

Suspected Dutch Elm Disease



All neighbourhoods are inspected twice a year during our regular DED Surveillance. We will be continuing with surveillance throughout the City this season with increased surveillance in Queen Elizabeth where there has been a positive case of Dutch Elm Disease. All submissions will be inspected. Our trained staff will determine if sampling is required.

If sampling is necessary, a letter will be provided to the property owner and results would be expected from the Provincial lab in approximately 30 days.

American Elm

American elm is considered a majestic tree that adds a feeling of richness to Saskatoon's downtown and older residential neighbourhoods. It is a high-headed spreading tree with a unique umbrella shape; these characteristics make them ideal for street boulevards and for providing us with excellent shade.

Due to the threat of Dutch Elm Disease, the Province of Saskatchewan issues a pruning ban between April 1 and August 31.

Mature height: 20-30m (66-98ft)

Spread: 15-25m (50-82ft)
