a) City of Saskatoon – Debt Limit (File Nos. CK. 1750-1, CS.1750-1 and CS.1702-1)

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: that Pursuant to Section 133 of *The Cities Act,* City Administration is authorized to request the Saskatchewan Municipal Board to re-establish the debt limit for the City of Saskatoon at \$414M.

BACKGROUND

On March 30, 2010, the Saskatchewan Municipal Board advised Administration that their Local Government Committee established a \$414,000,000 debt limit for the City of Saskatoon. The limit is in effect until December 31, 2012. The City is required to submit a request to the Local Government Committee to have the debt limit re-established for a further period effective January 1, 2013.

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<u>REPORT</u>

The Saskatchewan Municipal Board establishes the debt limit in accordance with the factors set out in subsection 23(2) of *The Municipal Board Act*. Over time, information that the Board relied on in evaluating these factors and in making its decision to establish the debt limit at a certain level may change. Establishing a term expiration date provides the Board the opportunity to exercise its due diligence to determine if the debt limit it established continues to be fiscally sustainable for the municipality. Additionally, financial institutions that rely on the Board's establishment of the debt limit are reassured by the fact the debt limit is periodically reviewed.

This resolution is a requirement by The Saskatchewan Municipal Board to re-establish the current debt limit.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to advise City Council that several names have been selected from the Names Master List and applied to roadways in Stonebridge, Rosewood, and the South West Industrial area.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. The name Jeanneau was applied to a roadway in the Rosewood neighbourhood.
- 2. The names Kolynchuk, Pringle, and Veltkamp were applied to roadways in the Stonebridge neighbourhood.
- 3. The name Dawes was applied to a roadway in the South West Industrial area.

STRATEGIC GOAL

This report supports the City of Saskatoon's Strategic Goal of:

- Moving Around Saskatoon is a city on the move.
 - Growth has brought new roads and bridges that improve connectivity for all travel modes.

BACKGROUND

According to the Naming of Civic Property and Development Areas Policy No. C09-008, all requests for names from the Names Master List will be selected by His Worship the Mayor. All of the names on the Names Master List have been previously screened by the Naming Advisory Committee and meet City Council's guidelines for name selection. Name suffixes are circulated through the Administration for technical review.

REPORT

Boychuk Construction Corp. submitted a request that the name "Jeanneau" be applied to a street in the Rosewood neighbourhood (see Attachment 1). His Worship the Mayor has selected and assigned the name Jeanneau as requested.

A. Jeanneau Way – Robert Jeanneau was a partner in the Hickson and Morgan Electronic Company and a developer and owner of various apartment blocks and office buildings throughout Saskatoon. He was also a member of the Knights of Columbus for 30 years.

Dundee Developments submitted a request that the names "Kolynchuk," "Pringle," and "Veltkamp" be applied to streets in the Stonebridge neighbourhood (see Attachment 2). His Worship the Mayor has selected and assigned the names Kolynchuk, Pringle, and Veltkamp as requested.

- B. Kolynchuk Bend, Court, Crescent, Link, and Manor John Kolynchuk was the City Clerk from 1975 to 1993. Prior to being appointed City Clerk, he was an executive assistant in the City Planning Department beginning in 1958. Outside of City Hall, he taught violin, and played both the violin and viola with the Saskatoon Symphony.
- C. Pringle Bend, Court, Cove, Crescent, Lane, Link, Manor, and Way Bob Pringle was a City Councillor from 2006 to 2010.
- D. Veltkamp Crescent and Lane Bernie Veltkamp worked for the City of Saskatoon (City) for 29 years, retiring in 2005, as the General Manager of Corporate Services. He was instrumental in negotiating the transferring of gas tax revenues to municipalities. This resulted in the City receiving funding for three specific projects including the Circle Drive/College Drive interchange, Circle Drive Bridge widening, and indirectly, one-third of the cost of the Circle Drive South project.

The City's Special Projects Team requested that a name from the Names Master List be applied to the subject roadway in the South West Industrial area (see Attachment 3). His Worship the Mayor has selected and applied the following name:

E. Dawes Avenue – Dawes Family – In 1916 the family started City Carpet Cleaning. Fred Dawes served in WWII and is a well known businessman and sports figure. Bob Dawes played hockey with the Toronto Maple Leafs and won a Stanley Cup. He retired to Saskatoon to coach the Saskatoon Quakers. George Dawes was a radio announcer with CFQC in Saskatoon, and later worked with CBC in both television and radio at various locations for 20 years.

His Worship the Mayor notified the Naming Advisory Committee Administrator of the names selected. Notice of the selections of His Worship the Mayor was forwarded to Boychuk Construction Corp., Dundee Developments, and the City's Special Projects Team. The individuals and/or families whose names have been assigned have also been notified.

- Demonstrate the City's commitment to a business or industry.

In accordance with this policy, the SREDA Board of Directors, through a sub-committee, reviews the applications and brings forward recommendations to City Council.

The report is self-explanatory and provides the required information for City Council to consider the requests by DynaIndustrial Inc. and Deca Industries Ltd. for five-year tax abatements.

B2) Debenture Issuance (Files CK. 1750-1 and CS.1750-1)

RECOMMENDATION: that City Council grant authorization to the General Manager, Corporate Services Department, to accept the terms of a \$35,000,000, one to ten-year serial debenture sale from the City's fiscal agency, provided that the all-in-cost of borrowing not exceed 3.25% and subject to the approval of the appropriate Debenture Bylaw.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

To receive approval from City Council to finance specific utilities and mill-rate supported capital projects through the issuance of serial debentures.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. Financing is presently required for select utilities and tax-supported capital projects.
- 2. Current capital market environment is favourable to municipal debenture issuance.

BACKGROUND

City Council approval is required to allow the Administration to proceed with establishing the borrowing instrument and terms as the first step in the borrowing approval process. Once the borrowing terms are finalized, a borrowing bylaw is required and will be tabled with City Council in the near future to complete the borrowing and the transfer of funds.

The Cities Act and City Council Bylaw 8171 also require Public Notice Hearings for any borrowing. A number of Council approved capital projects were identified through the budget process for borrowing and Public Notice Hearings were held on these projects and approved on the dates listed below.

Favourable Issuance Environment

Recent discussions with the City's fiscal agents indicate that low interest rates, coupled with strong investor demand for Canadian fixed-income securities, have created favourable conditions for new bond issuance. The ongoing financial problems in Europe have resulted in a "flight to quality" into North American bonds. The substantial investment in North American bonds has driven bond prices higher and yields lower.

Many government and corporate issuers have issued new debt in order to secure the low financing rates available in the market.

The City's fiscal agents believe a City of Saskatoon debenture issue should have great saleability. The City is a triple-A credit and is an infrequent issuer which should garner elevated interest from domestic investors. As well, the latter part of November provides an opportune window to borrow given that very few municipal issues are anticipated at that time; many municipalities have already completed their financing requirements for 2012. Low interest rates and reduced competition for funds bodes well for a successful debenture issue.

Monitor the Markets

Upon receiving authorization to borrow, the Investment Committee, with the assistance of the City's fiscal agency, will continue to monitor the capital markets in order to determine an opportune time to complete a successful debenture sale. This will involve observing changes in economic and capital market conditions, the monitoring of absolute market yields and applicable yield spreads, as well as gauging the level of investor interest. The Investment Committee proposes to issue one to ten-year serial debentures with interest paid on a semi-annual basis. Based on the current slope of the yield curve, the all-in-cost of borrowing for a one to ten-year serial debenture issue would range from 2.75% to 3.25%.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

The alternative financing option is to utilize a bankers' acceptance loan and interest rate swap. The Investment Committee is not recommending this financing option given the need to diversify by debt type. Outstanding debt, sourced from bankers' acceptance loan/interest rate swap transactions, presently accounts for 48% of aggregate debt outstanding. Debenture debt only represents 13% of total debt outstanding. The Investment Committee believes a prudent approach is essential when managing the City's debt.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no policy implications.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The principal and interest debt payments have been budgeted in either the utility fund for utility projects, or in the general fund for mill rate funded projects. The total amount of the capital debt is listed below, as well as the annual operating budgeted costs.

RECOMMENDATION: that the information be received.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE(S)

This report is in response to a Communication to Council from Robin Bellamy, requesting modifications to Bylaw 7491 - The Temporary Sign Bylaw, to allow for signs to be erected for one week prior to the annual Food Drive. The communication was forwarded to the Administration for a report.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. The purpose of Bylaw 7491 The Temporary Sign Bylaw, is to minimize visual clutter and facilitate necessary maintenance of streets and buffer strips.
- 2. In order to accommodate the Food Drive, the bylaw amendment would need to include all charitable organizations, which would include a broad range of events and applications.
- 3. A bylaw amendment to allow signs to be erected for all charitable organizations would significantly increase the number of temporary signs throughout the City, negating the purpose of the bylaw, and requiring additional resources for monitoring and enforcement.

BACKGROUND

City Council, at its meeting held on March 22, 2010, considered a communication from Robin Bellamy, dated February 24, 2010 (Attachment 1), requesting an amendment to Bylaw 7491 - The Temporary Sign Bylaw, to allow the Food Bank to place temporary signs for one week prior to their annual Food Drive, to advertise the event. The communication was forwarded to the Administration for a report.

<u>REPORT</u>

The purpose of Bylaw 7491, as outlined in Section 3, is to regulate the placing of temporary signs on streets and buffer strips so as:

- "(a) to afford the citizens of Saskatoon an opportunity to communicate with others in a simple and affordable way;
- (b) to improve safety for motorists and pedestrians using the streets;
- (c) to minimize visual clutter; and
- (d) to facilitate necessary maintenance of the streets and buffer strips."

All temporary signs, with the exception of garage sale, open house and election signs are prohibited in the following areas, as outlined in Section 9 of the Bylaw:

- "a) On any centre median or traffic island.
- b) In any residential district; and
- c) On any street or property owned or controlled by the City as set out in Schedule "A" or "B"."

Section 11 of Bylaw 7491 allows for the placement of garage sale, open house and election signs in residential districts, except on centre medians and traffic islands, and on any street or property as set out in Section B, as long as they do not exceed the permitted size, and as long as they are removed immediately following the sale, viewing or event.

Temporary garage sale and open house signs have been exempted from the Bylaw as they are typically more local in their application, and are generally contained within smaller areas and/or neighbourhoods. As a result, they have little impact. Temporary election signs, while having a greater city-wide impact, are less frequent in their

application (i.e. once every three or four years) and, therefore, also have a small impact, compared to other types of temporary signage.

Although there is a desire to support charitable functions such as the annual Food Drive, the requested bylaw amendment would need to encompass all charitable organizations, which would include a broad range of events and applications. This would ultimately degrade the purpose of the Temporary Sign Bylaw, as it would significantly increase the number of temporary signs being placed throughout the city. It would also require additional bylaw inspection time in order to monitor and enforce the size, location and function of the signs. Currently, there are no resources available for this increase in level of service.

The Administration, therefore, does not recommend an amendment to Bylaw 7491 - The Temporary Sign Bylaw, at this time.

RECOMMENDATION: that the information be received

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

This report is in response to an enquiry from former Councillor Dubois, requesting that the Administration investigate the feasibility of installing a four-way stop at the intersection of Stensrud Road and Muzyka Road.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. A traffic calming island and standard crosswalk were installed at the intersection of Stensrud Road and Muzyka Road in the spring of 2012, based on the results of a traffic study completed in 2010.
- 2. An additional traffic study was conducted in the summer of 2012 to assess the need for a four-way stop.
- 3. Based on the results of the 2012 traffic study, a four-way stop is not warranted.

STRATEGIC GOALS

This report supports the following City of Saskatoon Strategic Goal and Strategy:

- Moving Around Saskatoon is a city on the move.
 - Long-Term Goals:
 - Optimize the flow of people and goods in and around the city.

BACKGROUND

The following enquiry was made by former Councillor B. Dubois at the meeting of City Council held on July 18, 2012:

"Would the Administration please investigate the feasibility of installing a four-way stop at the intersection of Stensrud Road and Muzyka Road in the Willowgrove neighbourhood."

<u>REPORT</u>

The Administration began a review of traffic conditions in the Willowgrove neighbourhood in the summer of 2010, prior to the enquiry from Councillor Dubois. Based on the results of the traffic study, a traffic calming island and standard crosswalk were installed at the intersection of Stensrud Road and Muzyka Road in the spring of 2012. Traffic calming islands provide a safe place of refuge for pedestrians and encourage motorists to travel at a decreased speed by narrowing the width of the roadway. The traffic calming island and crosswalk were installed temporarily. If proven successful, they will be made permanent, as funding is made available.

Stensrud Road and Muzyka Road are classified as collector roadways, which can each be expected to carry up to 15,000 vehicles per day. The existing traffic control at the intersection includes a two-way stop, giving right-of-way to Stensrud Road.

For a four-way stop to be installed, the intersection must meet certain minimum criteria, as specified in Policy C07-007 – Use of Stop and Yield Signs, as follows:

"The following conditions must be met for an all-way stop control to be considered:

- i) The combined volume of traffic entering the intersection over the five peak hour periods from the minor street must be at least 25% of the total volume for a three-way stop control, and at least 35% of the total volume for a four-way stop control.
- ii) There can be no all-way stop control and traffic signal within 200 metres of the proposed intersection being considered for all-way stop control on either of the intersecting streets."

A traffic study was conducted at Stensrud Road and Muzyka Road in July 2012, during the peak hours (7:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m.; 12:00 noon to 1:00 p.m.; and 4:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m.). This data was used to calculate the average daily traffic (ADT), the peak hour traffic total, and the traffic split between the major and minor roadway.

The study showed that the combined volume of traffic entering the intersection from Muzyka Road (the minor street) over the peak hour periods was 26%. This is less than the required 35% for a four-way stop control. The study also showed that the nearest traffic signal is located at the intersection of Stensrud Road and McOrmond Drive, which is approximately 160 metres away, and is within 200 metres of the intersection being considered.

Given that neither of the above criteria is met, the installation of a four-way stop at the intersection of Stensrud Road and Muzyka Road is not recommended.

The Administration will continue to monitor the traffic calming that was recently installed at this intersection to ensure that it is effective in reducing vehicle speeds and improving the crossing environment for pedestrians.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE(S)

This report is to request that City Council consider Bylaw No. 9062 – The Street Closing Bylaw, 2012 (No. 9), in order to legally close the walkway adjacent to 418 and 422 Stone Court and 3387 and 3403 Fairlight Drive.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. City Council considered the closure of the walkway located adjacent to 418 and 422 Stone Court and 3387 and 3403 Fairlight Drive on June 28, 2012, during Matters Requiring Public Notice, and resolved, in part, that upon receipt of the legal land survey documents, the City Solicitor be requested to prepare the bylaw for consideration by City Council.
- 2. The Plan of Proposed Consolidation for the above walkway prepared by Webb Surveys has been received.

STRATEGIC GOAL(S)

 - Reduce and prevent crime and provide protective services in our downtown core and neighbourhoods.

BACKGROUND

City Council, at is meeting held on June 28, 2010, during consideration of Matters Requiring Public Notice, considered a request for closure of the walkway adjacent to 418 and 422 Stone Court and 3387 and 3403 Fairlight Drive and resolved:

- "1) that the walkway adjacent to 418 and 422 Stone Crescent and 3387 and 3403 Fairlight Drive be closed;
- that upon receipt of the legal land survey documents the City Solicitor be requested to prepare the appropriate bylaw for consideration by City Council;
- 3) that upon approval of the bylaw, the City Solicitor be instructed to take all necessary steps to bring the intended closure forward and to complete the closure; and
- 4) that upon closure of the walkway, the land will be sold to Terence and Faye Denys of 422 Stone Court; and James and Norma Brinkman of 3403 Fairlight Drive for \$1000 each."

<u>REPORT</u>

The Administration has received the Plan of Proposed Consolidation, prepared by Webb Surveys, dated August 9, 2012.

Infrastructure Services, SaskPower and SaskTel, have existing facilities with easements within the area and have approved the proposed closure.

A garage located at 3387 Fairlight Drive encroaches onto the walkway. The owners of 3387 Fairlight Drive and 3403 Fairlight Drive have acknowledged their awareness of the existing encroachment, and are prepared to deal with any issues that may arise.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

No other options were considered.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no policy implications.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

BACKGROUND

City Council, at its meeting held on December 19, 2011, approved Bylaw 8977 to close of a portion of the lane right-of-way located adjacent to 620 Weldon Avenue. The right-of-way was to be sold to Jack Flaksman, 1366866 Alberta Ltd., 620 Weldon Avenue for \$4,034.44, plus G.S.T.; and to Ron Chelack of Cindercrete Products Ltd., 616 Avenue P South, for \$4,034.44, plus G.S.T.

The lane right-of-way serves no future use to the City of Saskatoon or to the public. SaskTel, Shaw Cablesystems and Saskatoon Light & Power had indicated that they require easements and all of the other agencies indicated that they have no objections or easement requirements with respect to the closure.

REPORT

The Administration has been advised that Jack Flaksman, 1366866 Alberta Ltd. (620 Weldon Avenue) is no longer interested in purchasing his portion of the lane. In addition, Mr. Flaksman has sold his property to Tim Oulleutte who has confirmed that he is also not interested in purchasing that portion of the lane. Both Mr. Flaksman and Mr. Oulleutte have both given their consent to allow Ron Chelack, Cindercrete Products Ltd. (616 Avenue P South) to purchase the entire portion of lane right-of-way, as show on attached Plan 240-0043-003r001 (Attachment 2).

The Administration has, therefore, agreed to sell the entire lane to Cindercrete Products Ltd., at a total cost of \$8,068.88, plus G.S.T.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The City of Saskatoon will receive revenue from the sale of this lane in the amount of \$8,068.88, plus G.S.T., which will be deposited into the Dedicated Roadway Reserve. This reserve is used to fund the purchase of property required for future construction of roadways.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

This report is to advise that the extension of McOrmond Drive has been completed, and to request that Bylaw 8955, The Street Closing Bylaw, 2011 (No. 8) be considered, in order to close Range Road 3045, between Keedwell Street and Agra Road.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. Range Road 3045, between Keedwell Street and Agra Road, is to be permanently closed in order for SaskPower to relocate a 138 kV line, to enable development in the Evergreen neighbourhood.
- 2. City Council considered the closure on August 17, 2011, during Matters Requiring Public Notice, at which time the matter was deferred until the Administration reported on the timing of the completion of the extension of McOrmond Drive.
- 3. The Administration reported regarding the extension of McOrmond Drive on September 26, 2011. City Council deferred consideration of the bylaw until the extension of McOrmond Drive was completed.
- 4. The extension of McOrmond Drive has now been completed and is open to traffic.

BACKGROUND

City Council, at its meeting held on August 17, 2011, during Matters Requiring Public Notice, considered a report of the General Manager, Infrastructure Services Department, dated August 5, 2011, advising that a request had been made by the Community Services Department, Land Branch to close Range Road 3045, between Keedwell Street and Agra Road, in order for SaskPower to relocate a 138 kV line to allow for development in the Evergreen Neighbourhood. City Council resolved that the matter be deferred until such time as the Administration reported on the timing of the completion of the temporary extension of McOrmond Drive.

On September 26, 2011, City Council considered a report of the General Manager, Infrastructure Services Department, dated September 20, 2011, outlining two options for the construction of the extension of McOrmond Drive (Attachment 2). City Council resolved, in part, that consideration of Bylaw 8955 be deferred until such time as the Administration reported on the successful completion of the paved extension of McOrmond Drive.

REPORT

Construction of the extension of McOrmond Drive has been completed and is open to traffic. The Administration is recommending that Council consider Bylaw 8955, which will permanently block access to Range Road 3045 so that SaskPower can install the required 138 kV lines.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

No other options were considered.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no policy implications.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no financial implications.

PUBLIC AND/OR STAKEHOLDER INVOLVEMENT

All residents living north of Range Road 3045, and residents living in the Willowgrove Neighbourhood adjacent to Range Road 3045 have been notified by letter of the proposed closure. There has been no expressed opposition.

COMMUNICATION PLAN

Signage will be placed at either end of the closed roadway.

PRIVACY IMPACT

There are no privacy implications.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

The recommendation has positive greenhouse gas emissions implications, as traffic will not be able to access the closed road. Details of the traffic analysis will be forwarded to the Environmental Services Branch for detailed calculation.

SAFETY/CRIME PREVENTION THROUGH ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN (CPTED)

A CPTED review is not required.

- 2. New school speed zone signage is required along the 300 block of Avenue N South, and existing signage, located along the 300 block Avenue P South, is no longer required.

BACKGROUND

As a result of the Pleasant Hill Village reconstruction, St. Mary's Elementary School, located on Avenue O South, was demolished. The newly constructed St. Mary's Education and Wellness Centre, located along Avenue N South, opened for the 2012/2013 school year.

REPORT

Consultation with the principal of St. Mary's Education and Wellness Centre, located at 327 Avenue N South, has resulted in the preparation of a new school speed zone signage plan, located along the 300 blocks of Avenue N South and Avenue O South, as shown in Attachment 1.

Due to the previous location of the school, a reduced speed zone already exists along the 300 block of Avenue O South and Avenue P South. The signage along Avenue P South is no longer required and, therefore, it is recommended that it be removed.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

No other options were considered.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

The installation and removal of the St. Mary's Education and Wellness Centre speed zone is in accordance with Policy C07-015 – Reduced Speed Zones for Schools.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The cost to install and remove the school speed zone signage is approximately \$2,000. Funding is available within approved Capital Project 1506 – Traffic Signing Replacement.

E8) Capital Project 1616 – Waste Water Collection Capital Project 1620 – Storm Collection Request for the Sole Source Purchase of a Panoramo Camera System (Files CK. 1000-3, IS. 1390-1, and PW. 1510-6)

- **RECOMMENDATION:** 1) that the sole source purchase of one demonstration IBAK Panoramo 150 camera system, from Donison & Associates Ltd., at a total cost of \$98,537.67 (including G.S.T. and P.S.T.), be approved; and
 - 2) that the Corporate Services Department, Purchasing Services Branch be requested to issue the Purchase Order.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

This report is to seek approval to award the sole source purchase of a demonstration camera system for the sewer inspection unit to Donison & Associates Ltd.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. Due to the accumulation of calcium deposits, the inspection camera currently used for sanitary and storm sewer inspections will not fit inside certain sewer mains. Therefore an additional, more compact camera is required to supplement the existing fleet.
- 2. Cameras are used to assess the condition of the sanitary and storm sewer systems, assist in the investigation of sewer backups and provide information needed to plan for cleaning, maintenance and future rehabilitation or replacement.
- 3. A sole source purchase is being recommended because the City of Saskatoon has an opportunity to purchase a demonstration unit at a discount of 10%.

STRATEGIC GOALS

The award of the camera system supports the following Strategic Goals:

- Continuous Improvement, as it will allow us to increase productivity by being more efficient in the way we do business; and to leverage technology and emerging trends to reach our goals, serve citizens and connect meaningfully with our stakeholders; and
- Asset and Financial Sustainability, as it will help us to ensure that our assets are well managed and well maintained.

BACKGROUND

The Water and Sewer Section currently utilizes IBAK brand equipment for the televised inspection of underground pipes. These inspections are used to assess the condition of the sanitary and storm sewer systems. They allow for investigation of sewer backups, maintenance issues, and sewer complaints. They also provide detailed information on the condition of underground pipes in order to plan for cleaning, maintenance and future rehabilitation or replacement.

The camera system currently in use is housed and controlled by an inspection truck built specifically for IBAK equipment. It consists of a self propelled, four wheeled 3D optical scanner, which is capable of inspecting pipelines from 8"/200 millimetres (mm) to 72"/1,830 mm. This entire IBAK package was extensively researched and carefully selected through a request for proposal process, which was presented and approved by City Council at its meeting held on May 20, 2008.

REPORT

The sanitary sewer mains in the City of Saskatoon, which are typically 8"/200 mm in diameter and greater, possess an unusually high amount of calcium that has accumulated over time, reducing the inner diameter of the pipes. As a result, a smaller camera is required.

A new camera which is a more compact version of the camera currently being used is now available. Donison & Associates Ltd., has a demonstration unit available for purchase, which they are able to provide to the City of Saskatoon at a 10% discount, for a total price of \$98,537.67, including G.S.T. and P.S.T. The unit includes a full warrant.

The Administration is, therefore, recommending the sole source purchase to Donison & Associates Ltd.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

Due to jurisdiction issues, the City of Saskatoon is normally only allowed to purchase this equipment from one supplier, who is based in Saskatchewan. However, because the City is purchasing a used product it is able to bypass jurisdiction. The Administration has contacted the Saskatchewan supplier and has been advised that they do not have a demonstration unit available for purchase, and the cost for a new Panoramo 150 Camera System would be 10% more than that being offered by Donison & Associates Ltd.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

Council approval for the sole source purchase of the demonstration camera system from Donison & Associates Ltd., is required as per Policy C02-030 – Purchase of Goods, Services and Work.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The net cost to the City of Saskatoon for the sole source purchase of one demonstration IBAK Panoramo 150 camera system from Donison & Associates Ltd. is as follows:

E9) Winter Area 1 and Area 2 Maintenance Contracts (Files CK. 6290-1 and IS. 6000-4)

- **RECOMMENDATION:** 1) that the proposal submitted by ASL Paving Ltd. for the 2012/2013 Area 1 Winter Maintenance Contract, at a total estimated cost of \$663.230.30, including G.S.T. and P.S.T., be accepted;
 - 2) that the proposal submitted by Central Asphalt & Paving for the 2012/2013 Area 2 Winter Maintenance Contract, at a total estimated cost of \$468,109.44, including G.S.T. and P.ST., be accepted; and
 - 3) that His Worship the Mayor and the City Clerk be authorized to execute the contract documents, as prepared by the City Solicitor, under the corporate seal.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

This report is to obtain City Council approval for the award of contracts for 2012-2013 to augment winter snow clearing maintenance.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. The City Council approved level-of-service for snow clearing states that Priority 1 streets will be cleared within 12 hours after a snow event (when accumulated snowfall or blowing snow is five centimetres or more) has ceased; and that Priority 2 streets will be cleared within 36 hours; and Priority 3 streets within 72 hours.
- 2. Staff assigned to clear roads, walkways and pedestrian tunnels work 10 hour shifts, day and night, seven days a week.
- 3. If required, shifts are extended to 12 hours to ensure 24 hour coverage, and staff are called in to work overtime on their regularly scheduled days off.
- 4. Private contractors are also utilized to provide snow clearing resources on Priority 1, 2 and 3 streets, when required, during and after a snow event.

- 5. Request for Proposals were issued to private contractors for winter street maintenance in two areas of the city; one on the west side, and one on the east side.
- 6. After extensive evaluation, it is being recommended that ASL Paving Ltd. be awarded the contract for Area 1 Winter Maintenance, and that Central Asphalt & Paving be awarded the contract for Area 2.

STRATEGIC GOALS

The award of winter maintenance contracts supports the following Strategic Goals:

- Continuous Improvement, as it will provide for a coordinated approach to customer service with quick and accurate responses; and
- Moving Around, as it will ensure that the flow of people and goods in and around the city is optimized; and that the service levels for the maintenance of our roads, streets, lanes, sidewalks and bridges are maintained.

