant Ouest and arranging and performing for Chelsea Hotel by the Escape Artists. He recently co-produced and MD'd Miss Shakespeare and J. Caesar with Tracey Power. He tours internationally with various bands and is active in Vancouver's music scene.

DAUNE CAMPBELL -Actor (Lillian)

Daune has been a shameless hussy since 2003 in the west coast premiere of Marion Bridge. For the next ten years she was Managing Co-Artistic Director, producing and performing in productions such as Loveplay and Silence as well as touring with Summer Of My Amazing Luck, Woman-Idiot-Lunatic-Criminal and Sonofabitch Stew: the drunken life of Calamity Jane. During that time, Daune also toured North America with Green Thumb Theatre for Young People and performed in several co-op and Fringe Festival productions. In 2011, she took a leap and became the tour coordinator at Axis Theatre Company. She is now the General Manager of Axis Theatre and continues to pursue an administrative and performance career.

A graduate of Studio 58, Daune is thrilled to be back on stage with Love Bomb, having completed an extensive tour in 2022 and a filmed version in 2020. Always a firm believer that theatre can change the world, Daune is grateful to have a career in the arts and to perform in and advocate for powerful plays by women that inspire the hand that rocks the cradle to rock the world.

RENÉE IACI – Director

Renée is co-artistic director, tour coordinator, and one of the founding members of shameless hussy productions. She is also a company member of Delta Stageworks. Her directing credits include the shameless hussy Jessie Richardson award-winning production of Frozen (Outstanding Actor), as well as Woman Idiot Lunatic Criminal, My Left Breast, Son of a Bitch Stew, the drunken life of Calamity Jane, and Evan Placey's hit play, Girls Like That. Renée was nominated for "Outstanding Director" at the 2014 Jessie Richardson Awards for Dissolve by Meghan Gardiner. Dissolve continues to tour North America on both the west coast and east coast. Renée directed To Perfection by Meghan Gardiner that premiered at the Surrey Arts Centre this past fall and will be presented at the Genesis Theatre this November.

Renée is the Director of Love Bomb. This show has won an Ovation for outstanding production and has partnered with the RCMP touring with four different casts since 2016.

Renée is a graduate of the BFA Acting program at UBC and mother to up-and-coming hussy, Sofia Reid.



MEGHAN GARDINER – Writer

Meghan is an actor and playwright who has written plays for Green Thumb Theatre, Carousel Theatre, shameless hussy productions. Gateway Theatre, and who independently toured her one woman show Dissolve across North America for over twelve years. Meghan was nominated for the YWCA Women of Distinction Awards in 2011 and received the Sydney Risk Award for Emerging playwright at the 2012 Jessie Awards. She has written two screenplays; both garnering her screenwriting nominations at BC's Leo Awards and she is currently working on commissions for both the Arts Club Theatre and Carousel Theatre. She was most recently seen on stage in the Arts Club's productions of The Sound of Music and The Cull and can be found on screen in various BC-filmed TV shows.

Post-Production Discussion Panel

Saskatoon Significance

Tragically, the issues explored in Love Bomb are not new or unfamiliar in this community. Indigenous women and girls are disproportionately affected by human trafficking, sexual exploitation, and "love bombing". There are numerous families in Saskatoon – Indigenous and non-Indigenous – that have been impacted.



How Can I Help?

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IDENTIFY THE SIGNS

- Sudden interest in an older man
- · Having no money and yet suddenly wearing new clothing, jewelry
- Frequent sleepovers at a "friend's" house
- Sudden change in style of dress, make-up, appearance
- New circle of friends and isolation from old circle
- Change in attitude towards school, friends, regular activities
- Plummeting grades
- Unexplained cuts or bruises
- Using two cell phones

REPORT A TIP

Anonymous info can be reported to Saskatoon Crime Stoppers at 1-800-222-8477. You can also file a police report by calling the Saskatoon Police Service at 306-975-8300.

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SPREAD THE WORD

Raise awareness of human trafficking through credible social media platforms and by sharing and displaying human trafficking resources. Share what you learned at the Love Bomb play + discussion panel.

THINK BEFORE YOU SHOP

Consider how you shop and eat. Who made your clothes? Who prepared your food? Avoid spending money on any goods which may been produced by a child or forced labor.

VOLUNTEER OR DONATE LOCALLY

Ask anti-trafficking organizations like **<u>Hope Restored</u>** how you can support them. They might need volunteer or financial support, or assistance with an awareness event.

STAY INFORMED

Stay up to date about what's happening in our community and beyond. Keep attuned to critical updates and information on human trafficking.



MAKE USE OF TRAINING

Take advantage of any learning or training opportunities to advance your understanding of these issues.



RAISE YOUR VOICE

Ask community leaders and representatives how they're addressing human trafficking. Let them know what we need. Become an advocate for meeting basic needs like housing and transportation for all persons in our community. As well as systemic changes that better support vulnerable people and putting an end to the perpetuating circumstances that continue to make them vulnerable.
