

2 Saskatchewan Craft Council

813 Broadway Avenue

Built in 1912 as a Royal Bank, this historic space has housed the Craft Council since 1990. It now showcases local talent through exhibitions and a curated shop of handmade works.

3 Broadway Theatre

715 Broadway Ave

Opened in 1946, this art deco gem became Canada's only community-owned repertory theatre in 1993 after locals rallied to save it. Today, it remains a vital hub for film, music, and live performance in Saskatchewan's arts scene.

4 Broadway Door Décor Walking Tour

639 Broadway Avenue

This 50-minute outdoor walk turns ten alley doors into vibrant canvases. Blending art design with community spirit, it reveals Broadway as a living, evolving work of art. Meet in front of Ecole Victoria School on the hour.

5 Broadway Heritage Walking Tour

614 Broadway Ave

Take a 50-minute walk through Saskatoon's roots. With heritage architecture, local shops, and public art, Broadway tells a story of resilience, innovation, and community spirit. Meet at Five Corners on Broadway Avenue – 12th Street W on the hour.

6 Grace Westminster United Church

505 10th Street East

Built in 1927 on the site of Saskatoon's first church, this historic sanctuary features stunning stained glass and one of the city's last remaining Casavant pipe organs. A 1967 addition reflects its growth and deep community roots.

7 Marr Residence

326 11th Street East

Built in 1884, this is Saskatoon's oldest house on its original site. It served as a field hospital during the 1885 Riel Resistance and is now a municipal and national historic site.

8 Shrine (Khram) of Blessed Nun Martyrs Olympia & Laurentia

215 Avenue M South

This ornate shrine honours two beatified Sisters of St. Joseph. Inside, you'll find Eastern iconography, custom chandeliers, and a Vatican-authorized replica of the Shroud of Turin.

9 Riversdale Walking Tour

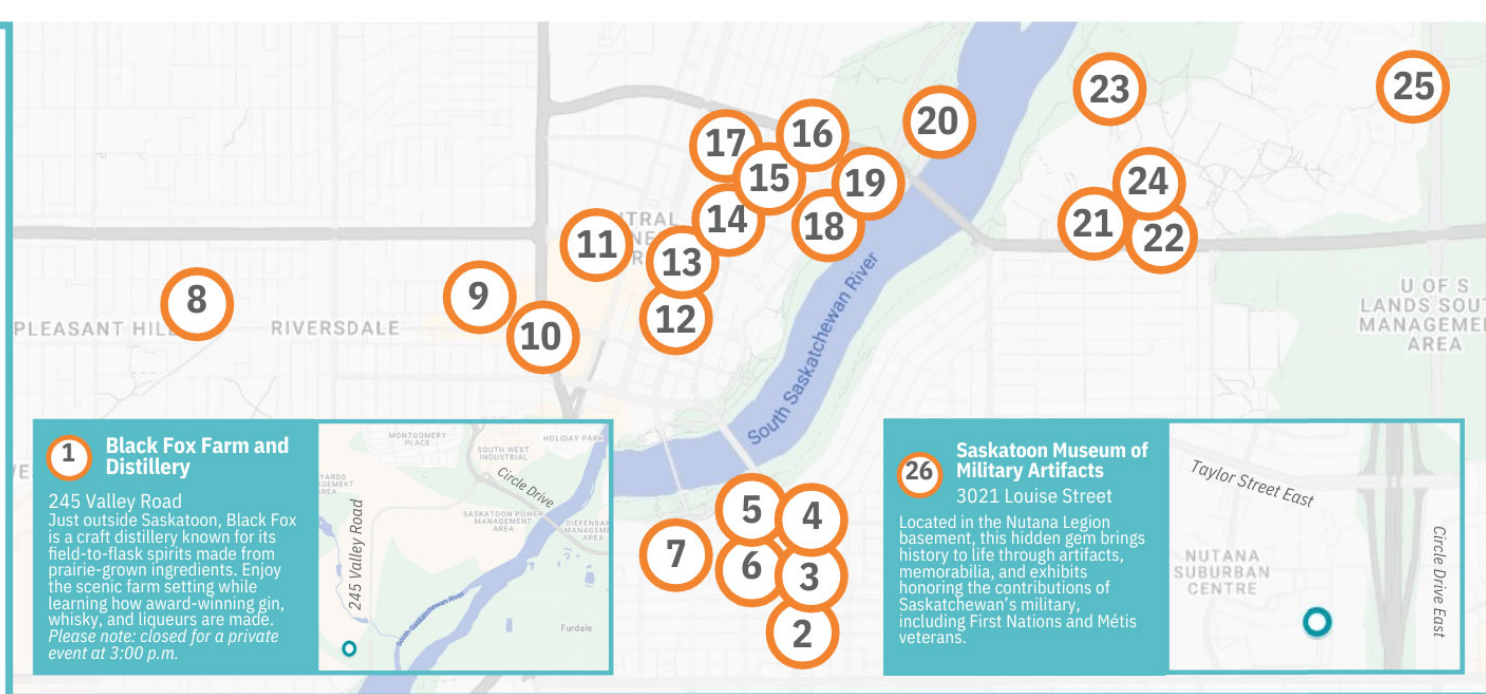
201 20th Street West

Join us for an educational tour along 20th Street West, exploring the people, places, and landmarks of Riversdale from its 1930s heyday to 2005. The Riversdale Walking Tour is on the hour. (Meet at the SW corner of 20th Street and Avenue M.)