BACKGROUND

Approval of Level of Service for Snow Clearing

In 2010, the snow removal Operating Budget received an increase in funding in the amount of \$1 million in order to achieve the City Council approved level-of-service for snow clearing, which states that Priority 1 streets will be cleared within 12 hours after a snow event (when accumulated snowfall or blowing snow is five centimetres or more) has ceased; and that Priority 2 streets will be cleared within 36 hours; and Priority 3 streets within 72 hours.

Staff are assigned to work ten-hour shifts, day and night, seven days a week, clearing roads, walkways and pedestrian tunnels. When required, shifts are extended to 12 hours to ensure 24 hour coverage, and staff are called in to work overtime on their regularly scheduled days off in order to provide fully resourced shifts.

The additional funding has been used to create annual area maintenance contracts. These private contractors are utilized to provide snow clearing resources on Priority 1, 2 and 3 streets, when required, during and after a snow event. This blend of City and industry resources has improved the snow clearing response time, capacity and performance, allowing it to achieve the approved level of service.

The total approved budget for the snow and ice program for the 2011-2012 winter is \$6.04 million. This includes approximately \$317,000 in funding from the Ministry of Highways, Urban Highway Connector Program (UHCP).

<u>REPORT</u>

Staffing and Other Resources

The City of Saskatoon's 2012-2013 Snow and Ice program includes the following internal resources:

- 115 staff, working ten-hour shifts, day and night, 7 days a week;
- 16 graders equipped with snow rids (wings);
- 7 loaders (3 of which are equipped with a snow blower attachment);
- 9 high speed front plow trucks;
- 6 under slung plow trucks; and
- 9 sidewalk plows.

Request for Proposals

Request for Proposals (RFP) were issued for winter street maintenance in two areas of the city; one on the west side, and one on the east side (as shown in Attachment 1). The RFPs closed on October 25, 2012 and October 26, 2012 for Area 1 and Area 2 respectively. Two proposals were received for each area, one for each area from ASL Paving Ltd. and one for each area from Central Asphalt and Paving Ltd.

A comprehensive review of the proposals was conducted, based on the following criteria:

- Overall cost 40%;
- Program Methodology 40%;
- Contractor Experience 15%; and
- Proposal Presentation 5%.

Contract for Area 1

Upon evaluation, it was determined that the optimal bid for Area 1 was from ASL Paving Ltd., at a total estimated cost of \$663,230.30, including G.S.T. and P.S.T.

The proposal from ASL Paving Ltd. includes:

- A retainer of \$308,380;
- Charges for equipment in the amount of \$158.80 per hour worked per grader based on four storm events through the course of the winter, this equates to an estimated 1,800 hours of grader time;
- A contingency fund in the amount of \$30,000 to deal with any urgent and/or unforeseen circumstances; and
- It secures 12 operators and up to 9 graders from November 18, 2012 through to March 16, 2013. (ASL Paving Ltd. will ensure 6 operated graders are available for both the day and night shifts, and, if necessary, could adjust their resources to offer 9 of their machines simultaneously.)

The proposal is an increase of \$16,883.90 from 2011-2012. The small increase is primarily due to inflation.

Contract for Area 2

It was also determined that the optimal bid for Area 2 was from Central Asphalt & Paving at a total estimated cost of \$468,109.44, including G.S.T. and P.S.T.

The proposal from Central Asphalt and paving includes:

- A retainer of \$215,000;
- Charges for equipment in the amount of \$125.65 per hour worked per grader based on approximately four storm events through the course of the winter, this equates to an estimated 1,440 hours of grader time;
- A contingency fund in the amount of \$30,000 to deal with any urgent and/or unforeseen circumstances; and
- It secures 10 operators and 6 graders from December 1, 2012 through to March 31, 2013. (Central Asphalt & Paving will ensure 4 operated graders are available for the day shift and 6 for the night-shift.)

The proposal is an increase of \$38,857.80 from 2011-2012 which is primarily due to the retention of 10 operated graders as opposed to the 9 which were available in 2011-2012, as more resources are needed to handle the growth of the priority network in this area.

Snow and Ice Program Budget

The total approved budget for the snow and ice program for 2011-2012 is \$6.04 million. This includes approximately \$317,000 in funding from the Ministry of Highways, Urban Highway Connector Program (UHCP).

The City's snow and ice budget for 2012-2013, with four major storms, is estimated as follows:

E10) Capital Project 1617 – Primary Water Main System Preservation Program 2012 Primary Water Main Leak Detection Program (Files CK. 7820-6 and IS. 7821-2)

- **RECOMMENDATION:** 1) that the proposal submitted by GENIVAR Inc for leak detection services on seven segments of primary water main, at a total estimated cost of \$272,947.50 (including P.S.T. and G.S.T.), be accepted; and
 - 2) that His Worship the Mayor and the City Clerk be authorized to execute the contract documents, as prepared by the City Solicitor, under the Corporate Seal.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

This report is to request that City Council approve the award of the 2012 Primary Water Main Leak Detection Program to GENIVAR Inc.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. Leak detection is a condition assessment technique used to measure the deterioration of pressure pipes.
- 2. The proposed leak detection study will aid the City in pre-screening deteriorated water mains for further investigation or rehabilitation without shutting down the primary water main.
- 3. This is the first time a leak detection study of this scope has been undertaken by the City.
- 4. The Administration is recommending that leak detection services on seven segments of primary water main be awarded to GENIVAR Inc.

STRATEGIC GOALS

The award of leak detection services supports the following Strategic Goals:

- A Culture of Continuous Improvement, as it will allow us to increase productivity by being more efficient in the way we do business; and to leverage technology and emerging trends to reach our goals, serve citizens and connect meaningfully with our stakeholders; and
- Asset and Financial Sustainability, as it will help us to ensure that our assets are well managed and well maintained.

BACKGROUND

Capital Project 1617 – Primary Water Main System Network Management, includes \$1,000,000 (\$500,000 allocated in 2011 and \$500,000 allocated in 2012) that is to be put towards condition assessment of primary water mains.

Condition assessment techniques needed to measure the deterioration of pressure pipes are very costly, and leak detection can be used as a screening method to narrow down the selection of pipes that will require this inspection.

This will be the first leak detection study of this scope undertaken by the City of Saskatoon. The method involves inserting a device into live water mains. Based on the results, repairs can be made and further investigation can be undertaken on the mains that are identified as highest priority.

REPORT

On August 18, 2012, a Request for Proposals (RFP) was publically advertised for consultants to submit proposals to provide leak detection services on seven segments of primary water main, which were selected based on a review of the City's entire system and prioritized based on various factors, including pipe diameter, age, location and previous leak history. Proposals were received from the following two companies:

- GENIVAR Inc.; and
- Pure Technologies Ltd.

The proposals were evaluated based on the following criteria, with 1 being the most important and 5 the least important:

- 1. Price;
- 2. Work plan;
- 3. Experience;
- 4. References; and
- 5. Overall proposal quality.

After a comprehensive review, the proposal from GENIVAR Inc was determined to be the preferred proposal, at a total cost of \$272,947.50 (including G.S.T. and P.S.T.). If approved, work will commence in November 2012 and will be completed by April 30, 2013.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

No other options were considered.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no policy implications.

Due to the location of access points to the primary water mains, traffic restrictions may be required to ensure the safety of workers. The public will be notified of any required detours.

Although no water outages are anticipated, with any work on pressurized water mains there is the potential for shutdowns to be required. Residents and businesses affected by water outages will be notified directly or by "Saskatoon at Work" pamphlets delivered to their property, as is standard practice.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

The recommendation will lead to an increase in greenhouse gas emissions associated with the implementation of the leak detection program. However, these impacts will be mitigated by the performance of a more efficient water distribution system. A more complete understanding of the condition of infrastructure will lead to efficiencies in maintenance and preservation programs. Possible benefits include: reduction of water treatment and pumping costs; reduction in wastewater treatment costs; and reduction of damage to infrastructure. These benefits all relate to energy savings and associated greenhouse gas emissions reductions, resulting from the efficient delivery and treatment of water. Quantification of greenhouse gas emissions will be included in future reports, where applicable.

PRIVACY IMPACT

There are no privacy implications.

Requesting that City Council approve the awarding of a contract for the supply, warranty, and delivery of two packaged 500 kilowatt turboexpander-generator systems, complete with switchgear, master controller, and heat exchangers.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. This project is a joint venture with SaskEnergy Incorporated at SaskEnergy's Town Border Station #1 and is being developed in conjunction with the landfill gas project.
- 2. Five proposals were received in response to the Request for Proposal issued on September 4, 2012.
- 3. The proposal submitted by OC Turboexpanders, LLC is acceptable, compliant and within budget.
- 4. The next step will be to issue the construction tender. The turboexpander facility is anticipated to be operational by November 2013.

STRATEGIC GOALS

This report supports the long term strategy to increase revenue sources and reduce reliance on residential property taxes under the Strategic Goal of Asset and Financial Sustainability. The report also supports the long-term strategy to create new sources of green energy where feasible under the Strategic Goal of Environmental Leadership. Identifying opportunities to replace conventional energy sources with green energy technologies and finding alternate ways of generating capacity to support operations is in line with the City's four-year priorities.

BACKGROUND

Joint Venture with SaskEnergy

In 2009, Saskatoon Light & Power (SL&P) and SaskEnergy Incorporated commissioned a feasibility study to evaluate the potential for application of a turboexpander generator at SaskEnergy's Town Border Station #1 in Saskatoon. A turboexpander can be used to recover useful energy from the pressure drop at the Town Border Station in the form of shaft horsepower, which could then be used to generate electricity that would be sold to SaskPower under its Green Options Partners Program. Excess heat from the adjacent landfill gas power generation facility would be used to preheat the natural gas as required prior to the pressure and temperature reduction through the turboexpander.

<u>REPORT</u>

Five Proposals Received

On September 4th, 2012, SL&P issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) for the supply, warranty, and delivery of two packaged turboexpander generator systems (500kWe each), complete with switchgear, master controller, and heat exchangers. The equipment listed in this RFP are items which typically are very specific in design, have long lead times for manufacturing, and are more cost effective for the owner to purchase.

On October 10, 2012, Purchasing Services opened five proposals for this project.

Proposal by OC Turboexpanders, LCC is Compliant

On October 18, 2012, an evaluation team met, which included a representative from SL&P, SaskEnergy, and Wenck Associates (the design engineering firm), to discuss and evaluate the proposals. The OC Turboexpanders proposal scored the highest of the three.

As the submission by OC Turboexpanders is within budget and is compliant with all requirements, it is recommended that their proposal, for \$1,993,200.00 including taxes, be accepted.

Next Steps

A tender for the construction of the facility and installation of the equipment will be issued in January 2013. Construction of the turboexpander facility will begin in the spring of 2013 and is anticipated to be operational by November 2013.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

SL&P could cancel the Request for Proposal. This option is not being recommended as the existing proposal is within budget and considered technically acceptable.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no known policy implications.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Adequate funding is available in SL&P's Capital Project #2311. The total budget for this project is \$4,500,000. Within the total budgeted amount, an allocation for the supply-only portion of the project was established at \$2,100,000. The cost of the recommended proposal is \$1,993,200 and is therefore within the budgeted allowance.

This project is a Joint Venture between SL&P and SaskEnergy with both sides contributing 50% of the total funding. SL&P's 50% share of the total cost is therefore \$996,600.00 including taxes.

Power from this facility will be sold to SaskPower under its Green Options Partners Program and will result in annual revenues of approximately \$650,000 beginning in 2014. SL&P's share (50%) of the annual revenues will be \$325,000. An economic analysis was completed for the project and it indicates a 20-year internal rate of return (IRR) of 11.2%, with a payback of nine years.

PUBLIC AND/OR STAKEHOLDER INVOLVEMENT

SL&P hosted an open house on November 24, 2010 at Montgomery School. The open house provided participants with information, answered questions, addressed concerns, and gathered input on the Landfill Gas Project and the Turboexpander Project. Approximately 30 people attended the open house. No comment forms were submitted at the open house or afterward. One comment was received via an email submission that was in support of the proposed projects.

COMMUNICATION PLAN

A number of communication activities have been completed over the last three years while developing this project. Information on the project, blog articles, a City Beat video, an animation of the technology, as well as Frequently Asked Questions articles have been developed and are available on the City's website. An innovative public education project was completed in late 2011, working with local high school students from the Aden Bowman Collegiate 'Earthkeepers" program to develop on-site signage and educational brochures on the technology and benefits. Signage is on display at the entrance to the landfill, and brochures are available in print and on the City's website.

A communication plan was developed in early 2012 working with Reach Communications, and covers all of the projects to be developed at Saskatoon's Green Energy Park.

Construction will begin in spring of 2013. In late 2012, a News Release will be issued to announce the next steps of the project. Before construction commences, a heads-up email to Councillors will be provided followed by issuance of a PSA. Throughout the construction phase, monthly communications with the local Councillor and Community Association will keep them up to date as the project proceeds. There will be additional signage installed at the location of the facility which identifies the Joint Venture partners. Upon completion of the project, there will be a 'Grand Opening' event to celebrate this green energy project. The site is expected to be commissioned in late 2013.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

The turboexpander facility will generate clean electricity without combustion, by capturing pressure energy and heat energy that would otherwise go un-used. The recommendation has positive greenhouse gas emissions implications. The electricity

generated will lead to GHG emissions reductions estimated at 3,600 tonnes CO_2e , which is the equivalent of removing 700 cars from the road each year.

An Environmental Screening has been completed for the project by the Environmental Assessment Branch of the Saskatchewan Ministry of Environment. The Ministry does not require any further assessment of environmental impacts for the project.

PRIVACY IMPACT

There are no privacy implications.

SAFETY/CRIME PREVENTION THROUGH ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN (CPTED)

The turboexpander facility is an unoccupied facility located on SaskEnergy's Town Border Station No. 1 property. For this reason, it will not be subject to a CPTED review. A CPTED review has already been performed on the Landfill Gas Facility adjacent to this site.

 - 2) that the City Solicitor be requested to prepare the appropriate agreement for execution by His Worship the Mayor and the City Clerk, under the Corporate Seal.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

To receive approval for the lease of Bay No. 3 in the City-owned building located at 325 - 3rd Avenue North for a period of five years, two and a half months.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. Space is available for lease at the City–owned commercial space at 325 3rd Avenue North.
- 2. Lease revenues from the main floor will be used to subsidize the on-going costs associated with the Assessment Branch occupancy of the second floor.

STRATEGIC GOAL

This report supports the City of Saskatoon's Strategic Goal of:

Asset and Financial Sustainability – Saskatoon invests in what matters.

- Long-Term Strategy Increase revenue sources and reduce reliance on residential property taxes.
- Long-Term Priority explore alternative sources of revenue to pay for ongoing operations.

BACKGROUND

At its meeting held on August 18, 2010, City Council approved the purchase of 325 - 3rd Avenue North. The building was purchased to house the Assessment Branch on an interim basis and allow flex space for the reconfiguring of City Hall. The Assessment Branch currently resides on the second floor of the building — the main floor of the building is divided into three commercial rental units (CRUs) for external commercial tenants.

It was also approved at the same meeting, that this City-owned building at 325 - 3rd Avenue North would be managed by Colliers McClocklin. Property management fees are recovered from the shared occupancy costs paid by the tenants. The lease payments from the three main-floor tenants will fund the on-going occupancy, heating, and janitorial costs for the Assessment Branch occupancy of the second floor.

<u>REPORT</u>

Space Available for Lease

Bay No. 3 became available for lease after Compliments Hair Design chose to vacate the space rather than renew their lease agreement at current market rent. Colliers McClocklin subsequently marketed the space and has now received an offer to lease from Honey Bun Café Inc. Their proposal is to operate a café that will "combine the warm atmosphere of a grandmother's farm kitchen with innovative fresh baking".

Lease Revenues Subsidize Assessment Branch Occupancy of the Second Floor Revenues of \$175,736 will be generated from the net lease of this space to Honey Bun Café Inc. over the five year plus lease period. These revenues will be used to offset the costs associated with the Assessment Branch occupying the second floor of this building.

Negotiated terms of the agreement require the landlord to complete interior improvements to the space at a cost of approximately \$22,000. In addition, a \$10,000 tenant improvement allowance is to be provided. Funds are available from the original investment in the building to cover the landlord improvement/investment costs and expected costs to cover future repairs, maintenance and operations of the building.

See Attachment 1 for the significant terms of the Lease.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

An option would be to not approve the execution of this lease and have Colliers McClocklin continue to market the property in search of another suitable tenant.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no policy implications.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Leasing of this space will result in 100% occupancy of the building which significantly adds to the marketability and value of the property, an important factor should the City decide to sell the property at some point in the future.

PUBLIC AND/OR STAKEHOLDER INVOLVEMENT

None required.

COMMUNICATION PLAN

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no environmental and/or greenhouse gas implications.

- 2. The City of Saskatoon and the Credit Union continues to have an excellent working relationship.

STRATEGIC GOAL

This report supports the City of Saskatoon's Strategic Goal of:

Asset and Financial Sustainability - Saskatoon invests in what matters.

• Increase revenue sources and reduce reliance on residential property taxes.

BACKGROUND

The Saskatoon Civic Employees' Credit Union Limited (Credit Union) has occupied an area on the ground floor of City Hall since 1985. Currently, the Credit Union leases 1,672 square feet of space. The existing lease agreement which expired on December 31, 2009, has been renewed on an annual basis with a 5% rent allocation adjustment. The current 2011 gross lease rate was \$32,182.

<u>REPORT</u>

Lease Renewal and Revenue

The Real Estate Section has negotiated a renewal of the current lease with Saskatoon Employees' Credit Union with revised terms and conditions. The proposed new lease agreement would commence January 1, 2012 and run until December 31, 2016. The commencing gross lease rate will be \$27.00 per square foot. This rate is based on a combined net lease rate of \$16.50 and lease occupancy costs of \$10.50 per square foot. The gross lease rate reflects the midpoint of downtown Saskatoon Class AB office space lease rates as shown in Brunsdon Junor Johnson Appraisals Ltd. 2011 Office Study. Going forward, the occupancy cost of \$10.50 will be increase each year by 2.5%. Over the five-year term of the lease, \$230,217 will be generated in revenue. Attachment 1 identifies other significant terms of the lease.

Excellent Working Relationship

The City of Saskatoon and the Credit Union continues to have an excellent working relationship. Both the City of Saskatoon and its employees benefit by having the convenience of a bank located within City Hall.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

An option would be to not approve this lease. In this scenario, the Credit Union would have to vacate City Hall and secure a new location for operation.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no policy implications.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The gross lease rate reflects a market value lease rate and accounts for occupancy costs and associated annual increases of the maintenance and utility costs with the space.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE(S)

This report is a third quarter report on the status of the initiatives in the 2013 Business Plan to the end of September 2012, and the forecasted budget expenditures to the end of December 2012.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. Progress is being made on many initiatives in the 2012 Business Plan.
- 2. 2012 is on track for a record year with \$1B of permitted value of construction so far this year.
- 3. A year-end surplus of just over \$2M is being forecasted.

STRATEGIC GOAL

This report supports the Strategic Goal of Continuous Improvement. Quarterly status updates on the City's Budget and Business Plan will help to ensure that City Council and the Administration are aware of emerging budget and business plan issues and challenges, so that they can react accordingly. By providing these quarterly reports, this will help the City to mitigate any financial or corporate risks that may result from unplanned events, or new challenges that may emerge throughout 2012.

BACKGROUND

In 2011, the City of Saskatoon implemented major changes to its planning and budgeting process, to create a framework which would allow the City to be more adaptive and responsive to the changing dynamics in our city, our province, and our country. Approved in December 2011, The City of Saskatoon's 2012 Corporate Business Plan and Budget – *Investing in What Matters* builds on that new foundation. The new approach to business planning is intended to:

• improve transparency and decision-making by providing City Council and citizens with more information about where City funds are used, linking service costs to

service levels and outcomes, and better connecting long-term goals to short-term spending decisions;

- increase the City's accountability in delivering services to citizens effectively and efficiently, while maintaining the focus on a sustainable future; and
- help the City transform its organization by providing for more regular, ongoing, and thorough examination of City services to ensure that services are relevant to citizens' needs and priorities.

<u>REPORT</u>

Progress Being Made on the 2012 Business Plan

In an effort to be more accountable, transparent, and efficient in the management of the City's key priorities and financial resources, this report presents the third quarter results for the City of Saskatoon's 2012 Business Plan and Budget – *Investing in What Matters*, as at September 30, 2012.

The initiatives that are approved in the Business Plan have been sorted according to the Strategic Goals that were approved as part of the City of Saskatoon's Strategic Plan on February 6, 2012. The budget allocations are reported according to Business Lines.

Attachment 1 highlights the status of some projects in the 2012 Business Plan, as of September 30, 2012.

Over \$1B of Permitted Value of Construction

Of the \$1B of permitted value of construction so far this year, only five projects exceeded \$10M, and 115 projects had a value between \$1M and \$10M. At the end of October 2012, 2,705 residential units had been created, compared to 2,515 residential units in the same time period of 2011.

One-unit dwellings continue to dominate these statistics. New one-unit dwelling construction plus alterations to existing one-unit dwellings make up for approximately 60% of the permit numbers and approximately 40% of the construction value so far this year.

Of particular interest is that as of October 31, 2012, permitted value of construction has surpassed the 2011 year-end total by \$46M, and the number of permits issued is seven short of last year's year-end total. See Attachment 2 for Building Permit Statistics for YTD October 31, 2012, vs. YTD October 31, 2011.

Year-end Forecast of Just Over \$2M

A year-end surplus of just over \$2M is being forecasted based mostly on increased revenues.

Increased traffic fines and parking ticket revenues make up \$1.5M of the positive variance. In addition, over \$600,000 in the Province's Municipal Operating Grant was received following a census adjustment. Other major revenue increases come from Supplementary Property Taxes due to increased building activity and from lease revenue of City-owned property.

The Saskatoon Police Service is expected to be under budget by over \$700,000 as a result of increased government funding and fuel savings. The Environmental Health business line is expected to be over budget by \$1.4M due to lower Landfill revenues and staffing costs. Attachment 3 is the 2012 Year-end Projection for period ending September 30, 2012.

The Saskatoon Regional Economic Development Authority's Board of Directors reviewed tax abatement applications from DynaIndustrial Inc. and Deca Industries Ltd. It has been determined that both applications meet the eligibility requirements of the City of Saskatoon Business Development Incentives Policy, C09-014.

Dynalndustrial Inc. is proposing to construct a 12,000 sq. ft. expansion to their existing facility located at 3326 Faithfull Avenue. The company needs to expand due to current capacity restraints they have been experiencing. Dynalndustrial expects to commence with construction by late summer of 2012 and completion date of December of 2012.

Deca Industries Ltd. is planning to construct a new building of 36,800 sq. ft. located at 310 and 322 Robin Way and 111 Robin Crescent. As indicated on the plans submitted, the new structure will be built over the existing property lines of the following three parcels of land. The Office of the City Assessor has indicated these three parcels will be joined as a single description with a single assessed value as a result of their expansion. Construction is expected to start late summer of 2012 and a projected completion date of February 1, 2013.

Attached is a copy of an excerpt and attachments referred to therein from the minutes of meeting of City Council held on August 17, 2011 regarding the above matter. City Council resolved that consideration of the matter be deferred until such time as the Administration reports on the timing of the completion of the temporary extension of McOrmond Road.

The following is a report of the General Manager, Infrastructure Services Department dated September 20, 2011:

'RECOMMENDATION: 1

- that Option 1, the accelerated construction of McOrmond Drive between Evergreen Boulevard and Agra Road be approved, to facilitate the closure of Range Road 3045 between Keedwell Street and Agra Road;
- that a post budget increase in the amount of \$3,750,000 to 2011 Capital Project 655 - Arterial Road – McOrmond be approved;
- 3) that the \$3,750,000 post budget approval be funded from the Arterial Road Reserve; and
- 4) that Range Road 3045 remain open and maintained by the City using dust palliation until construction of Option 1 is completed, in October 2012.

BACKGROUND

City Council, at its meeting held on August 17, 2011, during Matters Requiring Public Notice, considered a report of the General Manager, Infrastructure Services Department, dated August 5, 2011, advising that a request had been made by the Community Services Department, Land Branch, as the developer of the Evergreen Neighbourhood, to close Range Road 3045, between Keedwell Street and Agra Road to relocate a 138 kV SaskPower line which is currently located west of Range Road 3045, to allow for further development of the Evergreen Neighbourhood.

Matters Requiring Public Notice 3a) Monday, September 26, 2011 Page Two

Council resolved that consideration of the matter be deferred until such time as the Administration reports on the timing of the completion of the temporary extension of McOrmond Drive.

REPORT

To facilitate the closure of Range Road 3045 and provide users of this road with a safe and convenient alternative, the Infrastructure Services Department considered two options for the construction of McOrmond Drive between Evergreen Boulevard and Agra Road.

<u>Option 1 – Accelerate the construction of the two-lane paved extension of McOrmond</u> <u>Drive from 2015 to 2012</u>

Construction of the two-lane paved extension of McOrmond Drive, from Evergreen Boulevard to Agra Road, is currently in the 2015 Capital Plan. Option 1 proposes that construction be accelerated to 2012, in order to provide an alternate access route for those who currently use Range Road 3045. If approved, the extension would be completed in October 2012, at an estimated cost of \$3,750,000, including street lighting. Range Road 3045 would remain open until construction is completed and the extension is opened to traffic. As a result, the 138 kV SaskPower line would not be relocated to the Range Road 3045 right-of-way until October 2012.

Option 2 - Construct a temporary two-lane gravel extension of McOrmond Drive

Constructing a temporary two-lane gravel extension of McOrmond Drive would be a more expensive alternative, as the permanent paved roadway would still be required at a later date. In order to minimize the additional costs, it would be built to the final design alignments and elevations as the paved extension. If approved, completion of this option would be scheduled for July 2012, at an estimated cost of \$1,750,000, including street lighting. Approximately \$150,000 of the \$1,750,000 would be "throw away" costs. To facilitate traffic while construction is in progress, Range Road 3045 would remain open until construction of the temporary gravel road is complete and opened to traffic. As a result, the 138 kV SaskPower line would not be relocated to the Range Road 3045 right-of-way until July 2012.

Matters Requiring Public Notice 3a) Monday, September 26, 2011 Page Three

In both Options, the existing 138kV SaskPower line scheduled for relocation runs through the Evergreen Neighbourhood and, due to its location, would prevent the Land Branch from selling approximately 50 lots that will be ready for sale in 2011. This would result in an approximate \$5,700,000 delay in revenue received through the sale of these lots. There are no schedule impacts with SaskPower to delay the relocation of the 138kV line to October or July 2012.

2) that the City Solicitor be instructed to complete the closing and obtain title in the name of the City of Saskatoon.

REPORT

A request has been made by the Community Services Department, Land Branch, as the developer of the Evergreen Neighbourhood, to close Range Road 3045, between Keedwell Street and Agra Road. The closure is required to relocate a 138 kV SaskPower line, currently located west of Range Road 3045, to allow for further development of the Evergreen Neighborhood.

