Until Sept 30	Get your orange t-shirt ready	Consider buying an orange shirt from a place that uses the proceeds to support residential school Survivors. Some places we know of: Al Anderson's Source for Sports, Tourism Saskatoon Visitor Centre, Pebl Goods, and 22Fresh (proceeds from this location also support the Saskatchewan First Nations Veterans Association).
Sept	Help raise awareness by hanging a poster	Request permission to hang a poster at your place of work, or other public facilities you frequent, to increase awareness about National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and Orange Shirt Day.  <a href="#">2021 POSTER HERE</a>
Sept	Watch for orange shirt decals on buses & City vehicles	Saskatoon Transit and other City vehicles will display orange t-shirt stencils in their windows to increase awareness.
Sept	Watch for orange hand decals on vehicles and business doors	Community volunteers have created and distributed orange hand decals to residents and businesses across the city. The orange hands symbolize the hands of the children that attended residential schools and how they are in our hearts and minds this month as we prepare to mark this country's first National Day for Truth and Reconciliation.
Sept	Watch for statements of support from members of City Council	City Administration asked City Councillors why they wear an orange shirt on Sept. 30th. Their responses are being posted to City social media (Facebook, Twitter, Instagram) during the month of Sept.

Sept 30	National Day for Truth and Reconciliation / Orange Shirt Day	The federal government created a federal statutory holiday on this day.  The City of Saskatoon has recognized it with an official Proclamation – approved by the City Clerk in accordance with <i>The Flag and Proclamation Policy</i> . As well, flags on City-owned facilities will be lowered to half-mast to honour Survivors, those that never made it home, and the families impacted by residential schools.  Demonstrate your support for reconciliation and help raise awareness by wearing an orange shirt and seizing any opportunity to aid understanding.  Devote some time to reflect on the legacy of the Indian Residential School System and/or to participate in activities or virtual events that promote healing and awareness.
