1. Welcome and Housekeeping

Isaac Dankwah welcomed everyone and acknowledged that the meeting is taking place on Treaty 6 territory and the traditional homelands of the Métis. Meeting started at 4:36 p.m.

The meeting was a hybrid meeting with in-person attendance and virtual attendance through Microsoft Teams.

2. Review and Approve December Meeting Minutes

Minutes were accepted as circulated.

3. BYXE Street Team – Danae Balogun

Danae introduced the consultants from On Purpose Leadership Inc. who are developing the program for the BYXE Street Team. Hiring process is underway for the BYXE Street Team.

The City received funding from the federal government for the BYXE Street Team project. BYXE Street Team will provide in-person, on-site cycling education and foster community support for cycling.

The goals of the team are to generate awareness about cycling, encourage people to give cycling a try, and make travelling on Saskatoon streets feel safer and more comfortable for everyone by raising awareness of responsibilities, educating and informing all road users of bicycle facilities and how to safely navigate the infrastructure, encouraging safe and courteous behaviours and interactions between road users and encouraging all road users to watch out for each other.

The program will be evaluated after implementation is complete.

Programs in Windsor, Edmonton and Toronto were used to inform the program in Saskatoon.

The focus of the program is on sharing the road and education, not on infrastructure.

Inquiry about what kind of information will be collected on surveys.

ATAG members were asked for their feedback on the following questions:

- 4. Key messages to be communicated?
 - Reuse messages developed for the awareness campaign.
- 5. What do you want to learn from the interactions and the program?
 - Cost comparison of bike infrastructure and driving infrastructure.
 - Not assuming that cars have precedence.
 - What would it take to convert those who are considering biking.
 - Changing the perception of walking and cycling.
 - Provide practical advice for utilitarian trips (how people could bike to work, get groceries, not get bike stolen, etc.).
 - Benefits of shared use pathways (health, economic).
 - Different modes for sharing the pathways.
 - What prohibits people from cycling / walking (lack of infrastructure, etc.).

A suggestion was made to use information obtained from the recent household travel survey that was done last fall. The consultant is compiling the results and they won't be available until late summer. Census Canada data could be used until then.

Suggestion was also made to provide information on how to share space with escooters.

Street team will have uniform, jacket and hat that will be noticeable.

A final report will be brought back to the group.

4. Cycling Guide 2024 – Danae Balogun

The cycling guide was updated. The cycling guide is typically used by those who are not familiar with cycling paths. The guide has no legal bearing; it is a planning tool to help people have safe trips. The guide will be ready for distribution in May.

The group was asked about the shared-use pathway on Warman Road by 33rd Street. The pathway is narrow and does not meet current standards. Should it be removed from the map? Suggestion was made have it in a different colour with a notation that is doesn't meet current standards. There are many locations that don't

meet current design standard. This could be considered for a future iteration of the guide. If it was removed there would be a gap and people may not use the route. Could signs be installed to warn users to proceed with caution? There is no standard sign to indicate this purpose. Could alternate routes be suggested? Users should generally pick a route that is comfortable for them. We do not have any criteria to identify a preferred alternate route. Could keep on the map but that would mislead users that this is an AAA route. Some expressed concerns with removal because cyclists using it could be ticketed for being on a sidewalk.

City will look at addressing more fully in the next iteration of the cycling guide.

Need to confirm the shared-use pathway shown in the Sutherland Dog Park. It appears to be a mountain bike trail.

- Victoria Avenue Planning Study (Taylor Street to Ruth Street) RFQ closed, evaluation process underway.
- Connecting 2nd / 3rd Avenue Walking, Cycling, Driving Improvements engagement concluded December 6, report to Standing Policy Committee on Transportation in spring.
- AT Wayfinding Pilot evaluation concluded fall 2023, final report on evaluation delivered in January 2024.

AT Construction Projects

- Dudley Street tender awarded, work beginning after snow melt.
- ICIP Sidewalks prepping for 2024 locations (this is the last year to use ICIP funding).
- Ramps ramps planned for a stretch of Main Street and stretch of Avenue J.
- APS installs meet with the low vision community to talk about prioritization system and locations.
- Neighbourhood Bikeway Speed Limit Sign Installations occur throughout the summer. Speed limits take effect on July 5, 2024.
- 14th Street / Cumberland Avenue Curb Extensions aligning work with Water and Sewer work scheduled for 2025.
- Warman and Assiniboine Rail Crossing construction planned for 2024.