The adjacent property owners that will be affected by this closure are Agriculture Canada and the University of Saskatchewan, who own farm land adjacent to Range Road 3045; and a resident who lives at the south west corner of the intersection of Range Road 3045 and Agra Road. The University of Saskatchewan has no objections to the closure, as they have an alternate access to their property, located east of Range Road 3045. Agriculture Canada requires the use of Range Road 3045 until such time as McOrmond Drive is constructed to their entrance, located north of Agra Road. The farm equipment they typically use is too large to travel through city streets. Agriculture Canada has indicated that they have no objection to the closure of Range Road 3045, as long as they have access to their property. The Administration is, therefore, willing to enter into an access agreement with Agriculture Canada, to allow them to use Range Road 3045 until McOrmond Drive is constructed to their entrance. Mr. Ken Rosaasen, resident at River's Edge, suggested that large truck signage be placed on Range Road 3045 and that McOrmond Road be finished ahead of the closure because of it being a main access route. He expressed the opinion that the current alternate route is not reasonable.

Mr. Tavis McPherson, resident at River's Edge, expressed that he is looking for a safe route and that money should be spent making Range Road 3045 a safe route.

Ms. Lorraine Sturgeon, resident at River's Edge, indicated that she submitted an informal petition containing approximately 64 signatures in favour of keeping Range Road 3045 from Keedwell Street to Agra Road open and accessible.

Mr. Dwayne Sturgeon, resident at River's Edge, questioned why the road needs to be closed for power lines.

General Manager, Infrastructure Services Gutek responded to questions of Council and provided a suggested solution regarding the alternate routes. He also indicated that Range Road 3045 could possibly remain open to traffic until the McOrmond Road extension to Agra Road has been dealt with, although it may delay the sale of some lots in Evergreen.

I would like to respond to the letter dated August 3, 2011 regarding the permanent closure of Range Road 3045. It is important that you are cognizant of the impact this closure will cause the residents of the Hamlet of River's Edge and of the surrounding farm community. You need to be aware that this new proposed closure will affect my daily access to food, health services, schools and emergency services.

Your alternate routes, range roads 3044 and 3050, are not options at this time as I value my family's safety. These two routes have deteriorated in the ten years I have lived here. Personally, the condition of these roads have caused safety issues for my family and friends: such as floods causing detours, washboard conditions making them difficult to drive, protruding rocks which cause damage to vehicles, improper road height causing winter snow drifting, large trucks and equipment ruining the integrity of the road and many more examples. We, as a community, have addressed our concerns about these roads to the city in the past with minimal results.

Our only safe route into the city is range road 3045. We appreciate all the effort to make this road drivable with regular maintenance. I would like to thank Bev Dubois for listening to our concerns and helping us obtain a safe and reliable route. It is unfortunate that so much time and effort was used to establish a dependable route in order for it to be inaccessible.

The recent letter from the City of Saskatoon informed us of the proposed closure of Range Road 3045 from Keedwell Street to Agra Road. We would like to file our objection to this closure as the need for the permanent closure has not been clearly articulated, appears to be premature, and it will adversely impact us and our neighbours in Rivers Edge Estates and the surrounding farm community.

The stated reason for the closure is the need for the construction of a high voltage power line. Discussions with Wilf Leduc, SaskPower construction supervisor of Evergreen indicated to us that there has been no order even submitted to SaskPower by the City of Saskatoon to move the line. As well, SaskPower would not close a road for power line construction. We called other individuals in the Ministry of Highways and Infrastructure to confirm that a permanent road closure is not a requirement for powerline construction.

Admittedly, the rapid growth of the City of Saskatoon creates planning challenges. The planning maps indicate that McOrmond Drive will be extended to the intersection of Agra Rd and RR 3045. This extension could be fast tracked and made a priority as it could then maintain reasonable access to the City for us and our neighbours.

The letter from the City suggests the alternative routes via RR 3050 and Agra Rd or by RR 3044. Both of these options are very unsatisfactory as alternative routes of access to the City. The access via Agra Rd where there was no requirement that it be kept open to traffic during construction has left it in shambles from the construction equipment during a wet year. There are also large rocks protruding between the Wildlife Centre and Central Avenue. Both roads need a clay cap and major gravelling to make them passable, even after a moderate amount of rainfall. Are these roads in the plan for long term use, or will Fedoruk Drive with limited access greatly reduce their traffic volume? The RR 3044 between Highway 41 and Agra Rd has flooded in five places during the spring run off and after major rains in each of the past two years. Clearly, major upgrading cost would be necessary to have these roads as reasonable access roads. RR 3044 also has an extremely dangerous turn off from Highway 41 when making a left turn, as there is no turning lane. Has the City approached the Ministry of Highways and Infrastructure to request a turning lane be provided for RR 3044?

Other letters from our Hamlet have communicated the problems of City access and the flooded roads that necessitated detours. Indeed, RR 3045 was recently improved and graveled, thanks to the City and the work of Bev Dubois. We did appreciate that upgrade.

We are aware that the residents of Willow Grove where their property backs RR 3045 are petitioning the City for reduced traffic on RR 3045 as individuals have gone so far as to place barriers on the road with a road closed sign! The road has recently been treated with dust retardant and a very low speed limit of 50 K has been posted. The complaints were for dust, traffic and especially heavy trucks. There are provisions to place weight limits on these roads, and improving the signage for the weight limits could perhaps alter the truck traffic patterns.

These concerns and suggestions have been communicated by telephone to Mike Gutek he has been very direct and professional in his responses.

We think the groups doing the housing and other developments would also welcome the early completion of McOrmond Drive to the junction of Agra Rd and RR 3045, especially if the weight restrictions on RR 3045 were enforced.

Please delay the closure of RR 3045 and time the closure with the opening of McOrmond Drive.

I would like to bring to your attention the condition of the two roads you refer to in the agenda as alternative routes given to those living north of Agra Rd.

Firstly, 3044 is NOT an option for anyone out here. It is not a level crossing. 3044 approaches Highway 41 at an odd angle and then at the last minute appears to end without meeting the highway. This is because it is lower than the highway and makes an abrupt and blind turn into the highway. You cannot see it – it is a blind intersection (I don't even want to call it an intersection). It has no signage and no lighting. It is very hard to find during the day and impossible at dusk or night. Asking us to come home from the city that way is putting our lives in danger. I would ask each of you to take this drive to the Hamlet of Riversedge Estates at night before suggesting to us that it is a safe route – please be very careful if you do, I don't want to put your lives at risk either.

Agra Rd would work if you put the resources into fixing it that you put into 3045 last year. You would have to build it up and gravel it.

McCormond Rd is the route we prefer to use - it will be replacing the now extinct Lowe Rd, which was our preferred route into the city.

If you cannot complete McCormond Rd now (even just building the base with gravel for the time being), or fix Agra Rd now, then please wait until you can do so before you close down RR3045.

4. Option to Renew

Subject to mutual agreement on the amount of rent, the Agreement may be renewed for one year and shall continue in force from year-to-year as agreed upon by the parties.

5. <u>Financial Terms</u>

The tenant is responsible for the construction, repair and maintenance of all improvements, fixtures and carpeting with the premises.

6. <u>Conditions Precedent</u>

Subject to approval by Saskatoon City Council.

7. Lease Termination

In addition to standard lease termination considerations, after the expiration of the Term, either party may terminate the Agreement by giving the other party six months' written notice of its intention to do so.

If the City requires additional space in City Hall in the future and the lease space occupied by the Credit Union is required by the City, then the City may terminate this Agreement by giving the Credit Union six months' written notice of its intention to do so.

2013 Business Plan and Budget – Highlights for Third Quarter Report

Continuous Improvement

- A health and safety audit was completed for the Parks Branch.
- A new electronic agenda management system is on track to be implemented in 2013 which will make it easier to access City Council and Committee agendas. This system will also make the preparation of these agendas far more efficient.

Asset and Financial Responsibility

Roads and Bridges

• The state of the infrastructure continues to be a priority, as the condition of roads and sidewalks are a significant issue for citizens. Reports have been prepared for City Council to consider on the state of sidewalks, paved roadways, bridges, and structures. City Council will be reviewing these reports and setting levels of service and related funding strategies.

Odour Abatement

• An Odour Abatement Study is complete for the Water/Wastewater Treatment Plant which will inform the design and construction of Odour Mitigation Technology for the Water/Wastewater Treatment Plant.

Quality of Life

Emergency Planning for Special Events

• A policy has been developed and approved by City Council that will guide emergency planning for special events in Saskatoon.

Improved physical access to programs and services

- The accessible playground in WW Ashley Park is complete.
- Curb ramps have been installed in numerous locations around the city, making it easier for people with mobility issues to move from the street to the sidewalk.
- Audible pedestrian signals are being installed at five key downtown intersections.

Outdoor Pavilion at the Forestry Farm Park and Zoo

• The outdoor Lions Event Pavilion at the Forestry Farm Park and Zoo was completed and is now available for special events and a public weather shelter.

New Mayfair Pool

• The newly constructed Mayfair Outdoor Pool was opened to the public on August 10, 2012.

Environmental Leadership

• Detailed design of the new Turboexpander Power Generation Facility was completed. This facility is expected to be operational in late 2013, and is expected to produce electricity for up to 600 homes with zero emissions.

Sustainable Growth

- A number of new parks are substantially complete in Stonebridge, Rosewood, Evergreen, Lakewood Suburban, and Hampton Village neighborhoods.
- Lots continue to be serviced in Evergreen, Rosewood, Hampton Village, and the Marquis Industrial Area.
- Work continues on the new trunk sewer extensions in Hampton Village, .Kensington, and on McOrmond Drive from Attridge Drive to Highway 5.

Moving Around

• Thirty buses have had hardware installed to provide real-time passenger information. This hardware is being tested and will be installed on the entire fleet.

Economic Diversity and Prosperity

- Building permits are on track for another record setting year by reaching the \$1B mark. Of the \$1B of permitted value of construction so far this year, only five projects exceeded \$10M, and 115 projects had a value between \$1M and \$10M. At the end of October 2012, 2,705 residential units have been created, compared to 2,515 residential units in the same time period of 2011.
- One-unit dwellings continue to dominate these statistics. New one-unit dwelling construction plus alterations to existing one-unit dwellings make up for approximately 60% of the permit numbers, and approximately 40% of the construction value so far this year.
- Of particular interest is that as of October 31, 2012, the permitted value of construction has surpassed the 2011 year-end total by \$46M, and the number of permits issued is seven short of last year's year-end total.

The variances noted above include the following:

- Continued city growth exceeds the initial budget assumptions. The actual 2012 tax roll will result in \$541,000 more in tax revenue than budgeted. Supplementary property assessment revenue is also projected to result in additional tax revenue of \$940,900.
- The initial budget for grants in lieu of taxes to the City assumed increased electrical rates. This assumption has been revised, resulting in an estimated \$798,900 shortfall in revenue.
- Actual results to September 30, 2012 for parking and traffic violations are higher than budgeted by \$1,483,300.
- The landfill tipping fee revenue is projected to be approximately \$600,000 less than budget due to an
 initial overstatement of budgeted revenues resulting from an increased proportion of small, subsidized
 loads, as well as changing waste patterns due to the new fee structure. In addition, expenditures on
 salaries are larger to accommodate construction and the complexities of filling in historically inefficientlyfilled areas to achieve optimization of the facility.
- The revenue budget from the recycling depot program includes a projection of proceeds from the revenue-sharing agreement with Cosmopolitan Industries based on the five-year average. These revenues are unlikely to be achieved in 2012.
- The water and wastewater utilities are projecting a \$2.675M shortfall in metered revenue due to lower consumption. It is anticipated that this will be funded by the utility's stabilization reserve, deferral of operating expenditures and a reduction to capital reserve contributions.
- The Saskatoon Light and Power budget assumed a SaskPower rate increase for 2012 that did not materialize. As a result a projected \$1.457M deficit is expected. Since the City's return on investment for SL&P was based on this rate assumption this deficit will impact the year end results.

BACKGROUND

The house located at 932 University Drive was built in 1931 for Mr. and Mrs. Walter English. It was designed by the architectural firm of Webster and Gilbert and is in the style of Spanish Mission or California Mission. This firm designed other buildings of this style, including the Little Chief Service Station and McGavin's Bakery (presently Earl's Restaurant) among others.

This dwelling has been a residence for a number of prominent Saskatoon citizens. Mr. Walter English came to Saskatoon in 1910 to work for A.L. Charlebois. Mr. English formed his own roofing firm and operated it from 1926 to 1960. In 1948, Mr. Harry Charmbury purchased the house. Mr. Charmbury was a professional photographer who moved to Saskatoon from Prince Albert in 1918. Most of his work was portraiture, photographing First Nations leaders, contracts for City Hall, and many other groups and events. Mr. Charmbury did early forensic and police work and played a role in setting up the Saskatoon Police Identification Department.

In 1976, the house was purchased by Dr. J.W.T Spinks and his wife. Dr. Spinks came to Saskatoon in 1930 and was employed by the University of Saskatchewan (U of S) as a chemistry professor. Dr. Spinks rose through the ranks and became president of the U of S in 1960 at age 52. Throughout his career as a professor, researcher, and university president, Dr. Spinks had many accomplishments and received many accolades. He was appointed a Companion to the Order of Canada in 1970, and in 1985 was named Saskatoon's Citizen of the Year.

The owner of the property has requested designation as a Municipal Heritage Property. The City of Saskatoon (City) conducted a Heritage Structure Evaluation for this dwelling and through that process determined that it is eligible for Municipal Heritage Designation (see Attachment 1).

REPORT

Eligibility of the Property for Formal Heritage Recognition

Based on the formal evaluation, your Administration is of the opinion that the exterior of the building is eligible for designation as a Municipal Heritage Property for the following reasons:

- 1. It is an excellent example of a Spanish/California Mission style house.
- 2. The home is in excellent condition and the architectural features that contribute to the building have been preserved in their original condition.
- 3. The building was designed by the firm Webster and Gilbert, who designed other buildings of this style.
- 4. The dwelling has been home to prominent Saskatoon citizens, including Walter English, Harry Charmbury, and Dr. J.W.T. Spinks.

The dwelling at 932 University Drive is a very unique architectural gem in the Nutana neighbourhood. The dwelling was built in 1931 and can be described as being of the Spanish/California Mission style. The dwelling has many features that contribute to this style, including a stucco exterior, clay tile roof, arched windows, wrought iron grillwork and railings, and a sunken patio. The property is in excellent condition and has very few alterations.

Heritage Conservation Program

Financial assistance available under the Heritage Conservation Program includes a property tax abatement of up to 50 percent of costs related to the restoration of architectural elements and renovation to meet building code requirements where it affects heritage elements of the building. The abatement is to be amortized over ten years. Within that ten-year period, the owner may make more than one application, as long as the total dollar amount of the abatement is under \$150,000, which is the maximum available under the program. Additional assistance includes a refund of 50 percent of any building permit fees related to eligible costs.

The owner is applying for funding to the Heritage Conservation Program to paint the exterior of the dwelling. The cost is estimated to be \$5,200 and it is eligible for funding under the program. A building permit is not required for the work being undertaken.

OPTIONS

City Council has the option of not designating this building as a Municipal Heritage Property and not providing relevant funding.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

The proposal complies with Civic Heritage Policy No. C10-020 dated December 16, 1996.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The tax abatement for the proposed rehabilitation work at 932 University Drive will be funded from the Heritage Reserve Fund. The tax abatement, to a maximum amount of \$2,600, will be amortized over a ten-year timeframe. The current balance in this reserve is \$279,092.40, which is sufficient to fund this request.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no environmental and/or greenhouse gas implications.

RECOMMENDATION:

- that City Council approve a five-year tax abatement equivalent to 75 percent of the incremental taxes for the redevelopment of 1002 22nd Street West;
- 2) that the five-year tax abatement take effect in the next taxation year following completion of the project; and
- 3) that the City Solicitor be requested to prepare the appropriate agreement, and that His Worship the Mayor and the City Clerk be authorized to execute the agreement under the Corporate Seal.

BACKGROUND

During its March 7, 2011 meeting, City Council approved the Vacant Lot and Adaptive Reuse (VLAR) Incentive Program. The VLAR Incentive Program is designed to encourage infill development on chronically vacant sites and adaptive reuse of vacant buildings within Saskatoon's established neighbourhoods.

Applicants have the choice of a five-year tax abatement or a grant, with the maximum incentive amount calculation based on the increment between the existing municipal taxes and the taxes owing upon completion, multiplied by five years. Applications are scored against an evaluation system where points are awarded for features included in a project that meet a defined set of policy objectives. The score out of 100 that a project earns determines what proportion of the maximum incentive amount it receives.

REPORT

On July 6, 2012, the Planning and Development Branch, Neighbourhood Planning Section, received an application under the VLAR Incentive Program from the Saskatoon Conservatory of Music for the construction of a music school at 1002 22nd Street West in the Westmount neighbourhood. A two-storey structure is proposed that will accommodate a combination of offices, classroom and instructional areas, and a café on the main floor. The Saskatoon Conservatory of Music offers instruction for a variety of musical instruments to all ages in both individual and group settings.

The project is located on a site where a used car dealership had previously operated until November 2008. The only existing improvements to the property are perimeter fencing and a small commercial outbuilding of nominal value. Your Administration feels that when assessing this application's eligibility under the VLAR Incentive Program, this site can be considered effectively vacant for the required 48 months; similar to how a surface parking lot is assessed as vacant and eligible under the program.

The application was reviewed using the program's evaluation system to determine the percentage of the total maximum incentive amount for the project. All proposals are automatically granted 50 base points. Additional points are awarded for development features that achieve a range of policy objectives, up to a maximum of 100 points.

The project at 1002 22nd Street West received a total of 75 points out of 100, for 75 percent of the maximum incentive amount. The project received 50 base points, plus 15 points for mixed-use development by combining the music school with a publicly accessible café at-grade, 5 points for being located approximately 200 metres from an existing transit stop, and 5 points for including sustainable features, such as high-efficiency mechanical systems and double pane low-E windows.

The applicant is applying for a five-year tax abatement of the incremental property taxes. According to the Assessment Branch, Corporate Services Department, the incremental increase in annual property taxes for the property is estimated to be \$9,500, based on the 2012 tax year. The maximum incentive amount would be \$9,500 multiplied by five years, or \$47,500. The value of this abatement over the five-year period, based on an earned incentive amount of 75 percent, is estimated to be \$35,625.

After a review of this application, your Administration has concluded that this project is consistent with the intent of VLAR Incentive Policy No. C09-035. Your Administration is recommending that City Council approve the five-year property tax abatement commencing in the next taxation year after completion of the project.

OPTIONS

City Council could decline support for this project. Choosing this option would represent a departure from VLAR Incentive Policy No. C09-035. Your Administration is not recommending this option.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no policy implications.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The incremental property tax abatement for the project at 1002 22nd Street West is forgone revenue and will not impact the VLAR Incentive Reserve. However, the City of Saskatoon will forgo 75 percent of the increase in tax revenue resulting from this project over a five-year period.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no environmental and/or greenhouse gas implications.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is for City Council to approve the establishment of the Saskatoon Private Swimming Pools Appeal Board.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. Amendments to The Private Swimming Pools Bylaw, 2000, Bylaw No. 7981 (Swimming Pool Bylaw) were adopted by City Council on May 28, 2012.
- 2. One of the amendments to the Swimming Pool Bylaw was the addition of an Order to Remedy process.
- 3. The addition of an Order to Remedy process to the Swimming Pool Bylaw now requires the establishment of the Saskatoon Private Swimming Pools Appeal Board.

STRATEGIC GOAL

This report supports the following City of Saskatoon's Strategic Goal:

- 1. Quality of Life Saskatoon is a warm, welcoming people place.
 - a. Long-term Priority coordinate a corporate approach for the maintenance of properties (i.e. Public Safety).

BACKGROUND

The Swimming Pool Bylaw was last amended in 2000, and as a result, some of the Bylaw terms have become difficult to administer. Proposed amendments, included in Report No. 6-2012 of the Planning and Operations Committee, were approved by City Council at its April 16, 2012 meeting at which time the City Solicitor was instructed to amend the Bylaw. One of the amendments proposed in the report was the addition of an "Order to Remedy" process to ensure that Bylaw contraventions discovered during inspections could be remedied. The addition of an Order to Remedy process to the

Swimming Pool Bylaw requires the establishment of an appeals board in order for appeals of Orders to Remedy to be considered.

REPORT

At its April 16, 2012 meeting, City Council considered Report No. 6-2012 of the Planning and Operations Committee, and instructed the City Solicitor to amend the Swimming Pool Bylaw. The amendments contained within that report were adopted by City Council, at its May 28, 2012 meeting. The amendments were then codified into The Private Swimming Pools Bylaw, 2000, Bylaw No. 7981 on May 28, 2012.

Enforcement under this Swimming Pool Bylaw now includes Order to Remedy, by which a Building Inspector can require the owner or occupant of a property to remedy contraventions of the Bylaw within a specified time frame. The Swimming Pool Bylaw also stipulates that those who wish to appeal an Order to Remedy may appeal to the Saskatoon Private Swimming Pools Appeal Board. The Saskatoon Private Swimming Pools Appeal Board would hear and determine the appeal of any person aggrieved by an order under the Swimming Pool Bylaw in accordance with Section 329 of the *Cities Act.* The Saskatoon Private Swimming Pools Appeal Board must now be established so appeals can be considered.

It is recommended that the appointees to the Saskatoon Private Swimming Pools Appeal Board be the same five individuals who sit on the Property Maintenance Appeal Board.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

A Saskatoon Private Swimming Pools Appeal Board could be established with members other than those on the Property Maintenance Appeal Board. The Administration does not support this option as it is expected that a small number of appeals will be made and since the Property Maintenance Appeal Board is already equipped to deal with very similar types of appeals, it would be a duplication of services to create a separate board for swimming pool appeals.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no policy implications.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no financial implications.

PUBLIC AND/OR STAKEHOLDER INVOLVEMENT

A copy of the Swimming Pool Bylaw is to be provided with each swimming pool construction permit that is issued.

The Private Swimming Pools Bylaw, 2000

Codified to Bylaw No. 9027 (May 28, 2012)

BYLAW NO. 7981

The Private Swimming Pools Bylaw, 2000

The Council of The City of Saskatoon enacts:

Short Title

1. This Bylaw may be cited as The Private Swimming Pools Bylaw, 2000.

Purpose

- 2. The purpose of this Bylaw is:
 - (a) to control and regulate the construction, erection, maintenance, repair and demolition of private swimming pools; and
 - (b) to specify, regulate and enforce the use of safety measures in connection with private swimming pools.

Definitions

- 3. In this Bylaw,
 - (a) "City" means The City of Saskatoon;
 - (a.1) "climbable member" means any part of a fence which is capable of being used as a foothold for a person and includes a horizontal or diagonal member, but does not include chain link fencing having a wire core of not less than 11 gauge and mesh size of not more than 50 millimetres;
 - (b) "horizontal structural member" means a main part of a fence to which other parts are attached and which runs horizontally;
 - (b.1) "municipal inspector" means an employee or agent of the City appointed by the Manager of the Building Standards Branch of the Community Services Department or the General Manager of the Fire and Protective Services Department for the City of Saskatoon to act as a municipal inspector for the purposes of this Bylaw;

- (c) "occupant" includes a person residing at a property upon which a private swimming pool is situate or a person entitled to the property's possession if there is no person residing there and a leaseholder;
- (d) "owner" means a person who has any right, title, estate or interest in a property upon which a private swimming pool is situate;
- (e) "private swimming pool" means an artificially created basin, lined with concrete, fibreglass, vinyl or similar material, intended to contain water for the use of persons for swimming, diving, wading or other similar activity, which is at least 600 millimetres in depth, and includes pools situated on top of the ground and hot tubs;
- (f) "public" means all persons other than the owner or occupant; and
- (g) "vertical member" means a vertical part of a fence to which other parts are attached.

Application

4. Except as otherwise provided, this Bylaw applies to all private swimming pools, including those in existence prior to the passage of this Bylaw.

Permit

- 5. (1) A person must obtain a swimming pool construction permit from the City prior to the construction, erection or demolition of a private swimming pool.
 - (2) In order to obtain a swimming pool construction permit, a person must file an application in the prescribed form in writing with the City which includes a site plan and pool specifications and pay the applicable fee.
 - (3) The applicable fee shall be calculated on the basis of the current fee per \$1,000.00 of construction value set out in Schedule "A" as applied to the estimate of construction value of the proposed swimming pool.
 - (4) For the purposes of subsection (3), the estimate of construction value shall be the tender price quoted for construction of the private swimming pool or a reasonable estimate for construction of the private swimming pool as submitted by the applicant for a swimming pool construction permit, and acceptable to the City.
 - (5) Notwithstanding subsection (3), the minimum swimming pool construction permit fee shall be \$100.00.

Enclosure

- 6. (1) Every private swimming pool must be enclosed in accordance with this Section.
 - (2) The enclosure must be built prior to the swimming pool being filled with water.
 - (3) The enclosure must be properly maintained to comply with this Bylaw at all times.
 - (4) The enclosure must be constructed so as to minimize the risk of unauthorized entry into the pool area by a member of the public by crawling under, climbing over, or climbing through. The enclosure must meet the following minimum standards:
 - (a) the enclosure must have a minimum height of 1.5 metres measured on the exterior, or non-pool, side from the top of the enclosure to the nearest platform, deck or grade;
 - (b) where an enclosure is a chain link fence, the mesh size must not exceed 50 millimetres and the wire core must not be less than 11 gauge;
 - (c) where an enclosure fence is constructed of any material other than chain link:
 - (i) horizontal structural members or other climbable members located on or accessible from the outside or non-pool side of the fence must be placed so that there is one continuous vertical separation of a minimum of 1,100 millimetres maintained between such members, as illustrated in Schedule "B", along any portion of the fence which is accessible to the public; and
 - (ii) there is no prescribed minimum separation required between horizontal structural members or other climbable members located on the inside or pool side of the fence;
 - (d) the gap or space between grade and the bottom of the enclosure must not exceed 100 millimetres;
 - (e) maximum permissible gaps or openings between vertical members of an enclosure are as follows:
 - (i) gaps or openings of up to 100 millimetres are permitted between vertical members of an enclosure fence if one continuous vertical separation of a minimum of 1,100 millimetres is maintained between horizontal structural members or other climbable members along the entirety of the fence, as illustrated in Schedule "B";

- (ii) gaps or openings of up to 20 millimetres are permitted if horizontal structural members or other climbable members are located less than 1,100 millimetres apart along any portion of the enclosure; and
- (iii) notwithstanding subclause 6(4)(e)(i) and (ii), there is no prescribed limit to the size of gaps or openings in that portion of the enclosure having an elevation of greater than 1.5 metres above grade.

Gates and Self-Closing Devices

- 7. (1) A gate which forms part of an enclosure must comply with the following:
 - (a) a gate must comply with the requirements for fences in Section 6(4) of this Bylaw;
 - (b) all gates must be installed to swing outward in the direction away from the swimming pool;
 - (c) all gates must be equipped with a self-closing device designed to return the gate to the closed position after each use, a self-latching device designed to hold the gate in the closed position after each use, and a locking device;
 - (d) the self-closing device, the self-latching device and the locking device must be maintained in working order at all times; and
 - (e) all gates must be anchored to fixed posts or secure structures on both the hinge and latch sides.
 - (2) The requirement in Section 7(1)(b) does not apply to swimming pools constructed before the passage of this Bylaw.