10 Cohen's Beer Republic

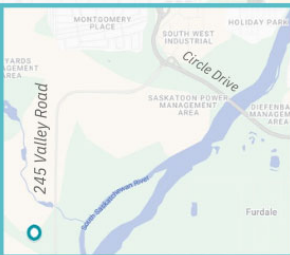
101 20th Street West

This award-winning design adds vibrant energy to Riversdale with its striking curvature. Completed in 1973, it offers panoramic views of the City Centre and a lively atmosphere ideal for people-watching.



1 Black Fox Farm and Distillery

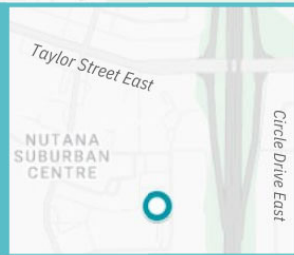
245 Valley Road
Just outside Saskatoon, Black Fox is a craft distillery known for its field-to-flask spirits made from prairie-grown ingredients. Enjoy the scenic farm setting while learning how award-winning gin, whisky, and liqueurs are made. Please note: closed for a private event at 3:00 p.m.



26 Saskatoon Museum of Military Artifacts

3021 Louise Street

Located in the Nutana Legion basement, this hidden gem brings history to life through artifacts, memorabilia, and exhibits honoring the contributions of Saskatchewan's military, including First Nations and Métis veterans.



12 Hotel Senator

243 21st Street East

Built in 1908 by businessman "Jimmy" Flanagan, this historic hotel features a marble staircase and original chandeliers, alongside modern enhancements. It's Saskatoon's oldest full-service hotel.

13 Drinkle No. 3

115 3rd Avenue South

Built in 1913, this landmark reflects Saskatoon's boom and bust. Initially designed as an office tower, it now offers apartments, a mall, a restaurant, and a wedding venue. Visit the photo exhibit in the mall to learn more about its history.

14 Frances Morrison Library

311 23rd Street East

Opened as the Main Library, this building was renamed in 1980 to honor Frances Morrison, Chief Librarian from 1961-1980. It replaced the original Main Library and has served as a central hub for Saskatoon Public Library.

15 City of Saskatoon Archives

202 4th Avenue North

The City of Saskatoon Archives is located on the main floor of Civic Square East, formerly the Saskatoon Post Office.

16 HMCS Unicorn

405 24th Street East

Built in 1945, this historic Canadian Navy building has seen several additions, including a recruiting office and garage in the 1950s. A boat named opened in 2009 by Minister Peter McKay.

17 St Vincent of Lerins Orthodox Church

304 3rd Avenue North

Completed in 1913, this Gothic-style church features hammer-beam oak rafters and a pillar-free interior, offering excellent acoustics. Designed to seat 1,200, it hosts both local and international concerts. Please note: the church will open after service at 1:00 p.m.

18 St John's Anglican Cathedral

816 Spadina Crescent East

Built in 1914 and designated a cathedral in 1924, this downtown landmark features red brick, terra cotta trim, and a 44-metre spire. Known for its superb acoustics, it houses a Casavant organ and Petrof concert grand piano.

19 Ukrainian Museum

910 Spadina Crescent East

Founded in 1936, the museum preserves Ukrainian Canadian heritage through folk art, rare textiles, and historic artifacts. The building, inspired by traditional settler homes, houses one of North America's largest ethnic textile collections.

20 Shakespeare on the Saskatchewan

948 Spadina Crescent East

For 40 years, this historic building has hosted the Shakespeare on the Saskatchewan Festival—an intimate cultural space where history, theatre, and community meet.

21 Little Stone Schoolhouse

Clinic Place University of Saskatchewan

Built in 1887 by stone mason Sandy Marr, Saskatoon's first school was moved to campus in 1911 and became a museum in 1967. It was designated a Municipal Heritage Property in 1982.

22 Rugby Chapel

1337 College Drive

Moved to campus in 1911 from Prince Albert, this Gothic Revival chapel was funded by Rugby School students. It features exposed rafters, stained glass, and a WWI memorial. Designated a Municipal Heritage Property in 1987.

23 Diefenbaker Canada Centre

101 Diefenbaker Place

Opened in 1980, the Diefenbaker Canada Centre is Canada's only Prime Ministerial museum and archives. It preserves the legacy of John Diefenbaker, featuring replica rooms, exhibitions, and historical artifacts.

24 The University of Saskatchewan Observatory

108 Wiggins Rd,

Built in 1928-1930, this landmark features a stone structure and silver dome. It houses a 3-meter telescope still in use today, with a museum showcasing astronomy and the solar system.

25 Rayner Dairy Research and Teaching Facility

101 East Road (University of Saskatchewan)

An operating dairy farm in Saskatoon focused on dairy research, industry practices, and sustainability. Explore on your own or guided tours on the hour with a 14-day livestock contact restriction.