Securing of Swimming Pool

8. When a swimming pool is not attended by the owner or occupant, gates, doors and other entrances to the swimming pool area must be locked.

Hot Tubs

9. In the case of a private swimming pool which is a hot tub the requirements of Sections 5, 6, 7 and 8 of this Bylaw do not apply if all of the following provisions are complied with:

- (a) the hot tub does not exceed 2.4 metres across the widest portion of the water surface;
- (b) the hot tub has a cover with the strength to support the weight of an adult walking across the top;
- (c) the hot tub has a lockable device to prevent access to the water by unauthorized persons; and
- (d) the cover is maintained in place and locked at all times when the hot tub is unsupervised.

Walkway

- 10. (1) Within the enclosure, a swimming pool must have a properly maintained access walkway around the swimming pool with a minimum width of 750 millimetres.
 - (1.1) The walkway required pursuant to subsection (1) must be placed so that it is no more than 1,200 millimetres below the top rim of an above-ground swimming pool.
 - (2) The requirement found in subsections 10(1) and (1.1) does not apply to swimming pools constructed before June 7, 1971.

Safety Devices

- 11. The owner or occupant must have the following equipment present at the swimming pool at all times:
 - (a) a reaching pole of sufficient length to reach mid-pool;
 - (b) a first aid kit; and
 - (c) a buoy and rope of sufficient length to reach across the swimming pool.

Drainage System

12. (1) A swimming pool must have a discharge system which allows the swimming pool to drain into the sanitary sewer of the property upon which the swimming pool is located and which complies with all relevant legislation governing plumbing and drainage. The rate of discharge must not exceed 90 litres a minute.

(2) No person shall drain the water of a swimming pool into any adjacent public or private property or any street, lane or walkway.

Inspections

- 12.1 (1) The inspection of property by the City to determine whether this Bylaw is being complied with is hereby authorized.
 - (2) Inspections under this Bylaw shall be carried out in accordance with Section 324 of *The Cities Act*.
 - (3) No person shall obstruct a municipal inspector who is authorized to conduct an inspection under this Section, or a person who is assisting a municipal inspector.

Order to Remedy Contravention

- 12.2 (1) If a municipal inspector finds that a person is contravening this Bylaw, the municipal inspector may, by written order, require the owner or occupant of the property to which the contravention relates to remedy the contravention.
 - (2) Orders given under this Bylaw shall comply with Section 328 of *The Cities Act*.
 - (3) Orders given under this Bylaw shall be served in accordance with Section 347 of *The Cities Act.*

Registration of Notice of Order

12.3 If an order is issued pursuant to Section 12.2, the City may, in accordance with Section 328 of *The Cities Act*, give notice of the existence of the order by registering an interest against the title to the land that is the subject of the order.

Appeal of Order to Remedy

- 12.4 (1) A person may appeal an order made pursuant to Section 12.2 in accordance with Section 329 of *The Cities Act*.
 - (2) Appeals shall be made initially to the Saskatoon Private Swimming Pools Appeal Board, which Board is hereby established.
 - (3) The Board shall consist of five members appointed by Council. A quorum shall consist of three members.

City Remedying Contraventions

12.5 The City may, in accordance with Section 330 of *The Cities Act*, take whatever actions or measures necessary to remedy a contravention of this Bylaw.

Civil Action to Recover Costs

12.6 The City may, in accordance with Section 332 of *The Cities Act*, collect any unpaid expenses and costs incurred in remedying a contravention of this Bylaw by civil action for debt in a court of competent jurisdiction.

Adding Amounts to Tax Roll

12.7 The City may, in accordance with Section 333 of *The Cities Act*, add any unpaid expenses and costs incurred by the City in remedying a contravention of this Bylaw to the taxes on the property on which the work was done.

Emergencies

12.8 In the event that it becomes an emergency to remedy a contravention of this Bylaw, the City may take whatever actions or measures necessary to eliminate the emergency in accordance with the provisions of Section 331 of *The Cities Act*.

Offences and Penalties

- 13. (1) Every person who contravenes a provision of this Bylaw is guilty of an offence and liable on summary conviction to a minimum fine of \$100.00 and a maximum fine of \$1,000.00.
 - (2) A conviction for a contravention of any provision of this Bylaw does not relieve the person convicted from complying with this Bylaw, and the convicting judge or justice may, in addition to the fine imposed, order the person to do any act or work, within a specified time, to comply with the Bylaw.
 - (3) The Court may, in default of payment of a fine imposed under this Bylaw, order imprisonment of an individual for a term not exceeding one year.

Bylaw No. 7055 Repealed

14. The Swimming Pool Bylaw No. 7055 is repealed.

Coming into Force

15. This Bylaw comes into force on the day of its final passing.

The following items were found to be in contravention of the requirements of Bylaw 7981 (Private Swimming Pools Bylaw - 2000):

CONTRAVENTION(S)

1. No first aid kit.

YOU ARE HEREBY ORDERED to carry out the following work and call for an inspection to confirm compliance by no later than December 18, 2012.

1. Provide a first aid kit as required for the pool.

All work shall conform to the requirements of Bylaw 7981 (Private Swimming Pools Bylaw - 2000).

(continued on Pg. 2)

It is an offence to fail to comply with an order made pursuant to Bylaw 7981 (Private Swimming Pools Bylaw - 2000). Upon conviction an individual is liable to a fine of not more than \$1000.00.

Bylaw 7981 (Private Swimming Pools Bylaw - 2000) establishes the right to appeal an Order and the procedure for appealing an Order. Appealing an order does not constitute a Stay of an Order.

YOU MAY APPEAL the order of a municipal inspector in accordance with s. 12.4 of Bylaw 7981 (Private Swimming Pools Bylaw - 2000) within fifteen (15) days after service of the Order to:

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: that a report be submitted to City Council recommending:

- that the Memorandum of Understanding between the City of Saskatoon and the user organizations on the charitable corporation, Friends of the Bowl Foundation Inc., be approved as outlined in Attachment 1 of this report;
- 2) that the City of Saskatoon approve the appointment of the Friends of the Bowl Foundation Inc.'s first Board of Directors, as follows:
 - a) to appoint five founding organization representatives to a two-year term that will expire at the October 31, 2014 Annual General Meeting as outlined in Attachment 2; and
 - b) to appoint five members at large to a one-year term that will expire at the October 31, 2013 Annual General Meeting as outlined in Attachment 2;
- that City Council declare the Gordon Howe Bowl Upgrades as a municipal project in order to provide for the issuance of charitable donation receipts for donations received from the community;
- 4) that the Corporate Services Department, Revenue Branch, be authorized and directed to accept donations for this project and to issue appropriate receipts to donors who contribute to the project; and
- 5) that the Mayor and City Clerk be authorized to execute, on behalf of the City of Saskatoon, the Memorandum of Understanding and other incorporation documents and resolution to appoint the Board noted above, in relation to the Friends of the Bowl Foundation Inc., as prepared by the Office of the City Solicitor.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to inform City Council and seek approval on the following:

- 1) Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that establishes the role of each user organization in the non-profit charitable corporation named the "Friends of the Bowl Foundation Inc." (Foundation);
- 2) appointment of the initial Board of Directors; and
- 3) declaration of the Gordon Howe Bowl Upgrades as a municipal project.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. A MOU collaboratively developed between the City of Saskatoon (City) and user organizations identifies the role of each organization within the charitable corporation that has been established to seek donations to improve sport facilities within the Gordon Howe Park (Park);
- 2. The initial ten Directors of the Board are recommended for approval. Five Directors representing the founding organizations serve a two-year term that will expire at the Annual General Meeting on October 31, 2014, and five remaining directors at large serve a one-year term that will expire at the Annual General Meeting on October 31, 2013;
- 3. A non-profit corporation registered under the name "Friends of the Bowl Foundation Inc." is to be established for the purpose of fundraising for the Gordon Howe Bowl and Park; and
- 4. That the Gordon Howe Bowl Upgrades project be declared a municipal project in order to provide issuance of charitable donation receipts.

STRATEGIC GOALS

This report supports the following City of Saskatoon's Strategic Goals:

- 1) Asset and Financial Sustainability Saskatoon invests in what matters.
 - a) Long-Term Strategy Increase revenue sources and reduce reliance on residential property taxes;
 - b) Long-Term Strategy Reduce the gap in funding required to rehabilitate and maintain our infrastructure;
 - i) Long-Term Priority Establish levels of service for rehabilitation of assets and identify supporting financial strategies;
 - ii) Long-Term Priority Develop funding strategies for expenses related to new capital expenditures; and
- 2) Quality of Life Saskatoon is a warm, welcoming people place.

 a) Long-Term Strategy – Ensure existing and future leisure centres, and other recreational facilities, are accessible physically and financially and meet community needs.

BACKGROUND

Current demand for football league play at the Gordon Howe Bowl provides no rest for the natural grass field during the peak season. The combined heavy use and weather damage causes the field to deteriorate to a point, in the later part of the season, that the playing surface is unsafe and increases the chance of injury to the athletes. In addition, there are a number of sport organizations within the community who have expressed an interest in Gordon Howe Bowl as a sports rental facility; however, the natural grass turf field has prevented an expansion of user groups such as football, ultimate frisbee, and soccer, to access Gordon Howe Bowl. Installation of an artificial turf field would allow Gordon Howe Bowl to accommodate multiple user groups from late spring until late fall and to create a reliable playing surface.

During its May 28, 2012 meeting, City Council received and approved a report from the General Manager, Community Services Department, recommending:

- (1) that the Administration proceed to establish a Gordon Howe Bowl Foundation for the purpose of fundraising for the Gordon Howe Bowl upgrades in this report;
- 2) that a Gordon Howe Bowl Foundation be established based on the guiding principles and processes attached; and
- 3) that the financial support to establish the Gordon Howe Bowl Foundation and to fund the capital improvement to the Gordon Howe Bowl be approved."

REPORT

Memorandum of Understanding

A MOU is a written agreement between the City and the following founding organizations of the Foundation: Saskatoon Amateur Softball Association (SASA); Saskatoon Hilltops Football Club (Hilltops); and the Saskatoon Secondary Schools Athletic Directorate (SSSAD). The SSSAD has one representative from each of the Greater Saskatoon Catholic Schools and the Saskatoon Public School Division.

The MOU:

a) outlines the common understanding of the working relationship between the founding participants;

- b) provides structure for the working relationship, and an understanding of the role of the user organizations within the Foundation;
- c) outlines the fundraising priorities of the Foundation; and
- d) identifies the rights and obligations of the founding participants.

Attachment 1 is a copy of the MOU that the City has established in collaboration with the founding organizations. Following is a summary of the significant terms of the MOU:

- 1. The City wishes to establish the Foundation that will seek government, corporate, and individual donations to improve the Gordon Howe Bowl and Park;
- 2. The Park includes the Gordon Howe Bowl, Bob Van Impe Field, J.F. Cairns Field, Leakos Field, Geoff Hughes Park, Glenn Reeves Fields, and the Clarence Downey Speed Skating Oval;
- 3. The goals for the fundraising projects for the Park are set forth in the Gordon Howe Bowl Master Plan. In particular, beginning with Gordon Howe Bowl, the parties agree that the order of the projects shall be:
 - a) artificial turf football field;
 - b) lights;
 - c) score clock;
 - d) sound system; and
 - e) multi-purpose building;
- 4. All funds collected and administered by the Foundation shall be released for the purpose of the priority projects at the Park that have been agreed upon by the directors of charitable corporation;
- 5. The term of the Agreement between the City and signatory user groups is seven years, commencing on November 1, 2012, and ending on October 31, 2019;
- 6. The Foundation shall put forward to the City the names of a maximum of up to 12 individuals that agree to serve as Directors on the Foundation, and in turn, the City shall present these names as Directors to City Council for approval;
- 7. The parties agree to work cooperatively with each other, and with other parties that have agreed to serve on the Foundation, so that the capital and fundraising goals are established and met, so far as this is practical;
- 8. Corporate control and oversight speaks to the Foundation remaining in good standing with the Saskatchewan regulatory authorities;

- 9. The parties agree that the Foundation shall organize and arrange for any construction at the Park as a result of the fundraising efforts of the Foundation, and this shall include managing any Requests for Proposals or tenders, administering any contracts, and supervising any construction, unless the parties agree otherwise;
- 10. The parties agree that the Foundation may explore a management model for the operations of the Gordon Howe Bowl and/or the other facilities within the Gordon Howe Park for consideration by the City;
- 11. Each party may terminate the Agreement with six months prior written notice; and
- 12. The founding organizations, SASA, the Hilltops and SSSAD, are not exposing their organizations to legal liability by assuming a leading role in the Foundation. The City, as sole member of the Foundation, will indemnify the organizations from claims in relation to Foundation work or projects and be responsible for obtaining the appropriate insurance as the work proceeds.

Non-Profit Corporation Status

The Foundation has been registered under the name "Friends of the Bowl Foundation Inc." The Articles of Incorporation identify that the Foundation will have one member, the City, who will appoint directors to the Foundation. The governing bylaws of Incorporation are being developed by the Administration and initial Board of Directors, and will be submitted to City Council for approval in due course. The Articles of Incorporation and governing bylaws will provide further clarity on how the Foundation will function.

Appointment of Initial Directors to the Foundation

The City and the founding organizations of the Foundation (i.e. SASA, Hilltops, and SSSAD) have submitted names of individuals to be appointed to the initial Board of Directors. The founding organization representatives will serve a two-year term, to a maximum of a three-year term, starting November 1, 2012, which will expire at the 2014 Annual General Meeting. The remaining five Directors at large will serve a one-year term, starting November 1, 2013 Annual General Meeting.

Attachment 2 provides the list of founding organization representatives and members at large recommended to be appointed to the Foundation. The appointments of Foundation Directors are for a term of one or two years to ensure there is some retention of knowledge, operation, and experience over time.

Next Steps of Incorporation

The next steps in the incorporation process are as follows:

- 1) completion of the Articles of Incorporation and governing Bylaw Number One; and
- 2) bring forward a resolution to City Council to approve Bylaw Number One.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

City Council may choose not to approve the recommendations contained within this report. Your Administration is not recommending this option because it is contrary to the direction previously provided by City Council, and alternative funding sources would have to be found if the Gordon Howe Bowl Upgrades were to move forward without funding from the Foundation.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no policy implications.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Your Administration will identify \$600,000 in Capital Project No. 2349 – Gordon Howe Bowl Upgrades, as part of the 2013 Business Plan and Budget review. As outlined in Table 1 below, in 2013, the capital project will begin the first phase of the project that includes artificial turf, score clock, sound system and outdoor field lighting.

The Hilltops, SSSAD, and SASA are supportive of the MOU as indicated in the attached letters from each organization (see Attachment 3). Once the MOU is approved by City Council, the Administration will hold additional meetings with other potential stakeholders and the community.

COMMUNICATION PLAN

The Foundation, in consultation with the Marketing Section, Community Services Department, will be developing a communication plan.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

The recommendation has resource and/or waste implications that have not been quantified at this time and will be included in a future report.

PRIVACY IMPACT

There are no privacy implications.

Memorandum of Understanding

This Agreement effective the 1st day of November, 2012.

Between:

The City of Saskatoon, a municipal corporation pursuant to the provisions of *The Cities Act*, S.S. 2002, Chapter C-11.1 (the "City")

- and -

********, a non-profit charitable corporation pursuant to the provisions of *The Non-profit Corporations Act, 1995*, S.S. 1995, Chapter N-4.2 (the "Corporation")

Background

- A. The City owns and operates the Gordon Howe Park (the "Park") that includes the following sport facilities: Gordon Howe Bowl, Bob Van Impe Field, J.F. Cairns Field, Leakos Field, Geoff Hughes Park, Glen Reeve Fields, and the Clarence Downy Speed Skating Oval.
- B. The Corporation and its members and the athletes it represents has for many years utilized the sport facilities mentioned within the Park.
- C. The City wishes to establish a foundation, the Friends of the Bowl Foundation Inc. (the "Foundation"), that would seek government, corporate and individual donations that would be used to improve the sport facilities within the Park.
- D. The Corporation wishes to play a role and have one or more of its executive officers assume a director role on the Foundation, and generally assist in the fundraising goals that the Foundation may establish from time to time.
- E. This Agreement outlines the terms under which the City and the Corporation agree to assist one another with the single goal of improving the sport facilities within the Park.

Term

- 1. (1) The term of this Agreement is seven (7) years, commencing November 1, 2012, and ending October 31, 2019 (the "Term").
 - (2) At some time in the fifth year of the Term, the parties shall meet and review this Agreement and the progress and timelines for the completion

of projects undertaken in accordance with this Agreement. The purpose of this review is to confirm the order of the projects, reassess fundraising goals and methods and review the terms of this Agreement.

Goals

- 2. (1) The parties agree that the Foundation shall put forward to the City the names of up to 12 individuals that agree to serve as directors on the Foundation, and in turn, the City shall present these names for approval as directors to City Council.
 - (2) The parties agree that the goals for the fundraising projects for the Park shall be as set forth in the Gordon Howe Park Master Plan, a copy of which is attached as Schedule "A" to this Agreement.
 - (3) In particular, the parties agree that the order of the projects shall be as follows: Gordon Howe Bowl artificial turf football field; lights, score clock, sound system and multi-purpose building, other projects in relation to Gordon Howe Bowl and then other projects in relation to the Park, as outlined in Schedule "B" to this Agreement.
 - (4) Further, the parties agree that all funds collected and administered by the Foundation shall be released in such a manner so that the order of the projects at the Park that have been agreed upon by the directors of the Foundation is respected.
 - (5) The parties agree to work cooperatively with each other, and with other parties that have agreed to serve on the Foundation, so that the capital and fundraising goals are established and met.
 - (6) In the event a unique logo is created for the Foundation, the parties agree that the Foundation shall retain ownership and copyright in any such logo. However, the Corporation shall be granted during the Term of this Agreement an unrestricted, paid up, royalty-free license to use the logo for the benefit of the Corporation or the Foundation.
 - (7) As well, the parties agree that if the Foundation ceases operations, is wound up, struck, becomes bankrupt, or otherwise stops carrying on business then the logo shall become the property of the City through a donation of the same for the benefit of the Park.

Corporate Control and Oversight

- 3. (1) During the Term, the Corporation shall remain in good standing with the Saskatchewan regulatory authorities with respect to: corporate status and finance.
 - (2) During the Term, if a representative of the Corporation that serves on the Foundation, resigns, is removed, or is no longer able to serve in this capacity, the Corporation shall put forward the name of a replacement for approval in the same manner as the previous director.

Construction Projects and Management

- 4. (1)The parties agree that the Foundation shall organize and arrange for any construction at the Park as a result of the fundraising efforts of the Foundation, and this shall include requests for proposals or tenders, administering any contracts in relation to the same, and supervising any construction, unless the parties agree otherwise. Regardless of whether the Foundation undertakes the construction role or the City, the parties agree that the City shall be responsible for insuring all construction projects and indemnifying both the Corporation and the directors or officers of the Corporation that serve on the board of directors for the Foundation in respect of any claims in relation to the fundraising, calling for proposals, tendering, construction projects or management or other aspects of the work of the Foundation that are undertaken for the benefit of the City, excepting those claims that are due to an act or omission of the Corporation.
 - (2) The parties agree that the Foundation and/or any participating partner of the Foundation may explore a management model for the operation of the Gordon Howe Bowl and/or the other facilities within the Park for consideration by the City.

Rights of Termination

- 5. (1) The City may terminate this Agreement upon providing the Corporation with 6 months' prior written notice thereof.
 - (2) The Corporation may terminate this Agreement upon providing the City with 6 months' prior written notice thereof.

Waiver and Indemnity

- 6. (1) The Corporation shall not be liable for or in any way be responsible to the City or the Foundation for:
 - (a) any death or injury of any person arising from any occurrence relating to fundraising for the Park;
 - (b) any loss of or damage howsoever caused to the property of the other parties; and
 - (c) any loss to, injury or damage suffered by the City or the Foundation or other persons which is in the nature of direct or indirect or consequential loss, injury, or damage of any nature except to the extent that the same is caused by the negligence of the Corporation.
 - (2) The City shall be responsible for any damages to the Corporation or any member of the public for any act or omission done or caused by the City. The City shall at all times hereinafter save, defend and hold harmless and fully indemnify the Corporation from and against any and all claims, demands, losses, costs, charges, damages and expenses whatsoever that may in any way arise in connection with the fundraising for or construction projects undertaken at the Park.

General Terms and Conditions

- 7. (1) Nothing contained in this Agreement shall create any relationship between the parties other than that of fundraising partners, and, without limitation, nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to constitute the City and the Corporation as partners, joint venturers or members of a joint or common enterprise.
 - (2) Any notice, demand, statement or request ("Notice") required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly given if personally delivered, delivered by courier or mailed by registered prepaid post, in the case of notice to the City, to it at the address set out in this Section and in the case of notice to the Corporation, to it at its offices set forth below. Notice may be given by facsimile transmission, electronic mail or any other electronic communication.
 - (3) Any such Notice given in accordance with the above requirements shall be deemed to have been given, if mailed, on the fifth day following the date

of such mailing or, if delivered, on the day on which it was delivered so long as such delivery was prior to 5:00 p.m. on a Business Day (and, if after 5:00 p.m. or if any such day is not a Business Day, then it shall be deemed to have been delivered on the next Business Day). Either party may, from time to time by Notice, change the address to which Notices to it are to be given. Notwithstanding the foregoing, during any interruption or threatened interruption in postal services, any Notice shall be personally delivered or delivered by courier.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE(S)

The purpose of this report is to provide the results of a traffic and pedestrian study, which was conducted at the request of the Planning and Operations Committee and City Council, in order to determine the need for pedestrian actuated signals at 19th Street West and Avenue F.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. Nineteenth Street is classified as an arterial road, meant to carry traffic at the highest level of service possible.
- 2. A pedestrian and traffic review was conducted at the intersection of 19th Street West and Avenue F in September 2012.
- 3. The most recent five-year collision data at this intersection indicated one pedestrian collision.
- 4. Pedestrian counts at this intersection indicated 90 pedestrians during the peak hours of the day.
- 5. Calculations indicated that the total warrant for a pedestrian actuated signalized crosswalk at this intersection is 44 points. (The minimum warrant requirement for pedestrian actuated signals is 100 points).

STRATEGIC GOAL

- Moving Around Saskatoon is a city on the move.
 - Long Term Strategies:
 - Optimize the flow of people and goods in and around the city.

BACKGROUND

City Council, at its meeting held on June 18, 2012, considered Clause 6, Report 10-2012 of the Planning and Operations Committee (Attachment 1), forwarding a copy of a report of the General Manager, Infrastructure Services, dated May 31, 2012. The report was submitted in response to traffic concerns which had been outlined in the Riversdale Local Area Plan (LAP). Council adopted the recommendation of the Planning and Operations Committee, that the Administration conduct a traffic study and report in the fall, 2012 on the installation of pedestrian actuated signals at Avenue F and 19th Street West.

REPORT

Nineteenth Street West, near Avenue F, is a four-lane arterial roadway that is expected to carry up to 25,000 vehicles per day (vpd). Avenue F is a two-lane local roadway that is expected to carry up to 5,000 vpd. The current pedestrian safety device at the intersection of 19th Street West and Avenue F is a zebra crosswalk with standard pedestrian crossing signage. Zebra crosswalks provide increased visibility to both pedestrians and motorists due to increased pavement markings.

A pedestrian study was conducted at the intersection of 19th Street West and Avenue F in September 2012. The review included a pedestrian collision review, site visits and the collection of traffic and pedestrian data.

According to Saskatchewan Government Insurance (SGI) most recent five-year collision data, only one pedestrian collision occurred at this intersection. A description of the collision indicated that the pedestrian "ran out onto the street at the crosswalk".

Pedestrian counts were conducted during the peak hours (8:00 a.m. to 9:00 a.m.; 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.; and 3:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.). It was found that 90 pedestrians crossed 19th Street at Avenue F (60 adults, 25 teenagers, 5 children).

The site review indicated adequate sight lines.

Calculations were undertaken to determine if a pedestrian actuated signalized crosswalk was warranted. The warrant assigns points for a variety of conditions including:

- The number of traffic lanes to be crossed;
- The presence of a physical median;
- The posted speed limit of the street;
- The distance the crossing point is to the nearest protected crosswalk point; and
- The number of pedestrians and vehicles at the location.

The minimum requirement to warrant the installation of a pedestrian actuated traffic signal is 100 points or greater.

Based on the point combination of the conditions as outlined above, the pedestrian study yielded a warrant value of 44, well below the threshold value of 100 points required for further consideration.

The traffic and pedestrian patterns indicate that the current devices at 19th Street West and Avenue F are providing adequate control, therefore, the Administration does not recommend the implementation of a pedestrian actuated signalized crosswalk at this time.

Traffic calming is also not recommended for 19th Street, as the primary function of an arterial road is to deliver traffic from collector roads to freeways at the highest level of service possible.

BACKGROUND

City Council, at its meeting held on May 20, 2008, considered a report of the General Manager, Community Services Department, dated April 15, 2008, regarding the Riversdale Local Area Plan (LAP) Final Report and resolved, in part, that the Administration commence implementation of the recommendations as outlined in the Plan.

Section 4.4 of the LAP states:

"That the Infrastructure Services Department, Municipal Engineering Branch determine if traffic calming measures, enhanced pedestrian crosswalks, and designated parking sites are warranted on 19th Street West from Avenue D to K South, and report findings to the Riversdale Community Association, and to the Planning and Operations Committee."

REPORT

Due to their differing roadway classifications, 19th Street West was divided into two sections for the purpose of this review: Avenue D South to Avenue H South, and Avenue H South to Avenue K South. The intersection of Avenue H South and 19th Street already has full traffic signals, which is the highest form of pedestrian and traffic control available. The results are as follows.

19th Street West from Avenue D South to Avenue H South

From Avenue D South to Avenue H South, 19th Street West is classified as a minor arterial roadway with a speed limit of 50 kph. Minor arterial roadways can be expected to carry up to 25,000 vehicles per day (vpd). All intersections from Avenue D South to Avenue G South are four-legged intersections with two-way stops giving right-of-way to 19th Street West.

A traffic volume and speed study along 19th Street West between Avenue F South and Avenue E South was conducted in July 2011. The 85th percentile speed (the speed at which 85 percent of the vehicles are travelling at or less than) was measured at 57 kph. Ideally, it is desirable for the 85th percentile speed to be no more than 5 kph above the speed limit. The average daily traffic (ADT) volume was measured at 6,400 vpd. Traffic volumes along 19th Street West are within the expected range for a minor arterial roadway. However, speeds are not within 5 kph of the posted speed limit.

Traffic calming devices are often used along local and collector roadways to reduce speeding, to enhance safety for pedestrians, and to reduce short cutting through residential neighbourhoods. Traffic calming measures are typically not recommended on arterial roadways, unless in special circumstances, such as a marked school zone. Because arterial roadways are designed to carry large traffic volumes, implementation of traffic calming devices on arterial roads can lead to several disadvantages and safety issues, such as:

- Increase in shortcutting vehicles The inconvenience and discomfort of the traffic calming features on arterial roads may encourage drivers to use alternatives and displace traffic to neighbouring local roads. In the case of 19th Street West, installation of traffic calming may promote vehicles to shortcut along nearby side streets, in order to avoid being slowed down.
- Additionally, delay in emergency services response times; Arterial roads are important routes for emergency services. Each measure increases emergency services response times and makes it difficult to achieve the response times required of them.

19th Street West from Avenue D South to Avenue H South functions as a four-lane arterial roadway. Installation of typical traffic calming measures, such as curb extensions, would restrict the curb lanes, resulting in traffic congestion and decreases in levels-of-service.

While traffic calming measures are not recommended at this time, the Administration does recognize the high level of pedestrian traffic along this section of 19th Street West. In order to increase pedestrian safety, the Administration will upgrade all existing standard crosswalks from Avenue D South to Avenue G South along 19th Street West to zebra crosswalks. Zebra crosswalks have an advantage over standard crosswalks as they provide increased visibility to both pedestrians and motorists due to increased pavement markings. These upgrades are illustrated in Attachment 1. Additionally, the Administration has provided the Saskatoon Police Services (SPS) the speed data to assist in speed enforcement activities in the area.

Parking along 19th Street West from Avenue D South to Avenue H South Street is not recommended. This section of roadway is too narrow to accommodate on-street parking and still facilitate traffic flow. On-street parking would require two of the four traffic lanes and, therefore, create congestion.

19th Street West from Avenue H South to Avenue K South

19th Street West is classified as a local roadway with a speed limit of 50 kph from Avenue H South to Avenue K South. Local roadways can be expected to carry up to 5,000 vehicles per day (vpd). All intersections from Avenue I South to Avenue K South are four-legged intersections with two-way stops giving right-of-way to 19th Street West. A standard crosswalk currently exists at Optimist Park, Avenue J South, where higher levels of pedestrian activity are expected on the local roadway.

A traffic volume and speed study along 19th Street West between Avenue I South and Avenue J South was conducted in July 2011. The 85th percentile speed (the speed at which 85 percent of

the vehicles are travelling at or less than) was measured at 50 kph. As previously mentioned, it is desirable for the 85th percentile speed to be no more than 5 kph above the speed limit. The ADT volume was measured at 960 vpd. Traffic volumes and speeds along 19th Street West are within the expected range for a local roadway. Therefore, the Administration does not recommend any further changes at this time.

There are currently no parking restrictions along 19th Street West from Avenue H South to Avenue K South. During the site investigation it was noted that sufficient on-street parking was available, therefore, Infrastructure Services does not recommend changes.

The Administration has forwarded a copy of this report to the Riversdale Community Association and the Riversdale Business Improvement District for their information.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

There are no environmental implications.

Attached is a report of the General Manager, Utility Services Department dated October 4, 2012, regarding proposed fees for the new Heavy Grit Dewatering Facility.

Your Committee has reviewed the report with the Administration and is supporting the above recommendations. While your Committee has reviewed with the Administration recommendations relating to the proposed fees to be charged to users of the new Heavy Grit Dewatering Facility for the years 2012 to 2015, the proposed fees for 2014 and 2015 were provided for information only.

Bylaw No. 9064, The Waste Amendment Bylaw, 2012, has been prepared to reflect proposed fees of \$52 per 1,000 gallons, effective December 1, 2012, and \$65 per 1000 gallons, effective January 1, 2013. A copy Bylaw No. 9064 is attached for City Council's consideration.

5. Residential Recycling Program Implementation (Files CK. 7830-5 and WT. 7832-10)

- **<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>**: 1) that the monthly Recycling Fee charged to each household included in the Residential Recycling Program be \$4.66 per month beginning on the date following the first recycling collection; and
 - that the City Solicitor be instructed to prepare the necessary amendments to The Waste Bylaw, 2004 (Bylaw No. 8310) and Council Policy (C03-003) Reserves for Future Expenditures.

Attached is a report of the General Manager, Utility Services Department dated October 22, 2012, with respect to the implementation of the Residential Recycling Program, including the delivery dates for the recycling carts, the collection calendar, and the proposed recycling fees. Your Committee has been advised that a recycling education campaign will begin on November 26, 2012.

Your Committee has reviewed the report with the Administration and supports the above recommendations relating to the proposed monthly recycling fee and the preparation of necessary bylaw and policy amendments.

6. Landfill Rate Review 2012 (Files CK. 1905-1 x 1700-1 and WT. 1905-3)

- **<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>**: 1) that Landfill Tipping Fees be adjusted by removing the subsidized rate categories for loads less than 351 kilograms;
 - 2) that a rate subsidy of 75% be introduced for loads less than 250 kilograms;
 - that the \$5 discount on the first two visits to the Saskatoon Regional Waste Management Centre (Landfill) by each customer each year be discontinued;
 - 4) that the capital levy portion of the Landfill Tipping Fees be adjusted to \$37 in 2012 and \$40 in 2013; and
 - 5) that the City Solicitor be instructed to prepare the necessary amendment to The Waste Bylaw, 2004 (Bylaw No. 8310).

Attached is a report of the General Manager, Utility Services Department dated October 22, 2012, regarding the Landfill Rate Review for 2012 and proposing changes to the Landfill Tipping Fee structure and vehicular charges at the Landfill Facility.

Your Committee has reviewed the report with the Administration and is supporting the above recommendations.

7. State of the Bridges and Structures 2012 (Files CK. 6050-1 and IS. 6050-104-1)

RECOMMENDATION: 1) that the bridges and structures preservation service level be established as 'Service Level 'B", with a targeted annual investment level of \$5 million per year (2013 dollars), and additional one time contributions totalling approximately \$48 million (2013 dollars), over the next 10 years; and

> 2) that the dollar amounts presented in the October 19, 2012 report of the General Manager, Infrastructure Services Department be adjusted for construction inflation in each budget year that the approved capital program is delivered.

Attached is the report of the General Manager, Infrastructure Services Department dated October 19, 2012, presenting the State of the Bridges and Structures 2012 Report and recommending the selection of "Service Level B" as the desired level of service target for Bridges and Structures.

The State of the Bridges and Structures 2012 Report is available on the City's website <u>www.saskatoon.ca</u>, under "Reports and Publications".

Your Committee has reviewed the matter with the Administration and is supporting the above recommendations.

8. Roadway Asset Management Status (Files CK. 6315-1 and IS. 6220-1)

- **RECOMMENDATION**: 1) that the paved roadways service level be established at Level 'B', with a targeted annual investment of \$25 million; and
 - 2) that the dollar amounts presented in the October 23, 2012 report of the General Manager, Infrastructure Services Department be adjusted for construction inflation in each budget year that the approved capital program is delivered.

Attached is a report of the General Manager, Infrastructure Services Department dated October 23, 2012, presenting the Condition Rating Summary Paved Roadways 2011 Report and recommending the establishment of the paved roadways service level at "Level B", as discussed in the report.

The Condition Rating Summary Paved Roadways 2011 Report is available on the City's website <u>www.saskatoon.ca</u>, under "Reports and Publications".

Your Committee has reviewed the report with the Administration and supports the proposed level of service for paved roadways, as outlined in the above recommendations.

9. Allocation of the 2013 Estimated Municipal Operating Grant (Files CK. 1860-1 x 1700-1 and CS. 1860-14-1)

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: 1) that the estimated 2013 Municipal Operating Grant from the Province of Saskatchewan be allocated as follows:

- a) \$2,000,000 to the Bridge Major Repair Reserve;
- b) \$1,000,000 to the Infrastructure Surface Reserve;
- c) \$200,000 to the Transit Vehicle Replacement Reserve and \$100,000 to the Transit Capital Projects Reserve;
- d) the remaining amount of \$2,143,200 to assist in funding 2013 operating costs; and
- 2) that any additional Municipal Operating Grant funding, as a result of a formula change, be partially allocated initially as a one-time funding source to the Bridge Major Repair Reserve and then on a permanent basis to infrastructure rehabilitation/maintenance and general operations.

Attached is a report of the General Manager, Corporate Services Department dated October 1, 2012, with respect to proposals for the allocation of the 2013 Municipal Operating Grant.

Your Committee has reviewed the report with Administration and is supporting the above proposed allocation.

To present City Council with the 2011 Access Transit Annual Report that outlines the performance of Access Transit in 2011 and includes a comparative analysis to previous years.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. Annual Revenue Trips increased by 2.3% (2,838 trips) compared to 2010 totalling 123,992 in 2011.
- 2. Denials decreased by 8.7% (1,027 fewer denials) compared to 2010.
- 3. Productivity remains high at 2.6 Revenue Trips per Hour, exceeding the Canadian average.

STRATEGIC GOALS

The report supports the following City of Saskatoon Strategic Goals:

- 2) Quality of Life Saskatoon is a welcoming people place.

<u>REPORT</u>

The 2011 Access Transit Annual Report (Attachment 1) identifies and reports on key performance indicators. A summary of the 2011 Annual Report is as follows:

Revenue Trips

A revenue trip is defined as a one-way trip from point A to point B. Access Transit provided 123,992 trips in 2011 which is an increase of 2,838 more trips (2.3%) compared to 2010.

Denials

A denial is a trip request by a customer that cannot be accommodated. Total denials decreased by 8.7% (1.027 fewer denials) in 2011 compared to 2010. Denials peak in the colder months when the demand for Access Transit services is the highest. Taxi service is utilized to assist with the extra demand.

Productivity

Revenue Trips per Hour is another key performance indicator. A number of factors contribute to the number of trips per hour including:

- traffic congestion on roads and bridges
- road conditions
- railroad crossings
- weather conditions

Despite these challenges our Revenue Trips per Hour total 2.6, higher than the Canadian average of 2.5 Revenue Trips per Hour.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

To present the Administration and Finance Committee with a status report in regards to addressing Access Transit ridership growth through taxi use.

REPORT AND HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. Revenue Trips have increased by 6,044 trips (6.6%) in the first nine months of 2012 compared to the same period in 2011.
- 2. The total number of taxi trips provided has increased by 478 trips (23.9%) in the first nine months of 2012 compared to the same period in 2011. Overall, taxi trips represent 2.6% of the total revenue trips provided during the first nine months of 2012.
- 3. The annual taxi budget is allocated strategically to support increased use when demand for taxi trips is at its highest.
- 4. Access Transit and Saskatoon Radio Cabs have worked jointly to ensure that taxi cab use is a positive experience for our clients.

STRATEGIC GOALS

The report supports the following City of Saskatoon Strategic Goals:

- 1) Quality of Life Saskatoon is a welcoming people place.
- 2) Moving Around Saskatoon is a city on the move.
 - a) Long-Term Strategy Optimize the flow of people and goods in and around the city.

BACKGROUND

The Executive Committee, at its special service-review meeting held on August 23, 2011, resolved that for 2012 and 2013 all Access Transit ridership growth be handled through increased use of taxis, and that the Administration report in the early summer of 2012 as to the experience to date.

REPORT

Access Transit provides public transportation for people who, by reason of a disability, are unable to use conventional transit with safety and dignity. Our clients are served

primarily by our staff and fleet of 26 lift equipped buses. Taxi cabs are also utilized to help meet our service demand where a trip request would otherwise be denied or to optimize service delivery due to scheduling constraints. Access Transit continues to closely monitor the use of taxi cabs to assist in growing ridership and meeting the needs of our clients.

Revenue Trips

A revenue trip is defined as a one-way trip from point A to point B. Total revenue trips are a combination of bus trips and taxi trips. Total revenue trips have increased by 6,044 trips (6.6%) during the first nine months of the year in 2012 compared to the total revenue trips provided during the same period in 2011.

Total Taxi Usage

Taxi cabs provide a cost effective and flexible alternative to help manage seasonal fluctuations in service demand. Total taxi usage has increased by 478 trips (23.9%) in the first nine months of 2012 compared to the same period in 2011. The additional 478 taxi trips provided represents 8.7% of the increase in total revenue trips through the first nine months of 2012. Overall, taxi trips represent 2.6% of the total revenue trips provided during the first nine months of 2012. Historically, taxi companies are generally heavily utilized during cold weather months. As winter approaches we will closely monitor the ability of taxi cab companies to meet our increased demand for their services while providing the highest quality of service to our customers.

Annual Taxi Budget

Taxi cab use is strategically reduced in historically low demand months (May through October) to ensure there are ample funds to accommodate the higher demand during our peak demand months. Access Transit customers have more independent travel options, including regular transit low floor buses from May through October when the weather conditions are more favourable. For peak demand months (January to April, November, and December) where independent travel is difficult, we allocate 74.1% of the budget, which averages out to 12.4% per month. For non peak demand months, we allocate 25.9% of the taxi budget which averages out to 4.3% per month.

Positive Client Experience

There has been significant staff, fleet, and management changeover in the Taxi industry throughout late 2011 and 2012. Access Transit Administration had concerns regarding a sharp increase in customer complaints in the months of December, 2011 and January, 2012. On February 14, 2012 Access Transit Administration met with the Manager and Administrative Staff from Saskatoon Radio Cabs. Details of the complaints by Access Transit customers were brought forward and discussed. The complaints were addressed and subsequent customer complaints decreased dramatically following the meeting. Access Transit is pleased to report that complaints

and/or concerns since February 14, 2012 have been few and minor, and were rectified promptly.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

There is no financial impact.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

A new Heavy Grit Dewatering Facility is opening at the Saskatoon Regional Waste Management Centre (Landfill) as required by the Saskatchewan Ministry of Environment. It is proposed that users will pay fees to cover all operating costs associated with this new environmental facility.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. The new environmental facility is substantially complete and ready to operate.
- 2. Grit-containing loads hauled by commercial companies and the City of Saskatoon must use this facility.
- 3. Full cost recovery for operations is proposed within three (3) years.

STRATEGIC GOALS

The recommendations support the long-term strategy to increase revenue sources and reduce reliance on residential property taxes under the Strategic Goal of Asset and Financial Sustainability. The facility also supports the long-term strategy to improve the quality of run-off going to the river under the Strategic Goal of Environmental Leadership.

BACKGROUND

Capital Project #1245 - Wastewater Treatment Grit & Screen Facility included funding for a Heavy Grit Dewatering Facility at the Saskatoon Regional Waste Management

Centre (Landfill). The Saskatchewan Ministry of Environment had identified that the current practice of dumping the material at the site of the Wastewater Treatment Plant, allowing it to dry naturally, and then hauling the material to the Landfill Facility is no longer acceptable.

REPORT

Construction of the Heavy Grit Dewatering Facility is now substantially complete. Environmental Services will be responsible for the operations of the Facility located at the Saskatoon Regional Waste Management Centre (Landfill).

There are two user groups for the Heavy Grit Dewatering Facility, commercial haulers with grit-containing loads and City of Saskatoon Water and Sewer Section haulers.

To ensure compliance under the City of Saskatoon Permit To Operate a Sewage Works, haulers may no longer empty materials to ground at the Wastewater Treatment Plant site. Environmental regulations require that haulers first decant and then empty the grit into a contained dewatering facility to facilitate the proper disposal and management of the solid material.

The facility has been constructed to serve all customers year-round. 24-hour access will also be available to crews responding to emergencies.

An operating model has been developed to determine the fees necessary to cover the costs of Facility operations. Costs include the operation and maintenance of the Facility and the disposal of the dried solids within a Landfill cell.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

Council may choose to charge full operations cost recovery rates as follows:

Year	Fee
2012	\$82.00 per 1000 gallons
2013	\$84.50 per 1000 gallons
2014	\$87.00 per 1000 gallons
2015	\$90.00 per 1000 gallons

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

To introduce fees related to the use of the Heavy Grit Dewatering Facility, an amendment to The Waste Bylaw, 2004 (Bylaw No. 8310) is required. It is proposed these changes would take effect on December 1, 2012.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

This facility replaces the current practice of dumping heavy grit material to ground, protecting the river and groundwater from possible contamination due to runoff and soil infiltration.

The recommendation will lead to an increase in GHG emissions. As such, mitigation efforts for the additional 63 tonnes of CO₂e which will be generated by the facility operations will be developed, implemented, and reported under the greenhouse gas reduction strategy.

PRIVACY IMPACT

BYLAW NO. 9064

The Waste Amendment Bylaw, 2012

The Council of The City of Saskatoon enacts:

Short Title

1. This Bylaw may be cited as *The Waste Amendment Bylaw*, 2012.

Purpose

2. The purpose of this Bylaw is to amend *The Waste Bylaw, 2004* to set new rates for the treatments and disposal of liquid waste containing grit.

Bylaw No. 8310 Amended

3. *The Waste Bylaw, 2004* is amended in the manner set forth in this Bylaw.

Section 3 Amended

4. Section 3 is amended by:

- (a) adding the following after clause (i):
 - "(i.1) "heavy grit dewatering facility" means the special facility located at the Waste Management Centre for the treatment of liquid water containing grit;"; and
- (b) adding the following after clause (m):
 - "(m.1) "liquid waste containing grit" means liquid waste that contains solid matter, including ashes, cinders, sand, stone or any other solid or viscous substance that may impair the operations of the sanitary sewer system;".

Section 57 Amended

- 5. Section 57 is amended by repealing subsection (2) and substituting the following:
 - (2) (a)

No person shall deposit special waste at the Waste Management Centre without permission from the Utility Services Manager. A person may, upon 24 hours' notice, with the consent of the Utility Services Manager and upon providing such approvals as the Utility Services Manager may deem appropriate, deliver special waste to the Waste Management Centre. (b) No person shall deposit liquid waste containing grit anywhere in the City except at the heavy grit dewatering facility. A person may deliver liquid waste containing grit to the heavy grit dewatering facility at any time during normal Waste Management Centre hours of operation."

Schedule "B" Amended

6. Schedule "B" is repealed and the schedule marked as Schedule "A" to this Bylaw is substituted.

Schedule "C" Amended

- 7. Schedule "C" is amended by:
 - (a) striking out "and" after clause (c);
 - (b) by adding the following after clause (c):
 - "(d) Liquid Waste Containing Grit; and"; and
 - (c) by renumbering clause (d) as clause (e).

Coming into Force

8. This Bylaw shall come into force on December 1, 2012.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: that a report be submitted to City Council, recommending:

- that the monthly Recycling Fee charged to each household included in the Residential Recycling Program be \$4.66 per month beginning on the date following the first recycling collection; and
- that Solicitors be instructed to prepare the necessary amendments to The Waste Bylaw, 2004 (Bylaw No. 8310) and Council Policy (C03-003) Reserves for Future Expenditures.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

The Residential Recycling Program will launch on January 2, 2013. Implementation details related to the start of service, how to use the service, and the cost of the service have now been finalized.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. Blue recycling carts will be delivered to homes based on an implementation schedule.
- 2. Loraas Recycle will collect material based on a collections calendar.
- 3. Recycling education campaign begins November 19, 2013.
- 4. Recycling fees will be charged on a utility bill.

STRATEGIC GOALS

The recommendations in this report support the long-term strategy to eliminate the need for a new landfill under the Strategic Goal of Environmental Leadership. The recommendations also support the long-term strategy to increase revenue sources and reduce reliance on residential property taxes under the Strategic Goal of Asset and Financial Sustainability.

BACKGROUND

At its meeting on May 14, 2012, Council resolved the contract for Single-Family Residential Curbside Recycling be awarded to Loraas Recycle.

The service will be provided to all street-oriented residential properties in Saskatoon currently receiving City garbage collection from roll-out carts.

Council also resolved at its meeting on December 5, 2011, in part:

"1) that Administration be instructed to take the first step toward the development of a waste utility for Saskatoon by adding the cost of the enhanced curbside recycling service to a utility bill;"

REPORT

Details pertaining to the launch of the Residential Recycling Program have now been confirmed.

Blue recycling carts will be delivered to homes based on an implementation schedule

Beginning January 2, 2013, blue roll-out carts measuring 110 cm x 75.5 cm x 89.5 cm will be delivered to all homes currently receiving City garbage collection from black roll-out carts.

The schedule for delivery of these carts has been carefully planned to ensure that collections service can begin within two (2) weeks of cart delivery. For this reason, cart delivery will occur on a neighbourhood-by-neighbourhood basis. Cart delivery will be complete within six (6) months and the schedule is included as Attachment 1 to this report.

Loraas Recycle will collect material based on a collections calendar

Bi-weekly collection of blue roll-out carts will be scheduled on a different day from City garbage pick-up. Residents should place their new recycling carts in the exact location they currently place black carts for City garbage collection. Loraas Recycle will utilize automated recycling trucks; therefore carts must be at least four (4) feet from all obstructions including other carts, parked cars, fences, buildings, etc. This is the same rule as currently applies for garbage collection.

All recyclable materials can be placed in the blue recycling cart; with no sorting by citizens required. Materials that may be placed in the cart include aluminum and tin cans, aluminum foil and pie plates, corrugated cardboard, mixed paper, newspaper, polycoat, fine paper, magazines, boxboard, recyclable plastic containers #1 thru #7 that have contained non-hazardous products, all provincial legislated beverage containers, milk cartons and jugs, and glass food and beverage containers.

A 2013 Recycling Collections Calendar is included as Attachment 2 to this report.
Recycling education campaign begins November 19, 2012

A Recycling Education Campaign has been developed to help residents participate in the new Residential Recycling Program.

Attachment 3 includes the education concept for the campaign. The primary objective of the campaign is to build awareness and enthusiasm for the new recycling program to inspire broad acceptance and seamless adoption of recycling behaviours that lead to a doubling of material diverted from landfill. In 2011, Saskatoon collected and recycled approximately 7,200 tonnes of material. The goal is to reach at least 14,000 tonnes through this program.

A variety of educational materials and communications will be rolled out under this campaign.

Loraas Recycle will be the first point of contact for customers and will make every attempt to meet or exceed customer expectations whenever possible. The customer service call centre contact information shall be clearly communicated in the education campaign. The call centre will utilize live customer service representatives to answer all calls Monday to Friday 8am-5pm; voice messaging will only be used after-hours and on weekends.

Recycling fees will be charged on a utility bill

The Residential Recycling Program will be funded from utility revenues charged to each residential property included in the program. This means street-oriented residential properties in Saskatoon currently receiving City garbage collection from roll-out carts will be billed a monthly charge for recycling on their City of Saskatoon utility bill.

Properties currently having multiple units on a single utility bill will be expected to divide the utility charges to property owners or tenants in the same manner water charges might currently be addressed.

Administration had originally estimated the costs of the program to be \$4.33 per household per month. It was anticipated the costs for the components not covered by the contractor may be an additional \$0.50 per household per month. The costs to establish the utility billing system were greater than anticipated. It is anticipated these costs will be less in 2014 and the future years of the service.

Administration is confident in the cost projection for this program but recommends a contingency, in the form of a 3% contribution to a stabilization reserve, be established.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

Council may choose a different monthly Recycling Fee and fund components such as utility billing costs and operations costs from the mill-rate. Council may also choose not to make contributions to a stabilization reserve.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

The adoption of a new Recycling Fee would require an amendment to The Waste Bylaw, 2004 (Bylaw No. 8310). It is proposed these changes would take effect on January 1, 2013.

It is the current practice of the City of Saskatoon to maintain a civic utilities stabilization reserve for each utility. The creation of a new stabilization reserve for the Residential Recycling Program would require an amendment to Council Policy (C03-003) Reserves for Future Expenditures.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The 2013 financial implications of the Residential Recycling Program have been described in the above report. The contractor fees for the program have been set for each year to the end of 2019. Administration proposes to review the costs related to education, utility billing, and operations and bring forward a proposed Recycling Fee schedule for 2014, 2015 and 2016 in June, 2013.

PUBLIC COMMUNICATION PLAN

Communications with the public have been described in the above report.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

Recycling is a significant environmental initiative. The benefits in terms of extending the life of the Saskatoon Regional Waste Management Centre (Landfill) have been estimated at 8 years at current residential waste disposal rates. This is equivalent to recapturing 15% of the landfill airspace each year.

Recycling also has significant and positive greenhouse gas implications. The energy used to manufacture, transport, and dispose recyclable materials is large. Energy savings of 95% are possible when aluminum cans are recycled and for 6.5 tonnes of greenhouse gas (CO_2e) is saved for every tonne recycled. For every tonne of newspaper recycled, 2.8 tonnes CO_2e are saved. For every tonne plastic recycled, 2.3 to 3.6 tonnes CO_2e are saved.

Based on the goals of the Residential Recycling Program, it is anticipated 73,076 tonnes CO₂e will be saved each year. This is equivalent to removing 14,328 cars from Saskatoon roadways annually.

PRIVACY IMPACT

There are no anticipated privacy implications arising from the introduction of this new program. All information shared between the City and Loraas pertaining to the implementation of this program will be reported publicly on an annual basis.

SAFETY/CRIME PREVENTION THROUGH ENVIRONMENTAL DESIGN (CPTED)

The delivery of this new program does not require a Safety/Crime review.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Public Notice, pursuant to Section 3 of Policy No.C01-021, Public Notice Policy, is not required.

- 1) that Landfill Tipping Fees be adjusted by removing the subsidized rate categories for loads less than 351 kilograms;
- that a rate subsidy of 75% be introduced for loads less than 250 kilograms;
- that the \$5 discount on the first two visits to the Saskatoon Regional Waste Management Centre (Landfill) by each customer each year be discontinued;
- 4) that the capital levy portion of the Landfill Tipping Fees be adjusted to \$37 in 2012 and \$40 in 2013; and
- 5) that Solicitors be instructed to prepare the necessary amendment to The Waste Bylaw, 2004 (Bylaw No. 8310).

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

A number of changes to the operations and design of the Saskatoon Regional Waste Management Centre (Landfill) are required to ensure the facility achieves a lifespan of no less than forty (40) years. It is proposed that funding these changes be the responsibility of vehicular customers of the Landfill Facility rather than increasing the mill rate.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. Recommended changes to vehicular charges at the Landfill Facility.
- 2. Very small loads will continue to be subsidized.
- 3. Landfill Optimization requires a balance between capital and operating funds.

The additional revenues outlined in this report have been built into the 2013 operating budget. Not approving, or modifying, the recommendations of this report will impact the 2013 budget.

STRATEGIC GOALS

The recommendations in this report support the long-term strategy to eliminate the need for a new landfill under the Strategic Goal of Environmental Leadership. The recommendations also support the long-term strategy to increase revenue sources and reduce reliance on residential property taxes under the Strategic Goal of Asset and Financial Sustainability.

BACKGROUND

The last Landfill rate review was considered at the March 1, 2010 meeting of City Council. At that time, the Saskatoon Construction Association and the North Saskatoon Business Association expressed concern related to the timing, phasing, and cost drivers behind proposed rate increases. City Council resolved, in part, that:

- "5) that Administration report back by December 2011, on an updated capital cost forecast, reserve sufficiency, and updated rate schedule if required; and
- 6) that Administration make adjustments to the timing of projects funded from the Landfill Replacement Reserve to ensure that the reserve remains in a positive position, and submit a report to the Administration and Finance Committee outlining any required changes."

Following successful discussions and a revised phased in rate structure, rates were ultimately set through the end of 2013, and the appropriate Bylaws were approved.

At the August 17, 2011 meeting of City Council, a Landfill Optimization Strategy including proposed changes in the design and operations of the Saskatoon Waste Management Facility (Landfill) was adopted to protect the lifespan of the facility to forty (40) years and beyond. This strategy identified the capital improvements and operating changes required. The timing, phasing, and costs of these necessary changes were considered at that time.

<u>REPORT</u>

Implementing the Landfill Optimization Strategy is dependent on financial capacity. Landfill operations and supporting capital projects are to be funded wholly from fees generated by the Facility. A Landfill rate review was conducted by Environmental Services to ensure forecasted revenues meet the future needs of the capital improvement plan and changes to operations required by the strategy. In particular, a review of subsidies identified opportunities to maintain affordability to customers visiting the Landfill Facility while better reflecting the true cost to provide services at the Landfill Facility.

Recommended changes to vehicular charges at the Landfill Facility

Subsidies are currently provided to customers delivering loads smaller than 351 kilograms. As Landfill Tipping fees have increased, subsidies for smaller loads have become disproportionate. Subsidies in 2011 ranged from 56% to 79%. In 2009, these subsidies were in the range of 31% to 53%.

In 2011, the effective average fee collected from loads delivered to the Landfill was \$58/tonne. This is effectively equal to falling \$7 short of the revenue required for every tonne received at the Facility, when compared with the 2011 tipping fee of \$65 per tonne. Seventy percent (70%) of the loads delivered to the Landfill received a subsidy in 2011. This disparity would grow as tipping fees increase.

Administration recommends that special rate categories for smaller loads be removed from The Waste Bylaw, 2004 (Bylaw No. 8310) beginning January 1, 2013. Three rate categories will be removed: (1) loads weighing less than 250 kilograms; (2) loads weighing between 251 and 300 kilograms; and (3) loads weighing between 301 and 350 kilograms.

There is also a subsidy in place for the first two visits by customers in each calendar year. A \$5 discount to each vehicle, tracked by license plate, is provided off the regular \$10 Vehicle Entry Fee.

In 2011, 23% of the loads delivered to the Landfill were from customers who visited two (2) or fewer times.

Administration is recommending removing the Vehicle Entry Fee subsidy beginning January 1, 2013.

Very small loads will continue to be subsidized

Sixty percent (60%) of the loads received at the Landfill Facility in 2011 were less than one-quarter tonne. In 2009, only 34% of the loads were this small. The increase in traffic and activity resulting from this increase in small loads has created safety and customer service issues that must be managed at an increased cost.

The City does not currently offer a service for the handling of bulky items that may not fit in City-provided roll-out garbage carts. Until options are available for residents, maintaining a subsidy for very small loads (less than one-quarter tonne) is proposed.

Earlier this year, discount rates (8.5%) were approved for commercial customers making use of the automated scale. A similar approach is proposed for customers delivering very small loads.

Administration proposes a 75% subsidy be applied to all very small loads weighing less than 250 kilograms. To illustrate, an example of how this would be applied to a customer bringing a load of waste weighing 250 kilograms to the Landfill Facility is shown in the following table.

Landfill Optimization requires a balance between capital and operating funds

The Landfill Optimization Strategy approved by Council on August 17, 2011, included a capital improvement plan valued at \$54,600,000 and additional operating costs of \$304,000 per year. A revised capital plan has been developed (see Attachment 1) to ensure the operating cost implications can continue to be funded from fees generated by the Facility rather than by the mill-rate.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

Council may choose to maintain the current Landfill Tipping Fee structure for all customers. Administration does not recommend this option as the costs to provide service at the Landfill Facility are not reflected by the current rates. Currently, the costliest customers to serve are paying the least.

Council may also choose to phase in changes to fees. One potential option is to phase in changes to the level of subsidy provided for loads weighing less than 250 kilograms. Administration is also not recommending this option as the financial implication of adding a single year of phase-in on this one rate is \$204,750.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

The adoption of changes to the Tipping Fee rates would require an amendment to The Waste Bylaw, 2004 (Bylaw No. 8310). It is proposed these changes would take effect on January 1, 2013.

No amendment is required to apply a percentage-based subsidy.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Landfill operations and supporting capital projects are to be funded wholly from fees generated by the Facility.

Funding for capital and operating requirements at the Landfill Facility is generated through Tipping Fees. The Landfill collects Tipping Fees that are set within The Waste Bylaw, 2004 (Bylaw No. 8310). The rates have been set in 2012 at \$85/tonne, and \$90/tonne for 2013.

Foregone revenue resulting from subsidies was \$376,000 in 2011. In addition, foregone revenue resulting from a subsidization of the first two (2) vehicle entry fees of the year was \$208,170 in 2011.

Removing subsidies could have the following revenue implications in 2013.

Remove subsidies provided to loads between 0 and 250 kilograms	\$204,750
Remove subsidies provided to loads between 251 and 350 kilograms	\$275,250
Remove the \$5 discount on the first two visits each year for each customer	\$208,000
Total recaptured revenue to fund capital and operating requirements	\$688,000

The Landfill Optimization Strategy included carrying a negative balance in the Landfill Replacement Reserve in order to self-finance the necessary design and operations changes required to protect the lifespan of the Landfill Facility. By the end of 2016, the Reserve will have sufficient balances to fund future capital improvements, without creating a negative balance. To acknowledge the negative balance, the Landfill Optimization project (\$1,450,000 in 2011 and \$2,500,000 in 2013), and the New Cell project (\$4,500,000) are charged interest. This represents the carrying cost incurred by the City until such time as funds are available in 2016.

For 2012, revenues are not keeping up with projections. The proposed changes will help ensure that revenues cover costs going forward.

A report recommending Landfill Tipping Fees for 2014, 2015 and 2016 will be provided by June 2013.

PUBLIC COMMUNICATION PLAN

Residents using the Landfill Facility will be affected by the price increase. The first two loads of the season will now cost up to \$15.63 (for very small loads) instead of \$5.00. All other very small loads they deliver in the year will cost up to \$15.63 instead of the current \$10.00.

Commercial customers with small loads will no longer benefit from subsidies but pay the exact tonnage charge on a pro-rated basis. For example, a 285 kilogram load today would cost \$16.00. Under the new fee structure, this load would cost \$34.23 (including the entrance fee).

All Landfill customers will be apprised of operational changes at the Facility through signage installed at the entrance to the Landfill. In addition, communications will include print advertising on the City Page, social media postings, web-site updates and notices to the Community Consultants. Commercial account holders will also be provided information with their billing prior to implementation of the proposed changes.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

As a policy options report, no environmental and/or greenhouse gas implications have been identified at this time.

- that the bridges and structures preservation service level be established as 'Service Level 'B", with a targeted annual investment level of \$5 million per year (2013 dollars), and additional one time contributions totalling approximately \$48 million (2013 dollars), over the next 10 years; and
- 2) that the dollar amounts presented in this report be adjusted for construction inflation in each budget year that the approved capital program is delivered.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to present the State of the Bridges and Structures 2012 Report (Attachment 1) for information and discussion; and to request that the report be submitted to City Council recommending that a desired level of service target for Bridges and Structures be selected.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. The City of Saskatoon's bridge and structure inventory has an estimated replacement value of approximately \$831.4 million (2012 dollars).
- 2. A comprehensive long-term major preservation program has been prepared which has identified work totaling \$102 million over the next 20 years.
- 3. The Bridge Major Repair Reserve is currently significantly underfunded, in consideration of short and long-term preservation requirements.
- 4. Optimization of preservation funding will maximize the sustainability of this key component of the City's infrastructure, and minimize life-cycle costs.
- 5. It is the Administration's recommendation that a level of service classification of "B" is the preferred level of service target, based on least life cycle cost.

STRATEGIC GOAL(S)

- Asset and Financial Sustainability Saskatoon invests in what matters
 - This strategy will reduce the gap in funding required to rehabilitate and maintain the City's bridges and structures;

- It will adopt and implement a corporate-wide asset management and rehabilitation philosophy; and
- It will protect the City's Credit rating.
- Moving Around Saskatoon is a City on the Move
 - This strategy will ensure bridges and structures are in working order and in a good state of repair; and
 - It will also establish service levels to promote repair and maintenance of our bridges and structures.

BACKGROUND

Preservation of the City's bridges and structures is funded from the Bridge Major Repair Reserve. The current base annual contribution to the Bridge Major Repair Reserve, for bridge preservation, is \$520,000, which represents approximately 0.06% of the total infrastructure replacement value. This results in a level of service classification of "E", as described in Table 1 below. If this level of investment is maintained beyond 2019, the level of service classification will drop to "F". A level of service classification of "A" represents the highest level of service at the lowest long-term cost.

Level of Service	Asset Condition	Description

REPORT

The City of Saskatoon's bridge and structure inventory has an estimated replacement value of approximately \$831.4 million (2012 dollars). Effective asset management is necessary in order to optimize preservation activity planning and implementation in order to optimize financial investment and maximize the sustainability of this key component of the City's infrastructure. The State of the Bridges and Structures 2012 Report provides information on asset inventory, replacement value, current condition state and a preservation strategy.

The report provides a 20-year major preservation program for the City's bridges and structures, at a total cost of approximately \$102 million. The plan contains a mix of proactive and reactive projects which represents the least life cycle cost strategy.

Major bridge projects recommended to be completed within the next five years are as follows:

- University Bridge Rehabilitation (2013-14-15/\$13.8 million);
- Circle Drive North Over Idylwyld Drive Overpass Rehabilitation (2014/\$1.2 million);
- Idylwyld Drive Northbound Over 19th Street to 1st Avenue Overpass Rehabilitation (2015/\$2.0 million);
- Idylwyld Drive Northbound/Southbound Over 19th Street Overpass Rehabilitation (2015/\$4.1 million);
- Idylwyld Drive Over Ruth Street Overpass Rehabilitation (2015/\$5.6 million);
- 51st Street Over Idylwyld Drive Overpass Rehabilitation (2015/\$1.5 million); and
- Sid Buckwold Bridge Rehabilitation (2017/\$9.5 million).

The full five-year plan is estimated to cost \$38.8 million.

Three level of service options have been reviewed as follows:

Option 1 – Status Quo – Level of Service "E"

Under this option, the current annual base contribution to the Major Bridge Repair Reserve of \$520,000 per year would be maintained. This level of service is insufficient to accommodate the 20-year major preservation plan. Structures will need to be closed as deck failures occur, with major closures projected as follows:

- Idylwyld Drive Over Ruth Street Overpass (2025);
- Idylwyld Drive Northbound/Southbound Over 19th Street Overpass (2025);
- Spadina Crescent Bridge (2029);
- Circle Drive Northbound Over 14th Street Overpass (2029);
- 108th Street Over Circle Drive Overpass (2030);

- Idylwyld Drive Northbound Over 19th Street to 1st Avenue Overpass (2030);
- University Bridge (2031); and
- Sid Buckwold Bridge (2032).

Full deck replacements would be required before these structures could be reopened. The estimated cost of necessary deck replacements for these structures is estimated to be \$151.4 million. This value does not include additional work required to the remainder of the bridge inventory.

Option 2 - Maintain the Current Backlog - Level of Service "C"

Under this option, the 20-year major preservation program would be modified to address only reactive preservation projects, eliminating proactive projects from the plan. This approach would defer investment in the short-term. The current annual contribution to the Major Bridge Repair Reserve would increase, however, a mix of one-time contributions would be required to make up the budget shortfall for major rehabilitation projects to ensure the reserve does not go into a deficit position at any time. If the annual contribution were to be increased to \$2.0 million in 2013, with an annual increase equal to annual inflation, one-time contributions would be required as follows:

- \$32 million in 2013;
- \$23 million in 2018; and
- \$39 million in 2023.

The total investment in the 20-year major preservation program would be approximately \$112 million.

Option 3 - Mix of Proactive and Reactive Preservation Projects - Level of Service "B"

Under this option, the 20-year major preservation program, recommended in the State of the Bridges and Structures 2012 Report, would be followed. The current annual contribution to the Major Bridge Repair Reserve would increase, however, a mix of onetime contributions and borrowing would be required to make up the budget shortfall to ensure that the reserve does not go into a deficit position at any time. If the annual contribution were to be increased to \$5 million in 2013, with an annual increase equal to annual inflation, one-time contributions would be required to support the following anticipated additional spending:

- \$19.2 million in 2013;
- \$7.8 million in 2018; and
- \$20.9 million in 2023.

It is important to note that a level of service classification of "A" is not achievable within the next 15 to 20 years, due to the current backlog of reactive preservation projects. An

"A" level of service would represent a majority of proactive preservation projects with lower life cycle costs, when compared with the above options.

It is the Administration's opinion that Option 3 is the preferred option, based on least life cycle cost. If base annual contributions do not keep pace with inflation, larger one-time contributions will be required to meet future project costs. For the purposes of this report, only one funding option per service level has been shown. However, there could be additional options to the funding in order to reach the selected level of service.

The Administration is requesting that the Committee forward this report to City Council, recommending that a desired level of service target for the preservation of bridges and structures be established as Level 'B' with an annual funding level of \$5 million, and additional contributions over the next 10 years as listed above.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

An alternate service level can be established, however, the Administration feels that Service Level 'B' provides for an acceptable condition state for the bridge and structure inventory that is financially attainable.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no policy implications.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

Financial implications depend on the service level selected. A funding strategy will be forthcoming.

PUBLIC AND/OR STAKEHOLDER INVOLVEMENT

Public and/or stakeholder involvement is not applicable.

COMMUNICATION PLAN

The City has been undertaking a series of activities to proactively communicate the City's Strategic Plan and specifically more information for each strategic goal. Since March 2012, the City has held major news conferences around the Strategic Plan, Sustainable Growth/Moving Around and Environmental Leadership.

The Administration is preparing to launch the strategic goal for Asset and Financial Sustainability – Saskatoon Invests In What Matters. The vision for this strategic goal outlines, "Our buildings, roads, and bridges are well managed and well maintained – meeting the needs of citizens and reflecting the pride and priorities of a modern 21st century city."

Upon City Council adopting the recommendations in the State of the Bridges and Structures 2012 report, the information and deliverables will be communicated as part of the Asset and Financial Sustainability news conference. The news conference provides an opportunity to share the direction in achieving the long and short-term strategies. It will also provide an opportunity to show how the commitment will play a role in achieving other long-term strategies related to Environmental Leadership, Moving Around and Economic Diversity and Prosperity. The news conference will reach various audiences including the media, stakeholders and citizens.

In addition to a news conference, the information will be incorporated into the Strategic Plan web pages. Additional communications tools will be prepared to ensure citizens are informed about the commitment, deliverables and achievements the City of Saskatoon is making towards goals identified in the Strategic Plan. This may include, but is not limited to, news releases, webpage content, videos and social media tools including creating blog content and providing updates on twitter and Facebook.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPLICATIONS

Any increase to the funded plan for bridges and structures rehabilitation work will increase the City's greenhouse gas emissions. Details of the funded plan will be forwarded to the Environmental Services Branch for detailed calculation.

PRIVACY IMPACT

There are no privacy implications.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

The purpose of this report is to present the Condition Rating Summary Paved Roadways 2011 report (Attachment 1) for information and discussion; and to request that the report be submitted to City Council recommending that the level of service target for paved roadways be selected.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. The condition of Saskatoon's paved roadways was indentified as the most important municipal concern in the annual Civic Survey in 2011 and 2012.
- 2. The paved roadways in Saskatoon have a replacement value in excess of \$1.4 billion
- 3. The current service level for paved roadways is 'E', with an annual investment of \$6.3 million to \$9.5 million, resulting in a network condition that is getting worse annually.
- 4. It is the Administration's recommendation that Level 'B', with an annual investment of \$25 million, which would result in a network condition that is getting better annually, is the preferred level of service target.

STRATEGIC GOAL(S)

- Asset & Financial Sustainability Saskatoon invests in what matters
 - This strategy will reduce the gap in funding required to rehabilitate and maintain the City's infrastructure.
 - It will adopt and implement a corporate-wide asset management and rehabilitation philosophy; and
 - It will protect the City's Credit rating
- Moving Around Saskatoon is a City on the Move
 - This strategy will ensure roads, streets, sidewalks and bridges are in working order and in a good state of repair; and

• This strategy will also establish service levels to promote repair and maintenance of our roads, streets, lanes, sidewalks and bridges.

BACKGROUND

The Strategic Services Branch is responsible for evaluating the condition of the City's paved roadways and developing an annual program to maintain them at a minimum long-term cost, with modifications based on approved funding levels.

The preservation of the paved roadways is funded from five capital projects, which totalled \$9.492 million in 2012; which included \$3.471 million of one-time funding, which Council allocated to roadways during 2012 budget deliberations, from funding that was available within the Neighbourhood Land Development Fund.

Although funding for paved roadways has, in general, increased over the past decade, from 2003 to 2008 the annual roadway budget only increased by 0.5% per year, while the cost of treatments increased by 15.2% per year. This erosion of purchasing power, combined with the general ageing of the network, has resulted in a degradation of the roadway network since 2002.

REPORT

Service Levels for Paved Roadways

The current investment level for roadways is at a Level of Service 'E', as shown in Table 1 below. An investment level of 'A' would result in the highest level of service at the lowest long-term cost.

Current Condition of Roadways

The Strategic Services Branch conducts surface condition assessments of the paved roadways on an annual basis. The assessments are used to determine condition, service level targets, and to develop annual capital improvement plans. Surface condition assessments are taken on a four-year cycle for local streets, and a three-year cycle for collector streets.

As of December 2011, the City of Saskatoon had a roadway network totalling approximately 3,607 lane kilometres, with a replacement value estimated at \$1.4 billion. Additional inventory details are presented in the attached Condition Rating Summary – Paved Roadways 2011 report.

The funding for roadway preservation needs to increase with each funding level shown in Table 1 above. Results of the 2009 to 2011 assessment determined that approximately 10% of local streets are currently in "Very Poor" condition. Table 3.3, on Page 7 of the attached Condition Rating Summary, shows the distresses and the thresholds.

Various investment options have been analyzed. The three highlighted below have been selected as potentially viable.

Option 1 – Status Quo (Level of Service "E")

This option would keep the annual investment in paved roadways at the same level as in 2012, which was \$9.5 million. The current backlog will grow and the overall condition of the network will deteriorate. The 2012 funding was made of \$6.0 million of base funding from General Reserves and \$3.5 million of one-time Neighbourhood Land Development funding.

Option 2 – Maintain Assets in Very Poor Condition (Level of Service "D")

This option would require an annual investment of \$15 million. The streets in the worst condition would be given a higher treatment priority than in Option 1. Annual investment opportunities will be missed, as some roadways will still degrade from the "Preservation" to "Restoration" category; and from the "Restoration" to the "Rehabilitation" category. As they move through each category, treatments become more costly, with rehabilitation being the most expensive.

Option 3 - Maintain the Current Backlog (Level of Service "C")

This option would require an annual investment of \$20 million. The current backlog and network condition will remain as at the end of 2012.

Option 4 – Improve Average Condition and Eliminate Backlog in the Future (Level of Service "B")

This option would require an annual investment of \$25 million. The average condition of the roadway network will be better than it is today, and the backlog will be reduced.

A level of service "A" is ideal for all assets, as it is the least long term cost to the City. However, it will take several years to eliminate the backlog of very poor streets, and until that occurs, it is not achievable. Funding this level of service would also require a significant increase that would be difficult to achieve.

The City of Edmonton was able to significantly increase their roadway funding in 2008, with the introduction of the Neighbourhood Renewal Program, a dedicated and permanent tax levy for roads, sidewalks and street lights. In addition, Edmonton receives more provincial funding than Saskatoon, they utilize local improvement programs, and they pay approximately three times more per capita in taxation for roads than in Saskatoon. For example, in 2011, the average Edmonton household paid approximately \$22 per month for roadways, while in Saskatoon, the average household paid approximately \$6 per month. This value was calculated using 2011 roadway funding for each city, divided by the estimated number of households. In 2012, Edmonton's tax increased by 5.39%, and 72% of the increase was dedicated to their Neighbourhood Renewal Program.

It is the Administration's opinion that Option 4 is the desirable level of service target. This option will result in an improvement of the average condition of the roadway network and a reduction to the roadway backlog. If immediately achieved, Option 4 would result in an increase of \$15.529 million in investment above the allocated 2012 roadway preservation budget.

The treatment of paved roadways is funded from the Infrastructure Surface Reserve with the following capital projects:

- 0835 Collector Road Preservation;
- 0836 Arterial Road Preservation;
- 1531 Local Road Preservation;
- 1890 Expressway Road Preservation; and
- 2249 Street Reconstruction.

The Infrastructure Surface Reserve is 100% mill rate funded, and includes additional capital projects for transportation, sidewalks, curbs, and back lanes.

The Administration is recommending that the Committee forward this report to City Council, recommending that the level of service target for the preservation of roadways be established as Level 'B', with an annual investment of \$25 million.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

An alternate service level can be established, however, the Administration believes that Service Level 'B' provides an acceptable condition state of the roadway network that is financially attainable.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no policy implications.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

The financial implications depend on the service level selected. A funding strategy will be forthcoming.

The City has been undertaking a series of activities to proactively communicate the City's Strategic Plan and specifically more information for each strategic goal. - 2) that any additional Municipal Operating Grant funding, as a result of a formula change, be partially allocated initially as a one-time funding source to the Bridge Major Repair Reserve and then on a permanent basis to infrastructure rehabilitation/maintenance and general operations.

TOPIC AND PURPOSE

This report recommends plans for allocating the 2013 Municipal Operating Grant (MOG) from the Province of Saskatchewan. This funding is based on PST revenue levels, which may or may not be sustainable and can fluctuate from year to year. In 2013, the plan is to allocate just under \$3 million to road and bridge repair, \$300,000 to the Transit Capital Reserves to assist in funding the increased maintenance and refurbishment costs of the fleet, and the remainder of over \$2 million to help fund the increase in operating costs for 2013.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. Allocation of increased 2013 MOG funding as follows:
 - a) Road and Bridge Repair \$3.0 million;

- i. \$2.0 million to the Bridge Major Repair Reserve
- ii. \$1.0 million to the Infrastructure Surface Reserve
- b) \$300,000 to the Transit Bus Replacement Reserve;
- c) 2013 Operating Budget \$2.14 million.
- 2. Assists with moving towards closing the City's infrastructure funding gap.

STRATEGIC GOAL

This report supports the City of Saskatoon's Strategic Goal of:

Asset and Financial Sustainability – Saskatoon invests in what matters.

- This strategy will reduce the gap in the funding required to rehabilitate and maintain our infrastructure.
- The goal is to establish levels of service for rehabilitation of assets and identify supporting financial strategies.

BACKGROUND

The Municipal Operating Grant is based on provincial sales tax (PST) revenues. In June of this year, the provincial public accounts were released for the 2011/2012 fiscal year. It is these actual results that form the basis of the 2013 grant. They translate into an estimated grant to the City of Saskatoon of \$46,940,400.

The General Manager of Infrastructure Services has tabled a report with the Administration and Finance Committee recommending specific service levels for the bridge and structure preservation program and the paved roadways preservation program. These service levels require a funding strategy.

REPORT

Allocation of Increased MOG Funding

There is the potential that PST revenue levels will not be sustained into the future, therefore, allocating a significant portion of the 2013 increase to capital reserves is a prudent use of funds. If revenues decrease, the allocations to the reserve can be decreased, thereby mitigating the impact to the mill rate.

i) Road and Bridge Repair - \$3.0 million

Your Administration is recommending a \$3.0 million allocation towards the Bridge Major Repair Reserve and the Infrastructure Surface Reserve. Your Administration is also planning a contribution to both reserves to accommodate the new infrastructure created by the Circle Drive South project beginning in 2014. In addition, your Administration will be recommending a property tax increase specifically dedicated to roadways preservation as part of the 2013 Budget.

The \$2.0 million allocated to the Bridge Major Repair Reserve will assist in providing the funding required to continue with both planned reactive and proactive bridge repairs. The \$1.0 million allocated to the Infrastructure Surface Reserve will increase the amount of road repair planned for the 2013 construction season.

ii)

Transit Capital Reserves - \$300,000

An increase of \$300,000 is required by Saskatoon Transit in order to increase provisions to maintenance reserves. Over the past number of years, Transit has saved the City in excess of \$18 million in capital expenses through a strategy of purchasing high quality used buses from other municipalities, and refurbishing buses already owned by Saskatoon Transit. Once refurbished, these buses are near-new from a structural and appearance perspective. New buses continue to be purchased by Transit, and the long-term fleet strategy includes the use of both new and refurbished buses.

As part of this strategy, maintenance and refurbishment costs will increase for a variety of reasons. The refurbished buses do require maintenance, and maintenance costs for new buses are significantly higher than in previous years due to federally mandated emission control systems that come with every new bus. The overall fleet strategy will yield the lowest overall cost of providing a fleet that meets both customer and operator needs.

iii) <u>2013 Operating Budget - \$2.14 million</u> Your Administration is recommending that \$2.14 million be used in 2013 to assist in funding operating budget pressures.

Assists with Moving towards Closing the City's Infrastructure Funding Gap

Your Administration is currently preparing a long-term financial plan which will provide a projection of the City's operating and capital requirements over the next ten years. It will be based on a number of core principles and will include recommendations that will encourage progress towards the City's strategic goal of asset and financial sustainability. This plan will include a section on our asset management strategy that will include a funding strategy that will encompass the following allocations to begin to close the current roadway and bridge infrastructure funding gap and will provide recommendations on the long-term funding plan for the two reserves.

The General Manager of Infrastructure Services has recommended a preservation Level of Service "B" for the City's bridges and structures. This service level identifies an annual \$5 million contribution plus a number of one-time contributions, beginning in 2013. The following table identifies the 2013 proposed increase to the Bridge Major Repair Reserve of \$2 million. The base contribution of \$520,000 reflects an annual 20% increase, beginning in 2014, which would need to continue for seven years. Annual funding to this reserve will then exceed \$5 million.

2013 also includes a one-time contribution of \$500,000, which represents the previously approved funding plan to assist in phasing-in the operational costs for the Remai Art Gallery of Saskatchewan and the new Police Facility.

Funding for the replacement of the Traffic Bridge is provided for outside the Bridge Major Repair Reserve. Your Administration currently has \$10 million allocated towards this project. These funds can be used as an interim funding source for major bridge work that is required over the next few years subject to a repayment plan.

The General Manager of Infrastructure Services has also recommended a preservation Level of Service "B" for the City's paved roadways. This service level identifies an annual investment of \$25 million. The following table identifies the 2013 proposed increase to the Infrastructure Surface Reserve of \$1 million. It should be noted that this reserve funds major repair and rehabilitation of roadways, back lanes, sidewalks, curbs, traffic signals, traffic signs, guardrails, and pavement markings.

2013 also includes a one-time contribution of \$1,000,000, which represents the previously approved funding plan to assist in phasing-in the operational costs for the Remai Art Gallery of Saskatchewan and the new Police Facility.

In 2011, your Administration provided City Council with the option of introducing a property tax increase dedicated specifically to roadway preservation. The following table also reflects the impact of an annual incremental increase of 0.75% beginning in 2013. The final recommended increase will be in the range of 0.5% and 1% and will be included in the 2013 Budget.

The existing MOG formula is currently under review by the Province. In order to provide a funding source for the one-time contributions required to the Bridge Major Repair Reserve, and to continue with a funding plan to close the current roadway and bridge infrastructure funding gap, it is recommended that a portion of additional MOG funding as a result of this review be allocated initially as a one-time funding source to the Bridge Major Repair Reserve and then on a permanent basis towards infrastructure rehabilitation/maintenance.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATIONS

All funds can be allocated towards increased operating costs; however, this is not recommended. As noted above, the current recommendation assists in closing the infrastructure funding gap. More importantly, the potential for reduced PST revenues exists, thus reducing the annual grant. Allocating 100% of the funds towards operating costs will result in a potential operational funding gap which is more difficult to resolve.

The recommended capital allocations, however, can be redirected to other capital reserves or one-time time costs.

POLICY IMPLICATIONS

There are no policy implications.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

These allocations will assist in moving towards the targeted funding levels for the Bridge Major Repair Reserve and the Infrastructure Surface Reserve. It should be noted, however, that the total annual required contribution to the Infrastructure Surface Reserve is closer to \$33 million as this reserve also funds the capital repair and rehabilitation of sidewalks, curbs, back lanes, etc. The allocation of MOG funding only forms part of a total funding solution.

The allocations also result in supporting the overall Transit fleet strategy, and funding general municipal operating costs.

Any additional funding resulting from a formula change would be allocated to repairing our roads and/or bridges and future operating budgets.

Audit Report - Saskatoon Fire and Protective Services Payroll System Audit

The 2010-2011 Corporate Audit Plan included provision to conduct a financial system audit of the Saskatoon Fire and Protective Services Payroll System.

The Saskatoon Fire and Protective Services 2011 budgeted compensation for the 333.17 staff years is \$33.9 million. The employees fall within the following collective agreements: Local 80-IAFF, CUPE 59, SCMMA and ESA. All the employees are salaried and receive their base pay on both the fifteenth and last day of the month. Employees who receive exception pay (e.g., overtime, acting pay or standby pay) are paid in the following pay period.

The base pay is calculated in the corporate payroll system whereas the exception pay and pay for certain types of leave (e.g., absences from work such as sick, vacation, etc) are entered into the department spreadsheet and imported into the corporate payroll system for processing. An inhouse database is used to track payments to employees as well as the various types of leave, including accrual, banking and usage.

The objectives of the audit were to determine whether adequate systems, practices and controls are in place to ensure:

- The accuracy of payroll cheques and direct deposits in terms of payee,
- The accuracy of payroll cheques and direct deposits in terms of gross pay,
- Complete and accurate accounting for all leave and banked time, and
- Opportunities for theft, fraud and misappropriation are minimized.

Management is currently working on implementation of the recommendations.

REPORT HIGHLIGHTS

- 1. Remnant land would have become roadway.
- 2. Revenue from the sale of this remnant land amounts to \$14,000.

STRATEGIC GOALS

BACKGROUND

As part of the Circle Drive South project, your Administration was given direction to negotiate with landowners for the purchase of lands required for the roadway project. One of the parcels required was the abandoned CNR rail spur (Parcel H as shown in Attachment 1) that runs diagonally through the southwest industrial area, extending from 11th Street West to Dundonald Avenue. With the roadway configuration in this area now finalized, it has been determined that a portion of the spur line, along with a portion of the City-owned buffer strip (Parcel C as shown in Attachment 1) are not required for the project.

<u>REPORT</u>

Use of Remnant Land

The remnant land (shown on Attachment 1 as the Subject Lands) is located in the Southwest Industrial area. As the Subject Lands have been identified as being not required for the Circle Drive South project, two possible scenarios exist:

Scenario 1: The Subject Lands remain owned by the City and be designated as public Right of Way (ROW). This would result in the City being responsible for the on-going maintenance of these lands.

Scenario 2: The Subject Lands be sold to the adjacent property owner, thereby creating revenue from the sale while eliminating the on-going responsibility to maintain the land.

The adjacent property owner, Dupuis Enterprises Ltd. has previously identified their interest in acquiring the lands.

The proposed direct sale complies with Clause 3.2(f) of City Council Policy C09-033 - Sale of Serviced City-Owned Lands, which states the Administration may entertain a direct sale in the case of "(f) A situation where a remnant parcel is not needed by the City and could be sold to an adjacent property owner."

Revenue from the Sale of the Lands

Through negotiations with Dupuis Enterprises Ltd., it was agreed upon that \$14,000 was a reasonable value as the land has no street access and contains easements. The revenue from the sale of this land will be deposited into the Property Realized Reserve. The subdivision and consolidation of the Subject Lands will be included as part of the Dudley Street to 11th Street roadway extension. Dupuis Enterprises

Ltd. will be responsible for any land title registration fees associated with the transfer of the lands.

OPTIONS TO THE RECOMMENDATION

An option would be to not sell the Subject Lands and retain the 6,997 square foot area as excess roadway.

As the Project Manager for the above development by Richardson House of Fixtures and Supplies, I am requesting an additional exit from our property. We currently have one access/egress from the development on the East end of the property onto Marquis Court. We would like for you to consider the following options. See attached document 830146-0122, and 830146-0123

- Option 1 "Right Out" onto Marguis Drive at the West end of our development.
- Option 2 Provide a road way access off the North easement onto Millar Avenue.

There are two buildings, Building A which faces Marquis Drive is 76,000 square feet and the second building sits on the North side of the property which is 37,500 square feet. The length of the buildings spans over 100' and will make up 113,500 SF of available industrial retail space for purchase on the commercial market.

We have been in discussions with Angela Gardiner and Gord Hundeby with Infrastructure Services who have said that they are unable to approve a curb cut onto Marquis Drive. We are concerned that with the size of the property only having access/egress from one access point on the property is a safety hazard. According to Infrastructure Services Marquis Drive is considered an arterial roadway and will become extremely busy with not only the development that is taking place in the area, but with the proposed commuter bridge. If Marquis Court becomes blocked for any reason and there is a fire, the tenants of our development have no way of exiting the property. We see this as a major issue and would like for you to consider our proposal to provide an additional access.

According to the Land Branch, Marquis Court will be turned into an avenue extending from Kochar. If this is the case it will only increase traffic on the East end of our property and will cause further issues to the tenants of our development.

We would like to be added to the speakers list at the November 13th, 2012 City Council Meeting to explain our situation and request council approval to add an egress point onto Marquis Drive.

I have a concern about fireworks. I understand that the bylaw allows them four times a year however allowing stores to sell them any time defeats this policy; if they are readily available people will purchase them.

I live in a mobile home park which bans the setting off of fireworks at anytime of the year due to the vulnerability to fire to the units and the trees in the park. But the store on the corner of the lot, which is not under park jurisdiction, is allowed to carry them all year round.

I am sure that there are other communities like this that will not allow them on premises but have a store close by that sells them.

We have had many incidents over the summer and as recently as this weekend where a tenant has set them off in the park. Calling the police and fire departments two or three times a week is getting to be annoying, not only for the tenants but also for the fire department, with whom I have been in contact about this matter.

I suffer from a PTSD condition and startle at any sudden noise. I have to be tied to my computer with ear plugs in, headphones on, and the volume jacked up to almost intolerable levels in order to not hear any sudden noise that might occur just outside my trailer at any time of night. It's like being in a war for me, as I never know when or even if it will happen on a certain night. I cannot leave my home at night for fear of returning just as a display is about to happen or is in progress.

I am sure that while my own case is severe, there are others throughout the city who would like not to be disturbed by the unexpected noise, especially near bedtime Warning people about the consquenses obviously does no good.

Please change the bylaw so that they can be sold only a few days before the designated holiday and make Saskatoon a city where people can truly enjoy the peacefulness of their beautiful surroundings for most of the year while allowing others to have noisy fun at the designated times. Thank you for your time and attention.

PPP CANADA: BACKGROUNDER FOR MUNICIPALITIES

Municipalities across the country are struggling to find adequate sources of federal funding for essential infrastructure projects. Prior to and during the 2008 recession, the federal government funded infrastructure projects with local governments under the Building Canada Plan (BCP) and the Economic Action Plan. However, the majority of this funding for municipal infrastructure has already run out, and consultations have just begun for a new federal infrastructure plan that will be launched in 2014 – leaving a major municipal funding gap.

The only federal program funding remaining for municipal infrastructure is the P3 Canada Fund administered by PPP Canada Inc. The \$1.2 billion fund has \$250 million left in its budget for each of 2012/13 and 2013/14. The key difference between the P3 Canada Fund and the BCP or Economic Action Plan is that funding provided through P3 Canada will only go to projects delivered as public-private partnerships (P3s).

This means Canadian municipalities seeking federal financial support to build or upgrade essential infrastructure have no choice but to enter into risky P3s, which are a first step on the road to privatization.

This backgrounder provides critical information about P3s and PPP Canada Inc. for mayors and municipal councillors who are either considering applying to PPP Canada Inc. for funding, or have been approached by the crown corporation to apply for funding.

What is PPP Canada Inc.?

PPP Canada Inc. is a federal crown corporation established in 2008 to promote and fund P3s in municipalities, provinces and First Nations communities.

PPP Canada Inc.:

- Manages the \$1.2 billion P3 Canada Fund, providing up to 25 per cent of municipal and provincial P3 project costs;
- Actively promotes P3s in municipalities across the country through presentations and general outreach, and in turn assesses projects for P3 suitability;
- Has completed three rounds of proposals and launched its four round in the spring of 2012;
- Has approved eleven projects as of September 2012. One has since been cancelled and another was rejected in a community referendum;
- Has identified municipalities as the "next frontier for Canadian P3s" and is actively encouraging municipalities to apply for P3 funding for large infrastructure projects, including water and wastewater facilities.

What is a P3?

P3s are multi-decade contracts for private delivery and management of public services or infrastructure. The private sector has always played an important role in conventional public sector procurement,

WHEREAS municipalities are facing an infrastructure funding shortage now that the federal infrastructure stimulus program is over, and the Building Canada Fund is fully allocated; and

WHEREAS currently there is no federal infrastructure money available to local governments other than through public-private partnerships (P3s); and

WHEREAS the federal government has begun consultations on a new national long-term infrastructure program; and

WHEREAS local governments should have choices as to the structure of the development of infrastructure projects and not be limited to P3s;

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that council write to the federal government requesting that federal infrastructure funding for local governments not be limited to or conditional on P3s, and asking that local governments be given a choice of funding arrangements that does not involve privatizing through a P3; and

Ombudsman oversight, as there are provincial ones to resolve, in tandem, the overarching sociopolitical matters (that do cascade to municipalities), which you will now see below.

PARLEZ-VOUS FRANCAIS? A SLIM CHANCE ... MAYBE ...

French, believe it or not, despite our bilingual national program, is only truly spoken, written and understood by only 22% of the Canadian population! And many of us have French and indigenous/native roots, to be discovered even, on our ancestral tree!

For those whom do not understand French, the issues below, as elaborated either directly or not, are:

And he was alleged to have committed minor theft (perhaps \$30.00 or less if true even). And, I say in general, many gravely indigent persons will steal to survive and/or self-medicate with drugs/alcohol to escape the duress of poverty and lack of adequate social support/employment equity access for minorities and the disabled!

Exorbitant Prison Costs ...

Then Luc was committed to prison at the provincial cost of, according to StatsCanada, \$172.00 per day (fed. prison cost is \$372.00) for about 60 days which equals \$10, 320.00! That is just prison fees and with court costs, legal fees, administration expenses and police service charges that can easily amount to over \$50,000 plus (I'd say) for a petty theft! How many times is this occurring in Canada everyday! And who is really "stealing" from whom for profit?

No wonder the feds have to download about \$4 billion taxpayer dollars (and mounting) yearly in prison costs! Isn't it time for reform to focus more on addiction treatment programs, community service, employment training, etc. as part of "rehabilitative correction?" RE: Municipal Costs Associated with CETA (Canadian European Trade Agreement)

On behalf of our 12,000 members across Saskatchewan, SEIU-West wishes to share their concerns regarding the ongoing CETA negotiations process and the community costs associated with this kind of trade deal.

As the President of SEIU-West, I take my responsibility to convey members' concerns seriously and I ask you, as a member of City Council, to genuinely consider our concerns and act on them. We have members who live and work in your community and they need to know that *all* of their leadership, whether that be their union leaders or their civic leaders, share a common value in the protection of local services.

Our concerns include:

- Rules in CETA detailing how public bodies, such as yours, spend money that might prohibit a "buy local" or "buy Canadian" preference on contracts for good, services or labour. Presently, local procurement policies might be adopted by local governments as a social/economic development effort such as spurring job creation in their community;
- It is predicted that the outcome of CETA (due to Sustainability Impact Assessment portion) might lend to the privatization of Canada's mostly public water systems and a range of other important public services (from health care to education to water treatment);
- The CETA may have a negative impact on First Nations rights, and may result in heightened greenhouse gas emissions in new resource extraction and/or the transportation of goods;

- The proposed intellectual property chapter in CETA would further lend to a significant increase in costs within public and private drug plans;
- CETA may result in a wave of Canadian job loss; and
- CETA will interfere with a municipalities' right to regulate. For example, the CETA investment rules prohibit public monopolies (such as a public transit system) and exclusive supplier arrangements.

Finally, we would note that much of what is known about the details of CETA has not been freely offered by our federal government; nor has this process been opened to nation-wide public consultations. We cannot trust a potential trade agreement that has such a broad scope with no real disclosure or meaningful dialogue with Canadians.

Please do not hesitate to contact me if you should require further information about this subject matter. We urge you to pass on your concerns to your MP in an effort to forestall or cease the ongoing negotiations process until meaningful consultation occurs.

Is CETA good for cities?

Debunking the myths about the benefits of EU-Canada free trade

There is a lot at stake for Canadian municipalities in the proposed EU-Canada free trade deal. The Comprehensive Economic and Trade Agreement (CETA) would set new limits on municipal procurement, policies and regulations. Having looked into the impacts the CETA would have on their powers, over 50 municipal governments have passed motions seeking more information and a greater say in the negotiations. More than half of these municipalities, including many large cities like Toronto, Mississauga and Hamilton, are asking the provinces to exclude local governments entirely from the EU trade deal.

The federal government has tried to pacify these growing concerns in a Q&A-style document circulated to Canadian municipalities. Unfortunately, the information in the document is extremely misleading and in parts inaccurate. It also fails to address many of the real concerns being raised by municipal governments through their CETA motions. The following myth-busting guide attempts to set the record straight for municipal councillors and officials, as well as the general public.

The Trade Justice Network comprises labour, environmental, social justice, cultural, farming, Indigenous, student and other civil society groups in Canada challenging the broad scope and closed-door negotiating process of the CETA negotiations.

considerations, such as reduced greenhouse gas emissions from transport. Similarly, while it would be permissible to require that prospective suppliers employ a certain number of women, minorities, or members of disadvantaged groups, it would not be permissible to require that they employ *Canadian* or *local* women, minorities or members of disadvantaged groups.

As noted in the federal document, preferences for Canadian Aboriginal peoples can only be maintained because they are explicitly excluded from the CETA procurement chapter. The same exclusions are not in place for other disadvantaged and vulnerable groups.

Myth #3

CETA will not prevent governments from sourcing goods and services locally to spur job creation and economic development.



When making purchases, many municipal governments consider and encourage local spinoffs such as taxes paid, wages, training for workers, opportunities for marginalized groups and other benefits. This *integrated cost-benefit analysis* approach results in the best overall value for public money spent, and the fairest and most efficient use of taxpayer's dollars.

The procurement chapter of the CETA, however, explicitly prohibits "offsets," defined as "any condition that encourages local development." Under such rules, local benefits may not be required, or even considered, by governments in their purchasing decisions and tendering processes. Canadian governments would lose a powerful tool for spurring job creation and economic development.

The use of selection criteria that maximise local benefits and advance public priorities is completely consistent with open, fully transparent public tendering and other safeguards commonly put in place to prevent corruption. Indeed, as long as the selection criteria are clearly specified early in the tendering process, they can be used to objectively assess the social and economic benefits resulting from public procurement, as well as ensuring fairness and value for money in public spending.

The existing procurement rules of the Agreement on Internal Trade (AIT), which cover most provincial and municipal procurement, expressly allow preferences for Canadian suppliers (Article 504). The AIT also contains exemptions for regional and economic development (Article 508), does not fully cover most provincial crown corporations and excludes contracts with public bodies or non-profit organizations (Article 507).

As for the scenario of foreign suppliers sourcing and hiring locally, while this does happen in some cases, the CETA would tie the hands of local governments in ensuring that suppliers, whether local or foreign, actually follow through on pledges to hire or source locally. and service providers). For example, in fully covered sectors, the CETA investment rules prohibit public monopolies (such as a public transit system) and exclusive supplier arrangements (such as granting a private transit or waste management company exclusive rights in certain regions).

The CETA also precludes governments from applying "economic needs" tests, which limit the numbers of service suppliers based on an assessment of what the local or regional market can accommodate. So, for example, if the Vancouver City Council found it had too many taxicabs operating within the city, it could lose its authority to limit the number of licenses.

The CETA also precludes restrictions on the types of legal entities through which service providers or investors are allowed to deliver services. For example, regulations requiring that child care providers or addiction rehabilitation services be delivered exclusively through not-for-profit entities could violate these rules. Similarly, regulations limiting certain types of service providers, such as corporate big-box stores, could be challenged.

Importantly, the CETA will contain a reservation (i.e. exclusion) for all existing nonconforming measures at the local government level. Consequently, existing public monopolies, exclusive supplier arrangements and economic needs tests at the local level will be protected. But if a local government seeks to adopt new measures of these types, or expand existing ones into new sectors, they will be vulnerable to challenge. Furthermore, existing measures are under a legal ratchet, meaning that if they are changed or eliminated they cannot later be restored by a future government.

So, for example, if a municipality without an existing public transit system or public water system wanted in future to create such systems, this step would violate the CETA. Remarkably, the EU is taking reservations that protect the rights of European local governments to create new public monopolies. The Canadian federal government, however, has not taken corresponding reservations.

It insults the intelligence of local elected representatives and their citizens for the federal government to provide categorical, but unfounded, assurances that the CETA does not affect the right to regulate.²

Allow me to extend my congratulations to you and your colleagues who won electoral victories for City Council. Those who put forth their life to public service deserve commendation.

I do take issue, however, with Your Worship's comments made to the CBC regarding your election victory. As reported on cbc.ca:

Atchison said his win is a sign that people in the city like the direction it's headed.

And says the close result will not be reflected in policies down the road.

"We had more votes than the other people had. All right? The majority of people said, we're on the right page. That's where we're going."

I would point out to Your Worship that a basic tenet of democracy is that the majority gets its way only after the minority has been meaningfully consulted. This tenet is conspicuously absent in your comments.

More importantly, Your Worship should also consider this tenet in light of the *actual* results of the election. While the narrow majority of votes were in Your Worship's favour, the "majority of people"—63% of eligible voters—did not even show up at the polls.

Given the 37% voter turnout, it seems appropriate to suggest that Your Worship more closely consider the meaning of a 52% mandate. Because in terms of demonstrated support, you are only the 19% Mayor.

I drive Circle Drive each morning and evening from Dundonald - University for my work day. With the outstanding growth of our city, in addition to the road construction on Idywyld and Circle Drive South (new bridge and Preston Ave.) I've noticed my commute had doubled in the last year. The latest issue is being backed up on Circle Drive pretty quickly after coming off the 33rd Street ramp.

As an avid and excited viewer of the progress of the South Circle Drive bridge and freeway project, I am also disheartened that my previous messages have received little concern. Specifically, I have expressed my concern about capitalizing/benefiting on the opportunity to avoid as many railroad level crossings as possible.

The intersection of 11th Street West and Circle Drive West will continue to subject vehicle traffic to unnecessary interaction with rail traffic.

I would say a lot of money has been spent on building railroad overpasses at this intersection, yet the planning has failed to use these overpasses to their fullest. Southbound Circle drive traffic that wishes to transfer to east or west 11th Street are being forced to cross at least one(for west traffic) or two(for east traffic) level grade rail crossings.

The fix: Leave this vehicle traffic on Circle Drive West heading south until crossing under the CN-CP intersection overpass(grade separation), the CN-CP interchange overpass(grade separation), and the 11th Street overpass(grade separation) where an "off ramp" should be created to "loop back" to the newly created intersection on 11th Street. Under the present plan, this 11th Street intersection is only being used for 11th Street traffic to transfer to southbound Circle Drive.

Of course the longer this is ignored the more it will cost to correct.

I have been told in previous correspondence on this matter that there was not enough room to create the off ramp I propose. I don't accept this, and I have taken measurements on City of Saskatoon maps. I see plenty of room.

I believe we should take every opportunity to eliminate railroad and roadway interaction.

Many times my family and I have made our annual trip to the city landfill when we spot something that we would in fact like to bring home with us, but unfortunately you're not allowed to take items out of the pile, as they now lay on city property.

A solution to this dilemma is to have a 'Pre-Loved Depot', where people who may not be able to afford new furniture can come to this depository and find something they like, but far more affordable than in business chains.

Not only does this help with people who can't afford new items, and those who don't want their things to go to waste, but also Christmas shopping becomes more affordable. As hard as your laughing now, this is a very serious matter at stake. It promotes Eco-friendly living, recycling, and less items in our dumps, and our highways. Dear Mayor Atchison,

In 2012, Utah State University's (USU) Buried Structures Laboratory released a landmark study supported by extensive survey efforts. The report titled "*Water Main Break Rates in the USA and Canada: A Comprehensive Study*" reviewed the most expensive challenge which water utilities face, namely the underground pipe infrastructure.

The Water Finance Research Foundation (WFRF), a non-profit organization which focuses on water delivery and financial practices that are sustainable, efficient, and affordable, was a contributing partner to the USU study. WFRF is concerned about the growing water main break problem and how this epidemic contributes to revenue loss for unaccounted water and the issues of premature failure due to pipe selection, installation, corrosion and maintenance activities.

As supported by previous international studies, the report demonstrates that PVC pipe continues to have the lowest water main break rate over other pipe materials. One critical finding is that the Canadian experience with PVC failures per 100 kilometers is nearly 76% below U.S. figures. The exceptional results for Canadian PVC water main breaks is a critical point of interest which needs to be explored and promoted as a best practice in order to help US and other water utilities also achieve such unprecedented reductions in water main failures.

Water Main Break Rates In the USA and Canada: A Comprehensive Study April 2012

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Modern societies base their economic prosperity on a standard of living which includes a complex network of infrastructure, both above and below ground. Quality drinking water brought to the tap through elaborate underground distribution systems is a critical component to our public health and economic well-being. In the USA and Canada, it has been the hallmark of our industry and cooperation.

EVIDENCE OF DECLINE

Our water infrastructure is now in decline after decades of service. The signs of distress surface daily as water mains break, creating floods and sink holes. The loss of water service is more than an inconvenience, since it causes significant social and economic disruptions and jeopardizes public health.

THE MEASUREMENT

One factor used to quantify the occurrences of failing underground pipe networks is **water main break rates**. Water main break rates are calculated for all pipe materials used in the transport of water to create a measurement to judge pipe performance and durability. Water main break rates can vary year to year and by utility. However, in aggregate, break rates produce a compelling story which can aid our prudent decision making as it relates to repairing and replacing our underground pipes.

PURPOSE AND HIGHLIGHTS

This Comprehensive Water Main Break Rate Study for the USA and Canada compiles the collective experience of 188 utilities which can be used for making future critical pipe replacement decisions. It is the desire of the researchers and participants to offer data and analysis that utility managers and elected officials can apply to the circumstances of their own operations. Highlights of the Comprehensive Water Main Break Study include a new



national metric for citizens served per one mile of pipe, aggregate data on pipe material break rates, analysis of age and corrosion in failure modes, and related observations on pressure, temperature and trenchless technology practices.

INTRODUCTION

In the United States and Canada, underground water infrastructure was installed during three main time periods because of the population growth in the 1800s, 1900–1945, and post 1945. Pipes constructed in each of these three eras will all start to fail at nearly the same time over the next couple of decades for a number of reasons ranging from age and corrosion to inadequate design and poor installation. Additionally, the life span of the materials used has become shorter with each new investment cycle (WIN, 2002). In 2009, the American Society of Civil Engineers issued a USA Infrastructure Report Card and gave a D- to drinking water and wastewater infrastructure (ASCE, 2009).

In 2001, an AWWA study called "Dawn of Replacement" pointed out: The oldest cast iron pipes—dating to the late1800s—have an average useful life of about 120 years. This means that, as a group, these pipes will last anywhere from 90 to 150 years before they need to be replaced, but on average they need to be replaced after they have been in the ground about 120 years. Because manufacturing techniques and materials changed, the roaring '20s vintage of cast-iron pipes has an average life of about 100 years. And because techniques and materials continued to evolve, pipes laid down in the Post-World War II boom have an average life of 75 years, more or less. Using these average life estimates and counting the years since the original installations shows that these water utilities will face significant needs for pipe replacement over the next few decades. Replacement of pipes installed from the late1800s to the 1950s is now hard upon us, and replacement of pipes installed in the latter half of the 20th Century will dominate the remainder of the 21st. We believe that we stand today at the dawn of a new era—the replacement era—for water utilities. (AWWA, 2001) In an update to the "Dawn of Replacement", AWWA has published "Buried No Longer" which states, "More than a million miles of pipes are nearing the end of its useful life and approaching the age at which it needs to be replaced." (AWWA 2012) These replacement costs combined with projected expansion costs will cost more than \$1 trillion over the next couple of decades.

Over 54,000 community water systems face the inevitable cost of pipe repair and replacement. The United States EPA states that nearly 60% of the total system costs are found in the distribution and transmission pipe lines. Infrastructure asset management is an approach which can help utilities bring together the concepts, tools, and techniques to manage assets at an acceptable service level at the lowest life-cycle cost. Asset management practices applied to underground infrastructure help utilities understand the timing and costs associated with replacement activities. The knowledge gained from these efforts also helps in the development of pipe material selection criteria as part of the replacement strategies and funding plans.

AGING WATER INFRASTRUCTURE

The EPA's Aging Water Infrastructure research program (http://www.epa.gov/awi/) is working toward the goal of making our nation's water infrastructure sustainable by supporting research and by promoting strategic asset management. This comprehensive water main break study is part of the continuing credible, analysis-based effort to support the EPA's program goals including:

- · Reduced life-cycle costs for water infrastructure management
- Extended service life of existing infrastructure
- Reduced high-risk water main breaks
- · Improved condition assessment and decision- making capabilities
- · Reduced potable water leakage and intrusion potential
- · Increased use of performance and cost data for decision support, and the adoption of asset management
- · Increased adoption of innovative technologies

The water industry has seen many types of academic surveys and studies on water main replacement programs and the benefits of asset management and prioritization. However, many utilities have not historically tracked all of the elements of water main break data. As this trend changes, more data and analysis will be available to the industry to improve water distribution system repair and replacement decision making. This comprehensive report based on statistically significant experiences from 188 utilities also draws from other relevant studies to be the most complete study on water main break data.

THE PRIMARY RESEARCHER

Dr. Steven Folkman is a registered Professional Engineer, a member of American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) F17 Plastic Piping Systems, a member of AWWA and a member of the Transportation Research Board Committee on Culverts and Hydraulic Structures, and has oversight of the prestigious Utah State University's (USU) Buried Structures Laboratory. The Buried Structures Laboratory at USU has been involved in analysis and testing of all kinds of pipe and associated structures for over 50 years. Previous directors include Dr. Reynold Watkins and Dr. Al Moser who are internationally recognized experts. Dr. Moser and Dr. Folkman are coauthors of the widely used text, Buried Pipe Design (Mc Graw Hill, 3rd Edition). Dr. Folkman's research assistant for this project was Ammon Sorensen. Dr. Folkman's expertise includes structural dynamics, linear and nonlinear finite element analysis utilizing soil/structure interaction, and testing. The USU Buried Structures Laboratory is recognized as one of two laboratories in the United States for performing large scale tests on buried pipes. It is from this expertise and background that the surveys of water main breaks were developed and analyzed to complete this comprehensive study.





THE METHODOLOGY

During 2011, Utah State University conducted a study of utilities across the USA and Canada to obtain data on water main failures of municipal and private water supply systems. The study was comprised of two parts: a basic survey and a more detailed survey. The focus of the basic survey was to examine the number of failures utilities were experiencing and how those failures related to the pipe materials used. This effort focused on water supply mains (sewer and force main pipes were excluded). A variety of pipe materials are used in water supply systems and over the past 100 years the materials have evolved with different manufacturing technologies. As a result, pipe performance has changed. A goal of the more detailed level of analysis was to look at which materials were performing best at a snapshot in time and to track how pipe age affects failure rates.

A total of 1,051 surveys were mailed out to USA and Canadian water utilities in May and June of 2011. The participants were asked for data from a previous 12 month time period and thus the results represent a time period that mostly coincides with the year 2010. A total of 188 utilities responded and completed the basic survey with 47 of these also responding to the detailed survey. 117,603 miles of pipe are represented in this comprehensive study. The USA and Canada were divided into nine regions and the 188 survey respondents were categorized according to the region and the size of the utility based on amount of pipe. This comprehensive study documents the results from both surveys and draws from other relevant industry sources.

OBJECTIVES AND GOALS OF THE STUDY

There were many objectives of the surveys. These objectives include:

- · Understanding the age and pipe size distribution of pipe in the respondent's system
- Reviewing delivery and fluctuations of water pressure
- Itemizing pipe failures over a time period with the data broken down by material type
- · Identifying the most common pipe failure modes and materials as identified by the utility
- · Determining whether corrosive soils are present and whether corrosion prevention methods were used
- · Highlighting pipe replacement plans, expected pipe life of new pipe and leak detection methods
- · Considering contractor selection based on contractor experience and which pipe materials are allowed
- Quantifying experience with pipe relining, pipe bursting, and directional drilling to examine future directions of pipe repair and installation.



MAJOR FINDINGS

The comprehensive nature of this study has provided several national-level metrics and rules of thumb which utilities can use for benchmarking purposes.

1. This Survey Achieved Wide Participation

A total of 117,603 miles of pipe were reported by the 188 survey participants. This represents approximately 10% of the total length of water mains in the USA. This is one of the largest surveys conducted on water mains failures and the results give an accurate representation water main behavior in the USA and Canada.

2. Nationwide One Mile of Installed Water Main Serves 264 People

While in urban areas the industry has assumed 325 people are served for 1 mile of distribution system pipe, this survey suggests a new national metric of 264 people served per 1 mile of pipe regardless of utility size. Also, 66% of all water mains are 8" or less in diameter and the range of 10" to 14" make up another 18% of all installed water mains.

3. Most Utilities Use Several Kinds of Pipe Materials

80% of the installed water mains utilize a combination of Cast Iron (CI) at 28%, Ductile Iron (DI) at 28% and PVC pipe at 23%. This fact is supported by a relative low amount (13%) of utilities which avoid DI due to corrosion concerns.

4. Pipe Material Use Differs by Region

Water main pipe material usage varies significantly over geographic regions (see Figure 9). The Northeast and North Central region of the USA (Regions 6 and 8 as illustrated in Figure 1) uses either CI or DI pipe for approximately 90% of its length. In Region 9, Canada, PVC pipe makes up 43% of the total.

5. There is Considerable Scatter in Pipe Failure Rate Data

The water main break experiences of one utility may not represent another. Factors such as climate, installation practices, and soil corrosivity can greatly affect failure rates. Every utility should properly install pipe - regardless of material. In order to have an accurate water main break survey, a large number of respondents are required.

6. PVC Pipe Has the Lowest Overall Failure Rate When failures rates of Cast Iron, Ductile Iron, PVC, Concrete, Steel, and Asbestos Cement pipes were compared, PVC is shown to have the lowest overall failure rate.

7. Corrosion is a Major Cause of Water Main Breaks

75% of all utilities have corrosive soil conditions and combined with a high portion of CI and DI pipes, one in four main breaks is caused by corrosion which is ranked the second highest reason for water main pipe failure. Northeast and North Central USA utilities (Region 6 and 8) will experience a higher percentage of corrosion breaks due to a higher concentration of CI and DI pipes (90%) installed.

8. The Average Age of Failing Water Mains is 47 years old

43% of water mains are between 20 and 50 years old and 22% of all mains are over 50 years old. While pipe life can be estimated at over 100 years, actual life is affected by soil corrosivity and installation practices. Based on the detailed survey, the average expected life of pipe being put in the ground today is 79 years. For example, non-corrosive materials like PVC have an estimated life over 110 years (Burn, 2006). Regardless of the pipe material selected, installation practices will affect the actual life that can be achieved.

9. The Average Supply Pressure is 77 psi with Pressure Fluctuations less than 20 psi.

Pressure events can contribute to water main breaks for pipes that have internal corrosion (tuberculation) or weakened areas due to external corrosion. Pressure is an important component to pipe design and material selection. A well-controlled system operated below design limits will lead to extended pipe life.

10. The Use of Trenchless Technologies will continue to Increase

While 57% of utilities use some form of leak detection, fewer utilities have engaged in trenchless technologies like pipe relining, pipe bursting and directional drilling. Over 40% are considering pipe relining and pipe bursting in the future. Directional drilling is more widely accepted and has a higher satisfaction rating and as a result, 74% of utilities are considering it in the future.

11. Over 8% of Installed Water Mains are Beyond Their Useful Life

This figure corresponds well with an EPA study (EPA, 2002) that shows the amount of pipe needing immediate replacement is growing rapidly. Improved asset management will be essential to all utilities to survive this trend.

SURVEY REGIONS

In total, 188 utilities participated in the surveys and are representative of the nine survey regions in the United States and Canada.



Figure 1. Regions used to report survey results.

The regions defined in the study are used here to indicate the wide geographical distribution of the respondents. Table 1 lists the number of respondents in the basic and detailed surveys from each region, and Figure 1 illustrates the locations of the nine different regions used in this report. The provinces in Canada with a white color did not have respondents to the survey. Figure 2 illustrates the miles of water main pipe that were reported in the basic survey on a regional basis. Similarly, Figure 3 illustrates the miles of water main pipe on a regional basis from the detailed survey. A total of 32,130 miles of pipe was reported by respondents in the detailed survey. It is noted that the respondents were distributed across a large survey area, but this study is still more comprehensive than other studies to date.

SIZE OF SURVEY PARTICIPANTS

Four categories were established as shown in Table 2 and each survey participant was allocated to one of the categories. Figure 4 shows the distribution of total miles from the basic survey based on these categories. Respondents covered the range from very small to very large with each group from Table 2 well represented.

MILES OF PIPE VS. POPULATION

Figure 5 illustrates the relationship between the population served by the utilities participating in the basic survey and the number of miles of water main pipe. The trend line and equation are a best fit to the data. The slope of this line indicates that there are on average 264 people served for each mile of water main installed.

SURVEY SAMPLE SIZE: 10% OF INSTALLED WATER MAIN PIPE IN THE US

The total length of water main pipe reported by the 188 basic survey participants was 117,603 miles (the survey did not include sewer or force mains). The average utility surveyed had 626 miles of water main with the largest having 4,468 miles and the smallest having 2 miles. Based on an EPA report (EPA, 2007), there are approximately 880,000 miles of distribution pipe in the USA. Another EPA report (EPA, 2008) estimates the amount of installed water main pipe in the USA at over 1,000,000 miles. The current population of the USA is 312 million (US Census, 2011). Using the estimate from the previous section of 264 people served per mile of water main, one can estimate the length of water mains as (312 million people)/(264 people/mile) = 1.18 million miles of water main pipe. Using this last estimate, the total length of pipe in the survey would represent approximately 10% of the installed water main pipe in the USA. Thus, the survey sample size is significant in size and therefore provides reliable results. Note that the Canadian provinces provided 8,423 miles of pipe to this survey or 7.4% of the total.

PIPE MATERIALS

Table 3 lists the pipe materials and their abbreviation used in this report. Many pipe products have evolved over the years of use, and most pipe products could be broken down into subcategories based on pipe manufacturing and surface treatments. These changes along with new installation techniques should affect life expectancy of the pipe. Both the basic and detailed surveys were intended to be relatively simple to complete and, thus, encourage wide scale participation of the water utilities. Most utilities have limited records as to which specific pipe materials were installed decades ago and what corrosion protection measures were used. Therefore, tracking subcategories of material types was not completed as part of this study. The results reported represent generic pipe material behavior but may not represent a specific product material on the market today.

Figure 6 illustrates the length of pipe reported in the basic survey broken down by pipe material. The "Other" category in Figure 6 includes materials such as HDPE, galvanized steel, and copper. Figure 7 illustrates the length of pipe reported in the detailed survey broken down by pipe material. Figure 8 illustrates the pipe material distribution as a percentage of the total length from both the basic and detailed surveys. The distribution of miles of pipe is quite similar in Figure 8 indicating that the detailed survey with a smaller number of respondents still gives similar results.

Figure 9 illustrates the regional distribution of pipe material usage as a percentage of the total length in that region. It is interesting to note the significant differences in regional pipe material utilization. Cast and Ductile Iron represent approximately 90% of the pipe in regions 6 and 8. PVC has a dominant role in region 9 and is well established in regions 2, 3, 4, 5, and 7.

PIPE AGE AND DIAMETER

The detailed survey asked respondents to provide the distribution of installed pipe by age. Four age groups were provided; zero to 10 years, 10 to 20 years, 20 to 50 years, and over 50 years. Figure 10 lists the percentage of water main length that fits in each age category. Figure 10 indicates that approximately 43% of installed pipe are in the 20 to 50 year age category and 22% are over 50 years of age. This finding is consistent with other industry sources.

The respondents were also asked to break down the fraction of total installed pipe length by five pipe diameter categories. Figure 11 illustrates the percentage of water main that fit into each size range. Figure 11 indicates that approximately 66% of the installed pipe is 8 inches or less in diameter.

DELIVERY PRESSURE

Based on the detailed survey, the average delivery pressure is 77 psi. The range of values reported for average delivery pressure was 45 to 150 psi. The detailed survey also asked how much does the water pressure fluctuate at any given point in their system during a typical day. The respondents were asked to select one of three ranges. Figure 12 illustrates the percentage of respondents that fit into each pressure range. About 83% are able to limit pressure fluctuations to be less than 20 psi.





MOST COMMON FAILURE MODE, MATERIAL, AND AGE

The detailed survey asked the respondents to identify the most common failure mode by selecting from one of the following; corrosion, circumferential crack, longitudinal crack, leakage at joints, fatigue, or other. Figure 13 identifies a circumferential crack as the most common failure mode followed by corrosion. The detailed survey also asked respondents to identify the pipe material that was failing most often. Figure 14 shows that 55.3% of respondents identified Cast Iron as the most common failing pipe material followed by Asbestos Cement at 17.0%. The respondents also reported the typical age of a failing water main. The average result was 47 years with a range of values from 20 to 86 years. The survey also asked what the expected life should be when installing new pipe. The average expected life of new pipe was 79 years with a range of responses from 30 to 200 years.

COMPUTING WATER MAIN FAILURE RATES

Both the basic and detailed surveys asked respondents to consider a water main failure as one where leakage was detected and repairs were made. However, they were requested to not report failures due to joint leakage, construction damage, or tapping of service lines. The goal was to examine how installed pipe performs.

Utilities reported the number of failures over a recent 12 month period for each pipe material and the installed length of each pipe material. The failure rate was computed by dividing the total number of failures from all utilities for a particular pipe material by the total length of that pipe material.

⁴ For example, the survey reported a total of 12,963 failures of water mains during a recent 12 month period for all pipe materials. The total installed water main length from the survey was 117, 603 miles (or 1176.03 hundreds of miles). Thus the overall failure rate is 12,963/1176.03 = 11.0 failures/(100 miles)/year.

This simple method for computing failure rates was used because it discourages biases toward large or small utilities. It is noted that utilities experience widely different failure rates for the same pipe material. Several significant variables affect the results including pipe age, soil types (corrosive or noncorrosive), different corrosion prevention techniques, different installation practices, and climate.

FAILURE RATES FOR EACH PIPE MATERIAL

The survey measured pipe failures over a recent 12 month period, broken down by material type. Table 4 lists the total length of pipe by material type, the number of failures over a recent 12 month period, and the failure rate for each pipe material. Figure 15 illustrates the failure rates as a function of material type. If one assumes a utility had equal lengths of each material installed, then Figure 16 would illustrate the percentage of failures as a function of pipe material. Figure 17 gives the failure rates broken down by material type and by respondents from the USA and Canada.

FAILURE RATES OVER FIVE YEARS

The detailed survey requested the respondents to list the number of failures per year for five years, broken down by material type. The desired focus was to examine the year to year variations by pipe material. A single utility might have large year to year variations, but if the number of utilities sampled is sufficient, the year to year variation should be small. Figure 18 shows the failure rates from the detailed survey from each of the five years covered by the survey. Respondents that did not have five years of data were not included in these results.

Table 5 lists the average of the failure rates over the five year period along with the standard deviation and the coefficients of variation (the standard deviation divided by the average). The coefficients of variations for Cl, Dl, and PVC are similar indicating they have approximately the same variability. The widest variation in rates was associated with CPP, steel and AC pipe. The length of pipe in the detailed survey for these materials was small and more respondents could likely reduce the variability.

EFFECTS OF AGE

Clearly, pipe age will affect failure rates. The basic survey asked respondents to break down the failures into five different pipe age categories. It is noted that some of the respondents did not know the age of the failed pipes, and they were not included in the results below. For each material type, the fraction of failures in each age group is examined in Figure 19 based on the basic survey results. For example, 49.8% of the reported cast iron failures occurred with a pipe age between 41 and 60 years. Note that the largest percentage of failures is not in the oldest pipes, which has several possible causes. First, the older pipe is being replaced, and, thus, there is less available to fail.

The results in Figure 19 are related to when a pipe material was introduced or removed from the market. Asbestos Cement pipe has not been installed in the USA and Canada in the past 20 years, and, thus, all AC pipe failures exceed 20 years of age. Widespread DI and PVC pipe production in the USA did not start until about 1970, so we should expect to see a small failure percentage for both DI and PVC in the 41 to 60 year age group and none for the 61 to 80 and 80+ age groups. PVC follows that trend in Figure 19. Figure 19 shows the majority of DI pipe failures occur at an age between 21 and 40 years. The DI results in Figure 19 for the 61 to 80 and the 80+ age groups are possibly caused by incorrect records on the age of those failed pipes.

It is of interest that Figure 19 shows a greater percentage of PVC pipes fail in the first 20 years of use than in the next 20 years**. This was investigated in a previous survey funded by AWWARF (Moser, 1994). Figure 20 illustrates the percent of failures as a function of time for AWWA rated PVC pipe. As shown below, over 40% of the reported failures occurred in the first year. Often the cause of these failures in PVC pipe is related to improper installation practices and not a defect in the pipe. The city of Calgary has been able to achieve remarkably small PVC failure rates due to enforced construction standards (Brander, 2004). In addition, Calgary requires new subdivision infrastructure to remain the property of the private developer for a period of two years. During this two year period, most construction related problems will occur. An AWWARF study (Burn, 2006) estimates the design life of PVC to be in excess of 110 years.

The expected life in years of an unprotected DI pipe was estimated in a recent Water Research Foundation study (Rajani, 2011). Figure 21 illustrates the published results as a function of a relative scale of soil corrosivity. Figure 19 indicates that the majority of DI pipe failures occur at an age between 21 and 40 years. A 21 to 40 year life in Figure 21 would correspond to a low to moderate soil corrosivity for an unprotected pipe. This would indicate that corrosion is a significant problem in all regions of this study. When a comparison is made between Cast Iron and Ductile Iron, thinner-walled Ductile Iron is experiencing failures more rapidly (21-40 year period) than the thicker- walled cast iron (41-60 year period). Concrete Pressure Pipe also shows failures rates that are impacted by corrosion in the 21-40 year period. The study also notes that "aging or deterioration of ductile iron pipes can vary significantly from one geographical region to another within a city, let alone from city to city."

DESCRIPTION OF FAILURES

Respondents to the basic survey were asked to describe the type of failures observed by picking from the following list:

- Circumferential crack or fracture
- Longitudinal crack or split
- Pits or holes (corrosion)
- Other or Unknown

Figure 22 summarizes the percentage of failures that were reported to fit in each description. A circumferential crack is the primary failure mode for Cast Iron, Concrete and Asbestos Cement pipe. Corrosion is the primary failure mode of Ductile Iron and Steel pipe. A longitudinal crack is the primary failure mode of PVC.





PLANS FOR REPLACING WATER MAINS

The detailed survey asked if the respondents had a plan for regular replacement of water mains that are nearing their end of useful life. Over 77% reported they do have a replacement plan. The survey also asked what percentage of water mains are beyond their useful life but have yet to be repaired/replaced due to a lack of funds. The survey results showed a range of answers from zero to 75% of their pipe was beyond its useful life and the average of all respondents was that 8.4% of the pipe is beyond its useful life.

It is of interest to compare these results with a study done by the EPA (EPA, 2002). This study classified water main pipe condition into six categories; Excellent, Good, Fair, Poor, Very Poor, and Life Elapsed. The study examined data for years 1980 and 2000 and forecasted data for 2020. Figure 23 below is reproduced from their report and shows that the above mentioned survey average response of 8.4% of pipe are beyond their useful life would correspond well with the "Life Elapsed" category in Figure 23. It is very important to note the projected growth in the "Very Poor" condition category in Figure 23. The rate of growth in that category will make it much more difficult for utilities to get that pipe replaced before it reaches the "Life Elapsed" category. An AWWA study (AWWA, 2012) echoes this trend as illustrated in Table 6. Table 6 shows aggregate costs to cover both replacement and growth in water mains in the USA.

CONTRACTOR EXPERIENCE

Proper installation is very important to getting the maximum life out of a water main. The detailed survey asked if their utility utilized contractor experience used as a weighting factor when selecting a contractor. There are 66% of the respondents that do consider contractor experience. Many of those who do not consider contractor experience reported that state or local laws prevented them from doing so.



ALLOWED PIPE MATERIALS

The detailed survey also asked what water main pipe materials are currently excluded from being installed at their utility. Figure 24 illustrates the percentage of respondents that allow a particular pipe material to be installed. The reasons used for excluding a pipe material were also requested in the survey. Table 7 summarizes the most common comments made for exclusion of a pipe material.

LEAK DETECTION METHODS

The detailed survey asked if regular leak detection methods were utilized at their utility and 57% of the respondents indicated that they did. The methods of leak detection that were used included acoustic leak detectors, visual inspection of lines, digital correlation sensors, and eddy current detectors.

CORROSIVE SOILS AND CORROSION PREVENTION TREATMENTS

The detailed survey asked respondents if they have one or more regions in their service area with soils that tend to be corrosive. A total of 75% of the respondents reported that they do have at least one area with corrosive soils. The survey also asked what kind of corrosion treatments they are utilizing for DI, CPP, and Steel pipes. The typical results are summarized in Table 8.

DI	Polywrap and installation of magnesium anodes
CPP	Bedding improvements, type 50 concrete, coatings, and anodes
Steel	Impressed current, anodes, and protective coatings

EFFECT OF AMBIENT TEMPERATURE ON FAILURES

The detailed survey asked if the utility observed an increase in water main failures with extreme ambient temperatures, either warm or cold. The results of the survey indicated that 72% of the respondents did note an increase in pipe failures with extreme cold ambient temperatures and only 13% reported a correlation with warm temperatures. Clearly this result would be dependent on the climate at each utility. The average depth of burial was also reported. An effort was made to see if there is a correlation between temperatures extremes and burial depths. For each utility the temperature extremes were derived from average monthly temperatures. The highest average monthly temperature in the summer and the lowest average monthly temperature during the winter were recorded for each utility location.

Figure 25 plots the lowest average minimum monthly temperature during the year for each respondent versus their reported average burial depth. The utilities with the blue symbols indicated they are not sensitive to cold ambient temperatures and the red colored symbols are sensitive. It was thought that with sufficient burial depth, the low temperature sensitivity might be reduced, but the data in Figure 25 does not support that conjecture.

Figure 25. Correlation of the lowest average minimum monthly temperature during the year and burial depth. Red symbols note locations where failures increase with low ambient temperatures.



Figure 26 plots the highest average maximum monthly temperature during the year for each respondent versus their reported average burial depth. Again, the color of the symbol indicates whether that utility reported to be sensitive to high ambient temperatures. Again, no correlation was observed.

It is noted that one respondent reported that failures increase when large and rapid ambient temperature changes occurred, but not necessarily reaching extreme temperatures.

TRENCHLESS TECHNOLOGY USE

The detailed survey asked respondents about experiences with three techniques of repairing, replacing, and installing water main pipes. They were relining deteriorated pipes, replacing pipes with a pipe bursting technique, and installation of new pipes using directional drilling. Table 9 summarizes their responses. The rating scale in Table 9 is from 1 to 5 with 1 being "Not Satisfied" to 5 being "Very Satisfied". Not many respondents have utilized pipe bursting, but an increasing number are looking at using both pipe relining and pipe bursting techniques. A majority of respondents have utilized directional drilling and are very happy with the results.

CONCLUSION

This Comprehensive Water Main Break Study surveyed a statistically significant amount of utilities that have collected data on their underground infrastructure. This survey was focused on material usage in water mains across the USA and Canada. This effort was successful in getting 188 participants to respond to a basic survey and 47 of those to respond to a more detailed survey. Significant results from this study include:

- · A correlation of people served per mile
- · Current pipe material usage with a regional breakdown
- · Pipe age and size distribution
- Average operation and fluctuation pressures
- · Most common pipe failure mode and materials
- · Pipe failure rates for six mostly commonly used pipe materials
- · The distribution of pipe failures with pipe age for each material
- · The distribution of pipe failure modes for each material
- · Percentage of utilities that allow installation of certain pipe materials
- · Percentage of utilities with corrosive soils and prevention techniques
- Effects of ambient temperature swings on failures
- · Attitudes about use of pipe relining, pipe bursting, and directional drilling.

It is hoped that these results would be helpful to utility managers in comparing their experiences with these survey results and thereby make better decisions regarding possible changes in their management practices. Through understanding more about the issues surrounding the performance of our underground water infrastructure, utilities will be able to successfully make cost-effective pipe replacement decisions.

I'd like to bring forth my complaint and hope of action on behalf of the city of Saskatoon in the following matter:

I had purchased a lot in the area of Evergreen when I realized that the lot was just not right for me. I had the lot for what I believe was approx 6 months before I realized the lot wasn't right for me for several reasons. I admittedly made a mistake and I realized there were possible penalties to be paid. The lot was sold for \$174,200.00 to me and I paid \$31,356.00 as a down payment and also paid \$989.10 in taxes for the lot. After the city "returned my deposit", I got a total back of only \$18,637.79. If you include the taxes in these totals and I think you should when I held the lot for such a short period of time, I was assessed a \$13,707.31 penalty. I also saw that the lot was quickly resold by the city for \$191,700.00. \$17,500.00 more than what they were willing to sell it to me. With my penalty included, the city made an additional \$31,207.31 by nailing a loyal citizen with the additional charges and nailing another loyal citizen with the upcharge of the lot. Like the lots in this city don't cost enough already.

I have lived in Saskatoon most of my life, and have been driving our city roads for 20 of those years. In the last few year, I have been travelling to Winnipeg for business. Their snow clearing and policies for keeping the roads safe and accessible are very good. They have a adopted a policy of clearing all snow by sand, salt or plowing by the time it reaches 3cm's, and continue to keep the roads clear, even if there is a storm.

They also use 100% salt on main roads and arteries, for SAFETY! Here is an insert from their webpage:

"The populace of Winnipeg is largely dependent on being mobile all year round, either by automobile, truck or bus. As a result, it is critical that the street network and transportation system be functioning and safe. The City endeavours to provide an adequate level of service and, pending proper weather conditions, the application of 100% salt to City streets satisfies the following objectives:

1. Melting freshly fallen snow on arteries that are heavily traveled.

2. Preventing the formation of ice on the roadway surface due to freezing rain, fog, traces of snow, or frost formations such as on bridge decks.

3. Removing layers of snow and ice that remain on the pavement after the plowing operation is carried out.

4. Improving tire traction and braking qualities of the pavement."



I would think that their rate of collision due to ice, ruts on the road, and standing snow is less on a percentage basis than ours is. As well, accessibility is improved, because people aren't dealing with really poor road conditions, improving attraction to our city, less down time for business, not to mention fewer FATALITIES due to poor road conditions.

I was dissappointed after the last snowfall that the city was not out prior to rush hour getting our roads cleared, and safe after first the rain, then the snow. I had heard that there were 25 + collisions that morning, and after spending the whole day trying to get around the city, I can see why. I can only hope there were no serious injuries.

Westcon Equipment Ltd. fronts Idylwyld Drive North at 3530, on the east service road. We are 2 businesses away from the 60th st exit. My concerns regarding this street are related to the well being of my business. If you could please look into these concerns, it would be greatly appreciated.

1. The intersection where 60th meets ldylwyld is dangerous. There is a 3 way stop at this location, where stopped traffic should yeild to traffic exiting ldylwyld (North bound). With the upcoming completion of Maquis drive to Millar Ave, I can only see this intersection becoming busier. Are there plans to eliminate the access to Idylwyld from the service road? It would cut down on accidents.

2. The speed limit on the service road is too low. It is currently 50kph, and I will note that there has been a strong police presence here for the past 2 weeks. Similar streets (Millar Ave north, and 51st St) have 60KPH speed limits with more traffic. I would think that an area such as this, where there is little to no pedestrian or bicycle traffic, should have the same speed limit. Our location in Regina is very similar, and has an 80KPH limit. I feel that the police are targetting speeders here, knowing full well that the limit is low and people will speed. I also feel that customers may be avoiding our business due to the constant police presence on this street. I would suggest that people would be less likely to speed if the posted limit were more in line with other areas. Would council please look into adjusting the speed limit here?
